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

Chapter 1: Daily Tasks

Tour of the HPOM Java GUI

When you start the HPOM Java GUI, you see the main window, as shown in the following figure.



The main window of the Java GUI is divided into four main areas:

Shortcut Bar

Top-left pane provides you with shortcuts to frequently used objects. For details, see "Shortcut Bar" on the next page.

Object Pane

Top-middle pane displays the structure of your managed environment. For details, see "Object Pane" on page 21.

Workspace Pane

Top-right pane contains multiple tabs, each containing one workplace. For details, see "Workspace Pane" on page 29.

Browser Pane

Bottom pane provides you with quick access to the latest messages. For details, see "Browser Pane" on page 34.

The top of the Java GUI contains the following navigation tools:

Menu Bar

Top row of pull-down menus. For an overview, see "Menu Bar" on page 44. For a description of each menu option, see "Menu Bar Items" on page 275.

Toolbar

Row of icons just below the menu bar. For an overview, see "Toolbar" on page 44. For a description of each icon in the menu bar, see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286.

Position Controls

Narrow band of horizontal bars just below the toolbar. For an overview, see "Position Controls" on page 45.

By default, the position controls are not visible. To find out how to switch them on and off, see "Showing and Hiding the Position Controls" on page 113.

Shortcut Bar

The shortcut bar is the first pane below the toolbar and position controls, as shown in the following figure.



From the shortcut bar, you use pop-up menus to perform all operations that are available from the object pane (for example, start tools, open a new filtered message browser, get service graphs, and so on). This quick access is very useful if there are many objects in the object pane.

Service icons in the shortcut bar can also display service labels with textual information and images that give you more information about the objects at a glance. The status of the icons and service labels information is updated at every refresh interval.

By default, the following shortcut groups (gray buttons) are created:

Nodes

Systems, printers, or any other elements in the network environment. For details, see "Nodes " on page 23.

Services

If Service Navigator is installed and configured, maps problems with messages associated with affected services.

• Filter Settings

Enables you to create and access message filters quickly and easily. For details, see "Filter Settings" on page 26.

URL Shortcuts

Enables you to update and start URL tools. For details, see "URL Shortcuts" on page 28.

Message Groups



Object Pane

The object pane is the second pane below the toolbar and position controls, as shown in the following figure. This pane contains the object tree, a hierarchical tree diagram designed to help you navigate to different elements within your managed environment.



The object tree contains the following branches:

Nodes

Systems, printers, or any other element in the network environment. For details, see "Nodes " on the next page.

Message Groups

Message groups for which a particular operator is responsible. For details, see "Message Groups " on page 24.

• Tools

Scripts or programs that have been integrated into HPOM. For details, see "Tools" on page 26.

Services

If Service Navigator is installed and configured, maps problems with messages associated with affected services. For details, see "HP Operations Service Navigator" on page 218.

Filter Settings

Enables you to create and access message filters quickly and easily. For details, see "Filter Settings" on page 26.

URL Shortcuts

Nodes

In the object tree, the node icons in the Nodes folder represent the **managed nodes of a particular operator**. Managed nodes can be systems, printers, or any other element in the network environment. As shown in the following figure, the Nodes folder in the object tree contains an icon for each node, collection of nodes (called a node layout group), or external node for which you are responsible. The external node represents a range of nodes from which external events are integrated into HPOM.



Node Layout Groups

Within the object tree, icons in the Nodes folder can represent folders or collections of nodes. For example, all nodes located in a single building or all nodes serving a similar purpose can be grouped together and represented by a single node layout group icon. Clicking the **PLUS SIGN (+)** next to the folder opens the folder and displays the individual nodes of the layout group.

Node Colors

Node icons are displayed in colors that correspond to the highest severity of any message received from that node. For example, the node icon turns red when the affected node has at least one unacknowledged critical message. After all critical messages have been acknowledged, the node icon changes color to indicate the highest severity level of the remaining messages. The status of other map tools (for example, the IP Map) is not included.


Depending on how HPOM is configured, folder icons are displayed in colors corresponding to the highest severity message of any of its components. For example, if the folder icon is cyan, there must be at least one element with the status of Warning in an underlying layer.

Message Groups

The Message Groups folder in the object tree contains icons representing the message groups for which you are responsible, as shown in the following figure. In this folder, you can review the status of each group, and select specific groups for message review. HPOM uses message groups to combine management information about similar or related managed objects under a chosen name, and provide status information on a group level.



Message Group Colors

As in the Nodes folder, the color of a particular icon in the Message Groups folder represents the current status of that group. A change in the color of an icon in the Message Groups folder indicates a change in status of a managed node within your operator environment.


Organizing Message Groups

Messages are organized into groups to simplify message management, and to let you do your work in a task-oriented way. For example, one operator can be responsible for backups and output, and another operator can be responsible for network, operating system, and security aspects of message management.

You can reduce the number of messages in the message browser by selecting the required message group from the Message Group folder, and opening a filtered message browser. Then only messages in that message group are displayed.

Tools

The Tools folder in the object tree contains icons for the scripts or programs that have been integrated into HPOM, as shown in the following figure. You can start any integrated tool from this folder.



The HPOM administrator first examines your environment and then determines which tools you need to maintain it. Each tool has predefined start-up attributes, including a list of the managed nodes for individual operators.

Tools can also be programs or services running in the environment (for example, the UNIX df or bdf commands). You could be responsible for controlling the amount of free disk space on a system. To maintain sufficient disk space on a system, you respond to messages issued by the HPOM monitor agent, and send controlling commands, such as df or bdf.

Filter Settings

The Filter Settings folder in the object tree contains icons for the following types of filters, as shown in the following figure:


Message browser filters

Global and personal message browser filters are stored in the Global Filter Settings and the Personal Filter Settings folders.

• Message view filters

Global and personal message view filters are stored in the Global Message View Filters and Personal Message View Filters folders.

From the Filter Settings folder, you can create and access message filters quickly and easily. For example, if you want to see all messages that could show a possible problem in the Performance area, you would create a filter that shows all warnings, all minor, major, and critical messages, and all unknown messages within the message group Performance. You would then save the new filter. Later, to see the messages in your new filter, you could open a message browser, and apply your filter settings to it.

Note: Only HPOM administrators are allowed to create global filters. As an operator, you can add filters to the personal filters folder only.

To access a saved filter, you select the Filter Settings group from one of two locations:





You may have a variety of URLs provided by your HPOM administrator. The URL Shortcuts folder enables you to define new shortcuts to URLs that you use frequently. These shortcuts are saved in your personal console sessions files.

Workspace Pane

The workspace pane is the third pane below the toolbar, as shown in the following figure. The workspace pane has multiple tabs, each containing one workspace.



Note: For details about pop-up menus in the workspace pane, see "Workspace Pane Pop-up Menu" on page 47.

By default, the workspace pane contains the following tabbed workspaces:

Message Dashboard

Shows message severity in one of two formats. For details, see "Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard" on page 82.

Services

Displays only if Service Navigator is installed and configured. For details, see "Services Workspace" on the next page.

Diagnostic Dashboard

For details, see "Diagnostic Dashboard Workspace" on page 31.


Corrective Actions

You can also define your own workspaces, each of which can contain the following:

- Application output windows
- Graphs and charts
- Message browsers
- Web browsers

The following figure shows a workspace with a service graph, history graph, and bar chart.



To logically organize your work, you can define different workspaces for different tasks:

Normal Workspaces

Can contain message browsers, graphs, charts, application outputs, and non-ActiveX web browsers.

ActiveX Workspaces

Can contain only Microsoft Internet Explorer web browsers.

Message Dashboard Workspace

You can view message severity in a current state chart or a history chart in the Message Dashboard tab of the workspace pane. For details, see "Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard" on page 82.

Services Workspace

The Services tab is present only if Service Navigator is installed. If Service Navigator is installed, the Services tab contains a service graph showing the hierarchical organization of your services and subservices. You can use this tab to start root-cause and impacted-service analyses. For more information about Service Navigator, see Service Navigator documentation.

Diagnostic Dashboard Workspace

The Diagnostic Dashboard tab is reserved for other tools that integrate with HPOM.

For example, the following tools provide integration points for HPOM:

Performance

HP Performance for Windows is a scalable, distributed network performance management tool that improves network operations, staff efficiency, and network total cost of ownership (TCO). This tool provides a clear historical view through out-of-the-box reports, as well as insightful capacity planning through trend threshold reports.

Network Path

HP Network Path provides detailed status and performance information about static and dynamic network paths. Path monitoring allows relevant path analysis, based on the tools and protocols in use, and supports duplicate IP and firewall environments.

Internet Services

HP Internet Services enables enterprises that operate business-critical Internet services (for example, POP3, SMTP, HTTP, HTTPS, FTP, DNS, and so on) to meet their customer needs with availability and performance levels that meet or exceed their defined service-level objectives.

Through trend reports and baselines, Internet Services can communicate early warnings to customers before their business is affected. It can also immediately determine which service component is exceeding threshold, and thereby identify the root cause of the problem. With Internet Services, customer care personnel can share with their customers summarized and detailed reports on service-level compliance.

Corrective Actions Workspace

The Corrective Actions tab enables you to maintain a current and accurate overview of the computing environment by reviewing the status and results of actions. The status of an action is defined as the availability and current state of the action.

The status indicates whether an action:

- Has been configured for the message
- Is still running
- Has been successfully completed
- Failed

Online Help Workspace

The Online Help workspace contains online documentation for all installed tools. The following figure shows how to start the HPOM online help in the Online Help workspace from the shortcut bar.

Note: The Online Help workspace is not an operator default assigned by the system. It can be defined by the HPOM administrator on the HP Operations management server. For more information, see "Loading the Default Configuration" on page 104.

Updating the Current Workspace

Updating the current workspace only applies to tools that are based on evaluating message-related variables. For example, from the URL Shortcuts folder, you can define URLs that include message-related variables, select a message and then start the tool. When you choose a different message and update the URL tool, the message-related variables are re-evaluated based on the currently selected message. You launch the update from a button in the browser pane or the workspace pane of the Java GUI.


Note: Updating the current workspace works only if the workspace supports Microsoft Internet Explorer ActiveX controls.

For example, you could set up a tool with the following URL:



The browser pane can have multiple tabs, each containing one message browser. Each tab displays an icon before the name that shows the severity of the most critical message in that message browser. You can change the properties (name, description) of each tab, or delete the tab entirely, along with the corresponding message browser.

The browser pane provides you with quick access to the latest messages. You can easily identify the severity of messages in the browser pane through severity icons on the tabs. You can also switch between different message browsers.

By default, when you start the Java GUI, an All Active Messages message browser is opened in the browser pane. With the first button on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286), you can switch the browser between the browser pane and the workspace pane. For example, you could switch one message browser to the workspace pane, and continue to work there. You could also create a new message browser and then move it to the browser pane so you can always access important messages.

The browser pane is visible by default. You can hide it by clearing

View: Browser Pane in the menu bar. You can make the browser pane visible again by re-selecting this option.

Message Browser

HPOM provides information about your managed environment through messages displayed in the message browser. A message represents an event that has occurred on a node within the managed environment (for example, a status change or a threshold violation) generated by the agents running on the node.

The active message browser, as shown in the following figure, is your unique GUI client (that is, of all active messages for which you are responsible). HPOM collects messages from the managed nodes of the message groups assigned to you, and delivers them to your GUI client.

Note: The message browser can also display GIF and JPEG images, and URLs as hyperlinks. Images and URLs can be displayed in all fields except in the Severity column, Flags column, and in date and time related columns. All URL texts must start with http:// to be displayed as hyperlinks.

Images in the message browser are available only if previously configured by the HPOM administrator.

To provide you with additional information that will help you solve problems, messages are characterized by attributes summarized in the message browser.

For a description of default elements in the message headline, see "Message Browser Headline" on page 348.

For a description of each message attribute and flag, see "Message Attributes" on page 349.

Message Colors

You use message browsers to review and manage messages, and to guide problem resolution. Incoming messages are displayed with preconfigured attributes and with status information. As with the Nodes and Message Groups folders, the status of a message in the message browsers is indicated by a color, which displays in the Severity column, with red denoting the highest severity level (Critical).

HPOM can also be configured to color the entire message line in the browser to provide at-a-glance classification of message severity. For details, see "Customizing the Color Preferences for the Message Browser" on page 209.

To provide you with an even better overview of critical messages, the tabs in the browser pane contain an icon that shows the severity of the most critical message in the corresponding message browser. If the most critical message has a severity of Norma1, the tab contains the icon for Normal. The currently selected tab in the browser pane is indicated by a blue background color, as shown in the following figure.

Messages

You can look at all the details of a single message, and initiate an operator-initiated action to resolve the event that triggered the message. Or HPOM can perform an automatic action for you. If necessary, you can restart actions any time, or even stop the execution. You can also print messages, and prepare message reports. In addition, the HPOM annotation facility lets you document your actions, and review previous actions in detail. Finally, you can acknowledge messages for which actions have been completed in the message browser.

Double-clicking any message in any of the browsers displays the Message Properties window, as shown in the following figure.

This window contains details of the chosen message, and allows *some* operations to be performed. However, the information and operations that are available in the Message Properties window differ according to which browser (active, pending, history) was used to open it.

For example, the Unbuffer Time field displays only if the Message Properties window is opened from the filtered pending messages browser.

Filtering Message Browsers

By default, an active message browser displays the latest 50 messages for which you are responsible. You can change the set of visible messages by increasing or decreasing the default limit so that more or fewer messages are displayed, and you can apply a message filter so that only messages that match the filter are displayed.

HPOM distinguishes between the following types of message filters:

Message browser filters

Message browser filters consist of criteria that define which messages are loaded into the message browser from the database. Message browser filters create a filtered active, history, or pending messages browser. The word Filtered in the browser's title bar indicates that a filter is applied to the message browser. The word in brackets (for example, [Oracle] in the following figure) represents the filter name.

Message browser filters are evaluated on the management server. This evaluation reduces the network traffic between the Java GUI client and the management server because fewer messages are transferred. However, the filter evaluation may increase the workload of the management server where the filtering takes place.

Message view filters

Message view filters temporarily hide messages from view. They consist of criteria and rules that define which of the already loaded messages are displayed in an already existing message browser. The loaded messages may already have gone through a first level of filtering applied through message browser filters. In this case, message view filters apply a second level of filtering.

The message view filter icon in the message browser itself and on the message browser headline indicates that a message view filter is applied to the message browser. The following figure shows an example of a filtered active messages browser with a message view filter applied to the Application and Object message browser columns.

Message view filters are evaluated on the Java GUI client. As a result, they produce quicker results than message browser filters because no additional messages need to be transferred from the management server.

Note: Using message view filters as first-level filters on a history message browser showing all history messages may increase the memory usage on the management server because all history messages must first be retrieved from the database before a message view filter can be applied. For more information about history message browsers, see "Filtered History Message Browser" on page 40. This does not apply to active or pending messages.

You can save filters, and then reuse them later on. Administrators can create global filters that are available to all operators. Any user can create personal filters that are available for their personal use only.

Filtered Active Message Browser

A filtered active message browser is the result of applying message browser filters to the messages you are responsible for.

You can use the filtered active message browser to work with your selected messages in the same way you would in the active message browser. The filtered active message browser is your personally customized presentation of the messages displayed in the active browser. While the active message browser displays every message belonging to your managed nodes and message groups, the filtered active message browser displays only the messages you have configured it to display.

Note: You can limit the maximum number of messages loaded into active message browsers. This can be set in the Preferences window in the General tab. See the "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336 for more information.

The following figure shows active messages in a sample filtered active message browser that also has message view filters applied.

In the filtered active message browser, you can tailor the view so only the most important messages are displayed, and concentrate on messages that need immediate attention:

Select Specific Messages

You can select specific messages in the message browser to be displayed in the filtered message browser.

Define Message Browser Filters

You can define a message browser filter to load only a subset of the messages you are responsible for.

Define Message View Filters

You can define a message view filter to display only a subset of the already loaded messages.

You can perform the same functions in the filtered active message browser as you can in the active message browser (for example, starting operator-initiated actions or tools on the node that generated the message).

Note: For descriptions of message browser columns, see "Customize Message Browser Columns Dialog Box" on page 316. To find out how to customize the message browser, see "Customizing the Message Browser Columns" on page 136 and "Changing the Layout of Browser Windows" on page 207.

Filtered History Message Browser

When a message has been acknowledged, it is removed from the active message browser and put in the history database. The filtered history message browser displays all acknowledged messages in the message groups for which you are currently responsible.

You can use the filtered history message browser to view these messages and unacknowledge them. Examining acknowledged messages can be very helpful when you want to find out more about techniques you used previously to solve problems.

Opening a filtered history message browser may take a long time to complete because history messages are retrieved from the database and not from cache. During the download, the Java GUI cannot be used for other tasks. If you need to access the Java GUI while history messages are being downloaded, cancel the download, and consider changing the criteria of your message browser filter to better match the history messages you are interested in.

You can also limit the maximum number of messages displayed in a history message browser.

The following figure shows acknowledged messages in the filtered history message browser.

Note: You can create a new history filter on a selected message. The menu item for creating the new history filter can be accessed in one of the following ways:

- Performing a right-click on the selected message (pop-up menu).
- Selecting Actions: Messages from the menu bar.

Filtered Pending Messages Browser

You can start the filtered pending messages browser like any other filtered browser. The filtered pending messages browser shows those messages that have been buffered because they arrived outside a defined period of **service hours**.

If you want to work on a pending message, you must first **unbuffer** it. Unbuffering a message moves the message from the filtered pending messages browser to the active message browser, where operations may be performed in the usual way. You can perform a limited set of actions on messages in the filtered pending messages browser. For example, you can save and print messages, or unbuffer and acknowledge messages.

Caution: Although you can acknowledge pending messages, and add or modify their annotations, it is better to perform operations on messages only when they are in the active message browser.

Sometimes, the filtered pending messages browser may not contain any messages, for one of two reasons:

• Within Service Hours

You are currently operating within service hours, and all messages arrive in the active message browser.

Outside Service Hours

Your HPOM administrator may not have configured HPOM to buffer messages outside service hours.

Note: The severity level of messages in the filtered pending messages browser does not affect status propagation in the Nodes and Message Groups folders, and so on.

Integrated Web Browsers

Instead of running an external web browser in the background, you can run your favorite web browser from within the HPOM Java GUI itself. As a result, you can access intranet sites, search the Internet for business-related information, and view your HPOM message browsers from within a single, integrated interface. Integrated web browsers display in the workspace pane of the HPOM Java GUI.

You set your web browser preferences in the Web Browser tab of the Preferences window, as shown in the following figure.

Status Bar

The Java GUI status bar, at the bottom of the message browser, displays the information on the current status of the Java GUI. The following information is available from the status bar:

- Status of the secure link (SSL) between the management server and the Java GUI client: enabled or disabled. The default is disabled SSL, signified by an open lock in the far left corner of the status bar.
- All actions currently performed in the Java GUI. When no actions are being performed, the Java GUI is in the idle state and Ready is displayed in the left corner of the status bar.
- Maximum number of messages that the message browser is configured to display, displayed in the right corner of the status bar.
- Status of the communication between the Java GUI and the management server, and the status of loading services from the management server.

The gray indication light changes to yellow when services are retrieved from the management server. No service-related actions can be performed during this time.

The green indication light changes to red to indicate that the communication between the Java GUI and the management server is in progress.

The indication lights are placed in the far right corner of the status bar.

Menu Bar

The menu bar is the strip of pull-down menus at the very top of the Java GUI, as shown in the following figure. You can use these menus to perform operations throughout the Java GUI.

Toolbar

The toolbar is the row of icons just below the menu bar, as shown in the following figure. The toolbar provides menu choices that apply to the objects in the object pane, workspace pane, and browser pane.

The toolbar is divided into the following components:

- Message Browser Toolbar
- Message Toolbar
- Service Toolbar

You can reposition these components in a particular order, or you can hide any of them. For more details, see "Customizing the Toolbar" on page 188.

Go to Service

The Go to Service drop-down list is a part of the Service Toolbar. It contains a list of all services currently present in the Java GUI cache, which can be displayed within the selected service graph. You

can use the Go to Service drop-down list for navigating only within service graphs.

When you select a service in the list, and then click the **Go to Service** toolbar button, the service is displayed in the center of a service graph surrounded by its neighboring services.

Note: The Go to Service drop-down list is available only from the toolbar.

Position Controls

The position controls are the narrow band of horizontal bars just below the toolbar, as shown in the following figure. These bars enable you to move the shortcut bar and object pane horizontally.



By default, the position controls are hidden. You can make them visible by selecting **View: Position Controls** in the menu bar. Likewise, when the position controls are visible, you can hide them again by clearing **View: Position Controls** in the menu bar.









Detached Windows

Detached windows are windows that are separated from the main Java GUI window so that they can be moved independently. Detaching a window is helpful, for example, if you want to extend a window to another monitor to increase the amount of available space on your screen, or if you want to monitor the content of a window regardless of other activities on your computer.

You can detach message browsers, service graphs, service submaps, and service custom maps by

selecting the window to detach and then clicking the **Detach Window** icon in the main toolbar. HPOM places the detached window at the center of your screen and adds a menu and toolbar to the detached window.

The following figure shows a detached message browser. To re-attach a detached window, select the window and click the **Attach Window** icon on the toolbar of the detached window.

Detached windows are saved along with their settings and positions as part of the console session settings so that they are restored the next time you start a Java GUI session.

To further increase the amount of available space in detached windows, you can temporarily hide any of the following window components:

- Menu bar and toolbars
- Status summary area in message browsers
- Horizontal scroll bar in message browsers

Note: To perform an operation on messages or services displayed in the main window and a detached window, use the **CTRL** key to select multiple objects in both windows.

Creating the Java GUI Start-up Message

According to the NIST 800-37 standard, usage and criticality of any tool should be acknowledged before its startup. Acknowledgement is achieved with a warning message that is displayed before the tool is started.

You can create the Java GUI start-up message that contains your own text, as well as enable and disable this message.

Note: It is possible to customize, edit, or change the status of the Java GUI start-up message only as the root user.

If the Java GUI start-up message is enabled, it displays after the log-on window. If the agreement defined in this message is accepted, HPOM starts. Otherwise, the log-on sequence is stopped immediately.

If the Java GUI start-up message is disabled, HPOM starts right after the log-on window.

For more information on Java GUI start-up message creation and the prerequisites that must be taken into account, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

Sources and Standard Drag Operation

All Java GUI areas from which you can drag objects are marked as sources.

Note: Objects dragged from the sources are not necessarily displayed in the same way for every target. The way they are displayed depends on the action associated with the particular source-target pair. For more information about the actions performed as a result of drag and drop operations, see "Targets and Drop Associated Actions" below.

When you start dragging an object, the cursor changes to reflect the current status of the operation. The cursor shows whether it is possible to drop the object on a target.

However, there are special cases when you *cannot* use a standard drag operation. For more information, see "Drag Modes" on page 57.

Note: It is possible to drag more than one object from source to target simultaneously.

Targets and Drop Associated Actions

All Java GUI areas where you can drop the dragged objects are marked as targets. Dropping objects is associated with actions that are described in the following tables. These show possible sources and actions for every target.

Note: Most actions associated with dropping objects are also available from the pop-up and other menus of particular target areas.

Shortcut bar: Shortcut Bar Drop Actions

There are a number of areas where objects can be dropped within a shortcut bar. These are the following:

Shortcut pane

Object dropped anywhere inside the shortcut pane, except between two shortcuts, displays as a shortcut appended to the end of the shortcut pane.

• Shortcut pane, between two shortcuts

Object dropped between two shortcuts displays as a shortcut inserted at the position indicated by a visible "insert line."

Shortcut group button

When you drop an object on a shortcut group button, a shortcut group opens. The dropped object displays as a shortcut appended at the end of the shortcut group.

Hovering the mouse over a shortcut group button opens the shortcut group. This helps you to choose a suitable shortcut group onto which to drop the object.

Scroll buttons

Hovering the mouse over a scroll button results in scrolling up or down, depending on the scroll button that you are hovering over. This helps you to choose a position for the object to be dropped where there are many shortcuts present in a shortcut bar.

Note: By using drag and drop operations, you can reposition shortcuts in a shortcut bar.

To save data to files that can be attached to emails and other documents, choose **Export** from the Java GUI File menu.

Drag Modes

The following drag modes exist for drag and drop operations:

Normal mode

A standard drag operation. For more information, see "Drag and Drop Operations Inside the Java GUI" on page 51.

• Special drag mode

This mode is used for the special cases when it is not possible to use a standard drag operation. For more information, see "Drag and Drop Operations Between the Java GUI and Other Applications" on the previous page as well as "Special Mode Invocation" below and "Special Mode Cases" on the next page.

Special Mode Invocation

To invoke the special drag mode, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the client window where the dragging will be performed.
- 2. Place the cursor inside the client window and press CTRL+D.

When this mode is on, the cursor changes from an "arrow" to a "hand", and behaves as in a standard drag operation.

The special drag mode automatically changes to a normal drag mode after you do one of the following:

- Perform the drop operation.
- Move the mouse outside the client window where you performed dragging in the special mode.

You can also turn to the normal mode by pressing CTRL+D again.

Special Mode Cases

A special drag mode must be used when dragging the following:

Client windows

A client window is any kind of window that can be opened in the workspace (except an ActiveX web browser).

Client windows can be any of the following types:

- Application Output Panel
- Message Browser Charts
- Message Browser
- Service Graph (including Service Impact Graph and Service Root Cause Graph)
- Service Submap and Custom Map

Client windows can be moved only within the workspace by using a standard drag operation. To drag them outside the workspace, you must invoke a special drag mode. To learn how to invoke the special drag mode, see "Special Mode Invocation" on the previous page.

Dragging an object inside the window starts a drag and drop operation.

Services in service graphs and maps

Services can be moved only within the service graph or map by using a standard drag operation. To enable services to be dropped outside service graph or map, you must invoke a special drag mode. To learn how to invoke the special drag mode, see "Special Mode Invocation" on the previous page.

Note: You can perform the drop operation depending on the target location that you choose. For more information about supported source-target pairs, see "Supported Drag and Drop Operations " on page 51.

These are possible ways how you can perform the drag operation:

Dragging selected services

If one or more services are selected, dragging one of them moves all selected services to a target location.

• Dragging non-selected services

If you drag a non-selected service, even though there might be some services selected, only the non-selected service will be moved to a target location.

Note: If you drag an area surrounding the services, an entire service graph or map, similarly as any other client window, will be moved to a target location.

Cockpit View

The HPOM cockpit view is a web-based interface that displays the state of the environment monitored by HPOM. Cockpit view helps users to quickly assess the health and readiness of the environment to support the business.

A cockpit view consists of two main parts:

Indicator panel

The colored bars and gauges at the top of a cockpit view indicate the status of message filters and groups of message filters, based on the status of the messages that match the filter criteria.

Message Browser

The Java GUI message browser displays at the bottom of a cockpit view. The menu bars and tool bars can be displayed, if required.

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Message Filters

To display the status of message filters, cockpit view provides the following elements:

Icon

The icon indicates the current status of the message filter.

• Name, label, or background

The filter name, label, or background of the text area of a message filter can be color-coded to indicate the current status of the message filter.

Message bars

The upper message bar shows the total number of all messages by severity. The lower message bar shows the number of all unowned messages by severity.

A hyphen (-) indicates that the Java GUI is still loading messages and that the filter criteria are still being evaluated. The hyphen is also displayed in case the filter with the specified file name does not exist. If a bar displays zero (0) messages, no messages currently match the criteria of the filter.

If the specified width of the message bars is too small, the message bars are truncated and shaded to indicate that some information is hidden. You can view the complete information by accessing the tool tip of a truncated message bar.

Note: You can configure each element to be shown or hidden from view.

The status of a message filter is equal to the most severe, unowned message.

The following figure shows that the message filter Main Terminal has a critical status because there are 75 critical messages.



To view the messages that match the criteria of the filter, you can click the message filter. A new message browser tab opens and displays the messages.

Note: When you modify a filter, make sure that you save it before clicking **OK** or **Apply**. Otherwise, an error message appears.

For more information about setting up message filters, see "Filter Settings" on page 26.

Message Filter Groups

You can collect multiple message filters into message filter groups. As with message filters, you can show message filter groups with an icon, a name or label, a background color, and message bars representing the number of messages by severity, as shown in the following figure:

For each message filter group, you can choose to display filters for active messages, for pending messages, or for history messages.

Optionally, for each message filter group, you can show a summary status line that indicates the current status of the group. A message filter group aggregates the messages of all contained message filters, and calculates their status, based on the total number of messages that match the criteria of the filters.

When you click the group summary, a new message browser tab opens and displays all messages that match the criteria of the message filters that are members of the message filter group.

Note: You cannot modify the message filter group (the Modify Filter option is disabled).

Requirements for Message Filters

Before you configure a message filter in the Java GUI for use in a cockpit view, make sure the filter meets the following cockpit view requirements:

Global message filters

The Java GUI enables you to define global and personal message filters. If you want to use a message filter in a cockpit view, the filter must be of the type global. Global filters must be configured by an administrator.

Caution: The Main Terminal and WebShop DB global filters are installed by default in the Java GUI. These filters are required to successfully view the sample layout configuration file. If you want to keep the default layout, do not edit or remove them.

Named message filters


To insert a message filter in a cockpit view, the filter must have a name that is unique across the HPOM environment.

Note: Use labels to show message filters under different names in a cockpit view.

For more information about setting up message filters, see "Filter Settings" on page 26.

Health Gauges

A health gauge is an alternative method of displaying a message filter. A health gauge can display an icon, a name or label, a background color, and an indicator showing the number of messages in relation to a maximum value, as shown in the following figure.



For each health gauge, you can choose to display a filter for active messages, pending messages, or history messages.

A health gauge shows you at a glance how many messages match the criteria of the filter. It compares the number of messages with a set of thresholds. It then calculates its current status accordingly.

When you configure a health gauge, you define the orientation, maximum value, and thresholds of the scale. A health gauge can have a positive or negative orientation. A positive orientation means that a lower value is more critical than a higher value. The reference value is the maximum, or best, value. If you choose a negative orientation, higher values are considered to be more critical than lower values.

The thresholds define the segments of the scale. The status of a health gauge changes as thresholds are exceeded.

When you click a health gauge, the message browser displays the messages according to the gauge filter properties.

Free-Text Areas

Free-text areas are sections in a cockpit view that display single lines of text that you write, as shown in the following figure. You can choose the content, position, and format of lines of text.

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Note: Free-text areas are static. They do not display status information. In a free-text area, you can select the text, but you cannot click it.

Images

You can place images anywhere in a cockpit view, as shown in the following figure. You can choose the image itself, the size, and the position of the image.



Starting a Cockpit View

Checking the HPOM Status Output

When you run a tool from the Java GUI cockpit view and want to check the HPOM status output, follow these steps:

- 1. Start a cockpit view.
- 2. Right-click one of the displayed messages.
- 3. Select Start->HPOM Status.
- 4. Move the browser pane down.

The HPOM Status Output window appears.

Security and Authentication

Cockpit view uses the security and authentication processes of the Java GUI.

Depending on the security setup of the Java GUI, before you can access a cockpit view, you may need to do one of the following:

- Accept an HPOM server certificate.
- Enter information in the Login dialog box.

Firewall Environments

If a firewall exists between a cockpit view client and the management server, you can do one of the following:

- Configure the firewall to allow the Java GUI direct access to the management server.
- Configure the Java GUI to use a proxy server for all communication with the management server.

Problem Solving Process

The HPOM problem solving process includes the following steps:

1. Detecting Problems

HPOM enables you to automatically detect problems in message browsers and the object pane, review messages and node status, and direct problem management activities. HPOM notifies you when problems occur, and indicates exactly where the problems are located.

2. Investigating Problems

The most common indication of a problem in your managed environment is a message in your message browser. The message indicates where and why a problem occurred, and suggests what you should do to resolve the problem.

4. Documenting Solutions

After you have completed work on a message, you should document your efforts and remove the message from the active message browser, the filtered active message browser, or the filtered pending messages browser. To do this, you use message annotations to record how a problem was resolved, and then acknowledge the message to remove it from the current work area, storing it in the history database.

In both cases, the search begins at the top of the object tree, rather than from the selected item.

Message Event Notification

Message event notification keeps you informed about new messages with high severity. This notification is especially helpful if you have many windows opened simultaneously, or if there are a lot of new messages with low severity coming in. The following figure shows a message event warning.

Viewing Messages in the Message Browser

When you start the Java GUI, a message browser opens in the browser pane, and automatically displays the latest 50 of all active messages from the nodes assigned to you. You can change the number of messages displayed so that all messages are shown (see "Changing the Number of Displayed Messages" on page 208). To further narrow your view of the messages in the message browser, you can open filtered message browsers that display only messages matching your selected message browser filters. In addition, you can define message view filters to quickly isolate specific messages.

By locking the message browser, you can make sure that older messages you currently work on remain visible in the message browser while new messages arrive in the message browser.

To find out how to view all, selected, filtered, or old messages in the message browser, see "Viewing Messages" on page 146.

Browsing Messages Effectively

The message browsers provide you with the following information:

- What the problem is
- How serious the problem is
- Which preconfigured actions you can use to correct the problem

When you browse messages, you scan the message browsers for incoming messages, looking for important information requiring your attention. A good scanning policy makes your messagemanagement tasks easier, and it makes you a more effective operator. To develop a scanning policy, you determine which messages are most important to your environment.

This section explains how to do the following:

By using priorities and policies to scan messages in the message browsers or reading each message as it is displayed in the message browsers.

Scanning Messages in the Message Browsers

As an example of message scanning, you might scan messages in the message browsers by using the following priorities and policies:

Severity

Use the severity flags to search for messages indicating problems. Color-coded severity levels help you do this quickly. For details, see "Switching Message Colors to an Entire Line" on page 135.

Actions

Search for messages indicating started operator-initiated actions.

Failures

Search for messages indicating that automatic or operator-initiated actions have failed. Restart the actions to try again.

Procedures

Search for messages that have no configured action, but require a response from you to correct a problem.

Ownership

Search for messages owned by you.

Custom Message Attributes

Search for messages that have a specific attribute chosen by the administrator (for example, a customer name, the type of Service Level Agreement, and so on).

Another approach is to read each message as it is displayed in the message browsers. If you decide to follow this approach, you should be aware that your environment could require you to apply different policies to your message scanning.

The total number of messages relating to each severity level or ownership state displays in the corresponding segment of each color bar.

The severity and the ownership color bars, and the view identifier that specifies which filters you have chosen to display messages, are shown in the following figure.

Note: The ownership display mode determines whether colors are used to indicate message ownership. This mode also determines whether the ownership-state color bar displays in the message browsers. For more information about the ownership display mode, see "Message Ownership" on page 88.

By checking the color bars beneath the message buffer, you can use the message browsers to see how many messages relate to a given severity level, or are owned or marked by you or another user.

Note: For a description of message severity colors, see "Message Colors" on page 36 and "Message Fields" on page 351.

If you want node status to be the first priority of your scanning policy, you can use the Nodes folder in the object tree together with the message browsers. If HPOM is configured to do so, the icon of each node in the object tree changes color, reflecting the highest severity level of a message issued by that node. These colors also correspond with the colors used in the severity column of the message browsers. For example, if you notice that a node's icon has changed to red (Critical), scan the message browsers for messages with the status color red.

Note: To find out how to customize color preferences for the message browser, see "Customizing the Color Preferences for the Message Browser" on page 209.

There are two different read-only message types, setting the S flag to:

- N for NOTIFICATION messages (these messages can be (un)acknowledged and annotations can be added)
- R when message is operator level READ-ONLY (no operations are allowed on these messages)

Customizing Browser Columns to be Displayed

You can use the Customize Message Browser Columns window to select message attributes (set by the HPOM administrator) that reflect your personal scanning policy. You *cannot* use the Customize Message Browser Columns window to remove either the severity or the ownership columns from the message browsers.

The Customize Message Browser Columns window has two tabs:

General

Enables you to select from default message attributes, as shown in the following figure. For a description of default message attributes, see "Message Fields" on page 351.

Custom

Enables you to select custom message attributes previously set by the HPOM administrator, as shown in the following figure. For an overview of custom message attributes, see "Custom Message Attributes" on page 80.


Coloring in the Shortcut Bar and Object Pane

In the shortcut bar and the object pane, the following elements are colored with the severity color of the most critical message:

- Nodes
- Message groups
- Services (if Service Navigator is installed)

If the most critical message has a severity of Normal, the element that contains it colored green. For example, if a node in the shortcut bar and object pane contains nothing but messages with a severity of Normal, the node is colored green. Then, if a Critical message arrives, the color of the node changes to red, indicating that you need to solve a Critical problem on this node.





Coloring in the Browser Pane

In the browser pane, the tabs contain an icon that shows the severity of the most critical message in the corresponding message browser. If a message with a higher severity arrives in the message browser, the icon on the tab changes to reflect the new severity. For example, if a tab in the browser pane contains nothing but messages with severity of Normal, the tab shows the icon representing the severity Normal. Then, if a Critical message arrives, you see the icon of the tab change to reflect the new severity, indicating that you need to solve a Critical problem on this node.

Note: For more information about coloring in the browser pane, see "Message Colors" on page 36.

Investigating Problems in Your Environment

The most common indication of a problem in your managed environment is a message in your message browser. The message indicates where and why a problem occurred, and suggests what you should do to resolve the problem. Not all messages represent problems. For example, a message about a user logon merely notifies you of the fact that a user has logged on to a system.

This section includes the following information to help you understand how HPOM notifies you of a problem:

Investigating Problems with the Message Browser

You can investigate problems with the message browser as follows:

Basic Information

You get basic information about a message by reviewing the message in the workspace pane or the browser pane. Only the most important information is shown. For details, see "Investigating Problems with the Message Browser" on page 151.

You can modify and even forward the message to another operator or to the HPOM administrator. For details, see "Investigating Problems with the Message Browser" on page 151.

Detailed Information

You view detailed information about a message by reviewing the Message Properties window. There you can view all information associated with a message, including instructions, annotations, and any configured actions. For details, see "Investigating Problems with the Message Browser" on page 151.

Examining Message Attributes

The key information in the message browsers is the incoming messages. Each line of the message buffer displays a single message and its attributes. Reading and understanding the attributes is as important as reading the message text.

Double-clicking a message opens the Message Properties window. The Message Properties window contains the full details of a message, including all message attributes, as shown in the following figure.

From this window, you can implement the problem-solving actions indicated in the message browsers. For example, you can perform operator-initiated actions, view available instructions or annotations, or acknowledge the message. As an added convenience, you can print messages from the window.

The **Modify...** button is displayed only if you have been granted the right to modify the attributes of a message.

Modifying Message Attributes

The Modify Message Attributes window enables you to modify the severity and the text of a message, as shown in the following figure.

Use this window if you want to increase or decrease the severity of a message. For descriptions of options in the Message Properties dialog box, see "Modify Message Attributes Dialog Box" on page 334.

If several messages have different values for the same message attribute, the text fields in which the values are specified will indicate "(multiple values)." When you hover the pointer over the message attribute, a tooltip with the values of the message attribute appears. If the number of values exceeds the specified limit, a new vertical scroll bar appears that enables you to scroll the values.

In the Modify Message Attributes window, the original message text is not changed, only the message text as it is presented by HPOM. All modifications are tracked through automatic annotations.

Reviewing the Original Message Text

Displaying the original, unfiltered message text may be useful when the message text in the Message Properties window proves to be unhelpful.

The following figure shows an example of the Original Message tab in the Message Properties window. For descriptions of options in the Original Message tab, see "Message Properties Dialog Box" on page 326.

Note: If the message does not have any original message text, the Original Message tab is empty.

Custom Message Attributes

Custom message attributes are message attributes that the HPOM administrator defines for a message. These attributes can convey any kind of information, whatever the administrator thinks useful. Typical custom message attributes are, for example, Customer for a customer name or SLA for service level agreements.

HPOM enables you to review these custom message attributes in the following windows:

• Message Browser (optional)

Custom message attributes are displayed as additional columns in the message browser windows. For details, see "Viewing Custom Message Attributes" on the next page.

• Message Properties (default)

You can view currently available custom message attributes in the Custom Attributes tab.

You can sort messages in the browser according to custom message attributes. You can open a filtered browser based on the custom message attributes.

Note: You can also use custom message attributes as message-related variables, which are used for tool launch, operator-initiated actions, and message event notification actions. The custom

message attributes are used as input launch parameters. For more information about message related variables, see "Adding HPOM Variables" on page 96 and "Message-related Variables" on page 358.

Viewing Custom Message Attributes

If you have enabled the display of custom message attributes in your message browser, they display as additional columns in your browser windows, as shown in the following figure.

Investigating Problems with the Workspace Pane

You can use the workspace pane to investigate problems as follows:

Message Dashboard

You can view message severity in the Message Dashboard workspace. For details, see "Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard" below.

Services

If Service Navigator is installed and configured on your system, the Services tab displays in the workspace pane. You can use the Services tab to get impacted service analysis. For details, see "Investigating Problems with HPOM and Service Navigator" on page 258.

Diagnostic Dashboard

You can use the Diagnostic Dashboard to access other applications (tools) integrated with HPOM. These tools help you to further diagnose the problem. For details, see "Using HP Software Products in the Diagnostic Dashboard" on page 85.

Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard

In the Message Dashboard tab of the workspace pane, you can view message severity in one of two formats:

Current State Chart

Displays the severity of all messages in the currently selected message browser.

For details, see "Current State Chart" below.

• History Chart

Displays the severity changes over time of all messages in the currently selected message browser. For details, see "History Chart" on the next page.

You can switch between these two charts by using Switch to Current State Chart and Switch to History Chart icons on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286). You can also open a new message browser with the same filter as the original browser from the message browser, current state chart, or history chart.


For example, you could switch an active message browser to a current state chart to get a quick overview of the severities of the current messages. Then you could open a new message browser to compare the pie chart with messages. You could also analyze messages in the history message browser. Finally, you could switch to the history chart, where you would see that many critical messages arrived at a specific day or hour, and see that no more critical messages arrived after the problem was resolved.

Current State Chart


The current state chart displays the severity of all messages in the currently selected message browser. The messages are grouped by severity, which is color-coded. The chart can be displayed as a

pie chart or a bar chart in two- or three-dimensional formats.

The following figure shows a current state chart, formatted as two-dimensional (2D) bar chart, displaying a number of messages with a specific severity.




The following figure shows a current state chart of all active messages, formatted as a threedimensional (3D) pie chart with a pop-up menu.



History Chart

The history chart displays the severity changes over time of all messages in the currently selected message browser, as shown in the following figure.



The messages are grouped by severity and time interval, from the earliest to latest message. These groups are connected with lines and displayed in the color of the corresponding severity.

From the pop-up menu in the history chart, you can choose any one of three formats for the history chart:

- Stacking Area
- Plot
- Stacking Bar

All three types are displayed in two-dimensional (2D) format only.

The following figure shows two history graphs with an associated pop-up menu.



Finding Impacted Service Navigator Services with the Services Workspace

If Service Navigator is installed and configured on your system, the Services tab displays in the workspace pane. You can use the Services tab to get impacted service analysis. For details, see "Investigating Problems with HPOM and Service Navigator" on page 258.

Using HP Software Products in the Diagnostic Dashboard

Additional HP Software tools may be installed on top of HPOM. If these additional tools are installed and configured, you can access them in the Diagnostic Dashboard tab of the workspace pane. For details, see "Diagnostic Dashboard Workspace" on page 31. To find out how you can use these tools to investigate a problem further, see the documentation of the respective tool.

Investigating Message Histories

As shown in the following figure, the filtered history message browser displays all **acknowledged** messages. Acknowledged messages are all messages for which you have completed work, or that have been sent to the history database by HPOM.

Note: For details about the filtered history message browser, see "Filtered History Message Browser" on page 40. For more information on message acknowledgment and automatic acknowledgments, see "Documenting Solutions in Your Environment" on page 98.

Use the filtered history message browser as a resource for solving problems. For example, if you are not sure how to perform an action for a message, you can review the history data for occurrences of the same or similar messages. By reviewing techniques used to solve previous problems (often stored as annotations to a message), you can devise a plan to solve your current problem. The HPOM administrator can run reports to determine which messages occur more frequently, so automatic and operator-initiated actions or instructional text are available to help solve the problems that are generating the messages.

You use the Filter Messages window to define a set of message browser filters, and to open the filtered history message browser, as shown in the following figure.

Note: The With Time check box is in the selected state by default to avoid accidentally opening a history browser with an excessive number of messages.

After you have configured the filtered history message browser to display the desired information in the desired way, you can use the Save Browser Filter Settings window to save the settings for reuse. In this way, you can see the same or similar information at a later date without having to repeat the configuration process.

Investigating Pending Messages

The filtered pending messages browser displays all messages that arrive on the HP Operations management server outside of defined **service hours**. They remain on the management server until a defined unbuffer time has been reached.

You can do the following with pending messages:

Acknowledge

Messages are moved to the filtered history message browser.

• Unbuffer (manually or automatically)

Messages are moved to the active message browser.

Message Ownership

It is important to understand the effect ownership has on operations performed to solve problems. The HPOM administrator determines ownership policy by selecting one of the ownership modes allowed in HPOM.

Ownership Modes

HPOM provides the following default message ownership modes:

Optional

As an operator, you have explicit permission to take ownership of a message. The owner of a message has exclusive read-write access to the message. With the exception of the HPOM administrator, all users who find this message in their message browsers have only limited access to it.

In this mode, only the owner of a message may do the following:

- Start or stop operator-initiated actions related to the message.
- Stop or restart automatic or operator-initiated actions related to the message.
- Acknowledge the message.
- Unacknowledge the message.
- Enforced (default mode)

As an operator, you can either choose explicitly to take ownership of an unowned message or automatically own the message when performing operations on the message.

In this mode, an operator automatically owns a message when attempting to do the following:

- Start or stop operator-initiated actions relating to the message.
- Stop or restart automatic or operator-initiated actions related to the message.
- Unacknowledge the message.
- Informational

The concept of ownership is replaced with that of marking and unmarking. A **marked** message indicates that you have taken note of the message. Marking a message is purely for informational purposes. It does not restrict or alter operations on the message in the way optional or enforced mode do. As an operator, you may unmark only those messages you yourself have marked. The HPOM administrator can unmark any marked message.

Ownership Display Modes

The ownership display mode determines whether owning or marking a message influences status propagation.

HPOM provides the following ownership display modes:

• No Status Propagation (default display mode)

The moment a message is owned or marked, the color indicating the severity of the message changes, a flag displays in the own-state column (S) in the message browsers, and the own-state color bar in the message browsers reflects the new number of messages owned. The status of a message that is owned or marked is ignored for the purposes of status propagation in the Nodes and Message Group folders in the object pane.

For example, if you take ownership of the one and only message with Critical severity level relating to a given managed node, the managed node to which that Critical message relates no longer displays the Critical severity-level color (by default, red). Instead, it displays the status of the next unowned message with the highest severity level in the message browser relating to the same managed node.

Status Propagation

The status of all messages, whether owned or not, is used to determine the status of the related symbols of other submap windows. Consequently, in the example above, the managed node to which the single critical message relates will continue to assume the Critical severity-level color (by default, red) even after the message has been owned. In this display mode, the only indication that the message is owned is a flag in the own-state column in the message browsers.

Evaluating Action Results in the Corrective Actions Workspace

To maintain a current and accurate overview of the computing environment, you need to know the status and results of actions. The **status** of an action is defined as the availability and current state of the action.

The status indicates whether an action:

- Has been configured for the message
- Is still running

- · Has been successfully completed
- Failed

Reviewing action availability is part of your initial investigation of problems. You review the message browsers and the Message Properties window to determine the availability of automatic or operatorinitiated actions. The value beneath the Flags field in the message browser displays the availability and state of the action.

Evaluating the results of actions is essential to problem-solving because corrective actions are not always successful. They do not always solve the problem.

Use the following guidelines to check the result of an action:

Review Annotations

Review the annotations of the message. If configured to do so, HPOM automatically writes the stdout and stderr actions as annotations for automatic and operator-initiated actions.

Review Object Status

Broadcast a script or command by using the Broadcast tool, to review the status of the object. In the Broadcast Output window, you can review the results.

Reviewing and Rerunning Automatic Actions

The HPOM administrator can configure automatic actions for a message. These actions are started automatically as soon as the event is detected.

Reviewing Automatic Actions

You can review the automatic action of a message either by checking the status column in a message browser or by opening the Message Properties window. For details, see "Message Browser" on page 35 and "Examining Message Attributes" on page 78.

After an automatic action has completed, you can review the results to ensure that the problem has been corrected. If the HPOM administrator has configured annotations for the message, you can review the results of an automatic action by reading these annotations. The stdout and stderr actions are logged as annotations with the message. If the problem still exists, or if the automatic action was not successful, you can rerun the action.

Rerunning Automatic Actions

You rerun an automatic action by doing one of the following:

Menu Bar

Select the message in the message browser and then select Actions: Messages > Perform/Stop Action > Perform Automatic Action from the menu bar.

• Pop-up Menu

Right-click the message in the message browser and then choose **Perform/Stop Action > Perform Automatic Action** from the pop-up menu.

Reviewing Annotations to Automatic Actions

The HPOM administrator evaluates the effectiveness of actions by reviewing annotations and then decides whether additional or different automatic actions should be configured. For more information about creating message annotations, see "Annotating Messages " on page 99.

Configuring Automatic Acknowledgements

Your HPOM administrator can configure an automatic acknowledgment of automatic actions that execute successfully. If HPOM is so configured, the message associated with the action is automatically moved to the history database after the action completes.

Starting and Reviewing Operator-initiated Actions

The HPOM administrator configures operator-initiated actions for messages where automatic actions are not suitable. For example, actions or programs requiring too much CPU should not be started without first evaluating system load factors and requirements. For these types of actions, your intervention and control are necessary.

Starting Operator-initiated Actions

You start an operator-initiated action by doing one of the following:

Menu Bar

Select the message in the message browser and then select Actions: Messages > Perform/Stop Action > Perform Operator-initiated Action from the menu bar.

Pop-up Menu

Right-click the message in the message browser and then choose **Perform/Stop Action > Perform Operator-initiated Action** from the pop-up menu.

Reviewing Operator-initiated Actions

You can review the operator-initiated action of a message either by checking the status column in a message browser or by opening the Message Properties window. For details, see "Examining Message Attributes" on page 78.

After an operator-initiated action has completed, you can review the results to ensure that the problem has been corrected. If the HPOM administrator has configured annotations for the message, you can review the results of an operator-initiated action by reading these annotations. The stdout and stderr

actions are logged as annotations with the message. If the problem still exists, or if the operatorinitiated action was not successful, you can rerun the action.

Reviewing Annotations to Operator-initiated Actions

The HPOM administrator evaluates the effectiveness of operator-initiated actions by reviewing annotations and determines whether additional or different operator-initiated actions should be configured.

Reading Operator Instructions

To help you solve a problem, the HPOM administrator can provide you with instructions for a message, as shown in the following figure.

Describe Automatic Action

Describe Operator-initiated Action

Provide details of how you should perform an operator-initiated action. For details, see "Starting and Reviewing Operator-initiated Actions" on the previous page.

Describe Steps

Describe any manual steps required for solving a problem (for example, "Start Tool X").

In the attribute column I of the message browser, you see an X for each message with written instructions.

The HPOM administrator can also use the instructions interface to call an external tool to present you with a message. The way you view these messages varies, depending on the external tool used by the HPOM administrator. The tool may use either one of its own windows or a window in the Java GUI.

Starting and Customizing Tools

Applications (tools) are scripts or programs that have been integrated into HPOM. The HPOM administrator first examines your environment and then determines which tools you need to maintain it. Each tool has predefined start-up attributes, including a list of the managed nodes for individual operators.

Applications (tools) can also be programs or services running in the environment (for example, the UNIX 1p print spooler program). You could be responsible for controlling the status of the 1p spooler and its peripherals. To maintain the print services, you respond to messages issued by the 1p spooler, and send controlling commands, such as enable. Controlling programs within your environment means that you can access the correct commands and the user log-on capabilities.

Starting Tools

As an operator, you can start tools to resolve unsuccessful automatic or operator-initiated actions, or messages for which an action has not been configured.

You should have a thorough understanding of the event and message before starting a tool to resolve a problem.

Note: To start tools with no graphical interface, such as cmd.exe or telnet, as local tools in Java GUI, the start-up parameters must be properly configured by HPOM administrator when assigning Java GUI operator defaults. For more information, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

You can start tools from one of three locations:

Shortcut Bar

You can start tools from nodes, tools, and services in the shortcut bar. For instructions, see "Starting Tools" on page 162.

Object Pane

You can start tools from nodes, tools, and services in the object pane. For instructions, see "Starting Tools" on page 162.

Message Browser


You can start tools from pop-up menus on messages in the message browser. For instructions, see "Starting Tools" on page 162.

Note: If Service Navigator is installed, tools can also be started on services. This includes general tools that are available in HPOM as well as service-specific tools that have been set up especially for services. For instructions, see "Starting a Tool from a Service" on page 261.

Displaying Frequently Used Tools

Tools that you use frequently are displayed in pop-up menus for starting tools above the separator line, so that you can easily access these tools. This line is visible in all looks and feels except HP one voice, because of its white background. The following figure shows how frequently used tools are visually distinguished from other tools in the Windows look and feel.

The number of tools separated in this way can be set in the General tab of the Preferences dialog box. For more information, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336. For details about the itooprc parameter used for setting this number, see "itooprc Resource File" on page 375.



Customizing Tools

If the HPOM administrator has set up the correct permissions, you can change many of the start-up attributes of a tool by using the Start Customized Tool wizard, as shown in the following figure.

For example, you can change the nodes on which a tool is started, the user name, or additional call parameters. The only item that cannot be changed is the application call itself. To find out how you can use message variables to pass parts of the message as parameters to the application call, see "Adding HPOM Variables" on the next page.

Operating with the Java GUI from Other Java Applications

You can control certain features in the Java GUI remotely from other Java applications by using the Java GUI Remote APIs. The features can be controlled from the following:

- An independent application that runs separately from the Java GUI on a localhost.
- A Java applet that runs as an integrated add-on component in the workspace of the Java GUI.

Using Java GUI Remote APIs is useful in cases when you have HPOM services or nodes mapped in other Java applets or applications. The possibility to operate with specific configurations remotely from other Java applications enables you to identify and resolve problems without searching for problem causing elements directly in the Java GUI.

When the Java GUI Remote APIs are enabled, an additional icon is displayed in the Java GUI, as presented in the following figure:

Adding HPOM Variables

All message attributes, including custom message attributes, are variables that can be used in applications (tools) and are exchanged for their values at tool launch time. For example, you can write tools that depend on specific attributes. Then the attributes are given as parameters to the tool.

Broadcasting Commands

You can start corrective actions simultaneously on multiple nodes by broadcasting a command. You specify the command you want to broadcast, and select the nodes within your environment on which you want to start the command. You can also use this capability to investigate problems (for example, by issuing the ps -ef command to all specified nodes to check the number of currently running processes).

Starting the Broadcast tool always starts the wizard.

Note: The Broadcast tool may not be available to you by default. The HPOM administrator may need to assign it to you specifically.

When you broadcast a command, you specify the command once. The command is then sent to multiple nodes to help you to perform global tasks quickly and easily. Although HPOM does not limit the length of the command to be broadcast, if the command is longer than the maximum length supported on the target system, the target system will truncate it.

The following figure shows the last step in completing the broadcast command wizard.

Documenting Solutions in Your Environment

After you have completed work on a message, you document your efforts and remove the message from the active message browser, filtered active message browser, or filtered pending messages browser. To do this, you use message annotations to record how a problem was resolved, and then acknowledge the message to remove it from the current work area, storing it in the history database.

Annotating Messages

Annotating a message is similar to adding a short note of explanation to a business contract. Message annotation quickly summarizes the important points of the message. It can serve as a reference the next time you receive the same message.

Annotations

Message annotations generally contain the following information:

- Action performed to resolve the problem
- Name of the user who started the action
- Status information of the action performed (stdout, stderr)
- Start and finish times for the action
- Any pre- and post-action information
- Any message attributes changed
- Any duplicates of the message found

Adding Annotations

You can also use annotations to record difficulties you encountered solving the problem, verbal or written instructions you received about the problem, communications sent to users or groups affected by the problem, and so on. For example, if you are at the end of your shift, but a particular problem is not yet resolved, you can leave an annotated message for your colleagues.

The Annotations tab in the Message Properties window contains all annotations related to a single message, as shown in the following figure.

Reviewing Annotations

Like a note of explanation, a message annotation serves as a resource for solving problems. You can review the message annotations for a record of previous actions used to solve the problem. This includes, for example, comparing previous action exit values with current ones, or reviewing cautions or warnings related to the proposed action. You can add your own annotations, or even delete them if they are no longer needed or correct.

The HPOM administrator can use message annotations as a record of events that describe resolution techniques, times, and resources. In addition, the HPOM administrator can use message annotations as a basis for developing instructional text and preconfigured actions for messages.

Printing Messages

HPOM enables you to print the following:

Messages

Exporting Messages

HPOM enables you to export selected messages, all messages in the message browser, details of selected messages, or details of all messages in the message browser.

Acknowledging Messages

Acknowledging a message is similar to filing (or storing) a bill after you have paid it. You want to retain a copy of the transaction to verify you have paid the bill, and as a reference to compare with future bills. After you have finished working with a message you "remove" it from your desktop and "file" it away for future reference.

Acknowledgements

Typically, you acknowledge a message for one of the following reasons:

Resolved Problems

You have finished work on the message and resolved all related problems.

Duplicate Messages

You have another message in your message browsers describing the same event.

Irrelevant Messages

You no longer need the message (for example, if the message has low severity and requires no action).

Acknowledging a message moves it from the active message browser, filtered active message browser, or filtered pending messages browser to the history database. Also, the status of the

corresponding message group and node may change depending on the highest priority of the remaining messages. To find out how to acknowledge and unacknowledge messages, see "Acknowledging Messages" on page 172.

Note: A problem is not resolved by acknowledging the message. You should review the results of your corrective actions to ensure that the problem has been resolved before acknowledging the message. For details, see "Solving Problems in Your Environment" on page 87.

Automatic Acknowledgments from the Administrator

The HPOM administrator can configure an automatic acknowledgment for messages with either automatic or operator-initiated actions. When the action for a message with an automatic action and an automatic acknowledgment is successfully completed, the message is sent directly to the history database. The message is removed from the message browsers, without your intervention. You can review automatically acknowledged messages by using the filtered history message browser.

Automatic Acknowledgments from HPOM

Messages can be acknowledged automatically by succeeding messages if HPOM establishes a relationship between them:

• Problem Deteriorating

Succeeding messages report a deterioration of the original problem (for example, the amount of free disk space has reduced even more).

Problem Solved

Original problem has been solved (for example, the tool is running again).

Reviewing Acknowledgments

Messages that have been acknowledged are stored in the history database. You can review these messages by using the filtered history message browser. For details, see "Investigating Message Histories" on page 85.

You can also move acknowledged messages back to the active message browser by unacknowledging them. After unacknowledging a message, you can continue working with it. To find out how to acknowledge and unacknowledge messages, see "Acknowledging Messages" on page 172.

Configuring Smart Card Authentication

Access to the Java GUI is allowed only to operators who possess a valid certificate.

For detailed information about configuring smart card authentication on HPOM, see the HPOM Administrator's Reference.

Changing Operator Passwords

HPOM enables you to change your log-on password from the Change Operator Password window, as shown in the following figure.

You can access this window from the File: Change Password in the menu bar. After the information is sent to the management server and updated in the database, you receive a system message confirming the password change.

Note: Only the password for the currently logged-on operator can be changed.

On the first logon as any of the default users, you must change your default password for security reasons. Although you can change your password again at a later time, you are not allowed to set the password back to default.

Loading the Default Configuration

The Java GUI comes with a standard set of defaults. These defaults are normally changed by your HPOM administrator. As a result, the first time you log on to the Java GUI, you receive a set of default components provided by your HPOM administrator.

As an operator, you can do one or both of the following:

Save Console Session Settings

If you customize the Java GUI (for example, adding URL shortcuts to the shortcut bar, moving panes or areas, adding filtered message browsers, detaching windows, and so on), you can save these changes by selecting **File: Save Console Session Settings** from the menu bar. The next time you log on to the Java GUI, you see these changes, which override the default configuration originally provided by your HPOM administrator. You can customize the Java GUI and save your changes as often as you like.

Reload Assigned Defaults


If you make a major mistake when customizing the Java GUI (for example, unintentionally deleting the browser pane), you can restore the defaults originally provided by your HPOM administrators by selecting **File: Reload Assigned Defaults** from the menu bar.

Caution: If you reload assigned defaults, you lose all the changes you made to the Java GUI and saved with the File: Save Console Session Settings option (that is, your changes are overwritten by the defaults originally assigned to you by your HPOM administrator).

The Reload Assigned Defaults option restores only the defaults originally provided by your HPOM administrator. The global settings are not restored.

Movable Panes

Shortcuts for every first-level node element

• Services (if there are any services available)

Shortcuts for every first-level service

Workspace Pane

In the workspace pane, the following non-ActiveX workspaces are created, in the following order:

a. Message Dashboard (default workspace)

In the Message Dashboard workspace, three message browser for all active messages are opened with the vertically tiled positions and the following content types:

- History chart (stacking area)
- Bar chart (3D)
- Pie chart (3D)
- b. Services (if any services are available)

In the Services workspace, a service graph for all first-level services is opened. For details, see "Services Workspace" on page 30.

c. Diagnostic Dashboard

In the Diagnostic Dashboard workspace, other tools that integrate with HPOM are displayed. For details, see "Diagnostic Dashboard Workspace" on page 31.

d. Corrective Actions

In the Corrective Actions workspace, you can maintain a current and accurate overview of the computing environment by reviewing the status and results of actions. For details, see "Corrective Actions Workspace" on page 31.

Browser Pane

In the browser pane, a message browser is opened, displaying the latest 50 of all active messages the operator is responsible for. For details, see "Browser Pane" on page 34.

By default, the movable pane is disabled. For details, see "Message Dashboard Workspace" on page 30.

Operator Defaults Assigned by the HPOM Administrator

The HPOM administrator can define default start-up behaviors for operator areas of the Java GUI with two application groups:

Shortcuts

The HPOM administrator can create new application groups that are added individually at the end of the shortcut bar. These application groups can contain any kind of tool. The same tree level found under the shortcuts application group is added to the shortcut bar, as shown in "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

The following figure shows an example of the Online Help shortcut group and the HPOM Java GUI shortcut, which were added to the shortcut bar as defaults by the HPOM administrator on the management server. The following figure shows this example displayed within the HPOM Java GUI window.

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
Workspaces

The HPOM administrator can create new application groups that are added individually after existing default workspaces in the workspace pane. These application groups can contain any kind of tool. All tools found in the second level of the Workspaces application group are then started accordingly to the previously created workspace pane workspaces. All opened tools in the workspaces are tiled vertically.

Because the default container type for workspaces is *not* ActiveX, you *cannot* use a Microsoft Internet Explorer web browser in default workspaces. If you want to use Internet Explorer, you must create a new workspace with the ActiveX container type. For a description of each option on the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

To avoid duplication, HPOM does *not* add items that already exist on the level to which you try to add them. After the HPOM administrator adds new shortcuts and workspaces for tools, the tools under Shortcuts and Workspaces behave like any other tool in the object pane. The tools are always opened in the currently selected workspace.

The following figure shows an example of the Online Help workspace that presents the Java GUI online help introduction page. The following figure shows this example displayed within the HPOM Java GUI window.

Note: HPOM administrators can assign a set of shortcuts or workspaces to an individual operator, a group of operators, or all operators.

Displaying a Specific Message after Logging on to the Java GUI

When you launch the Java GUI and want a message with a specific message ID to be displayed immediately after logon, you can apply a filter so that only the message that matches the specified filter (that is, the message ID) is displayed.

Independent of whether you launch the Java GUI by using WebStart, as an applet, or from the console, use the following parameter:

gui.msgbrw.filter.msgid=<id>

In this instance, *<id>* is the message ID.

For example:

• When launching the Java GUI by using WebStart, use the following URL:

https://<management_server>:8444/OvCgi/ito_op_applet_ cgi.ovpl?webstart=true&user=opc_adm&passwd=opc_ adm&gui.msgbrw.filter.msgid=<id>

• When launching the Java GUI as an applet, use the following URL:

Changing the Refresh Interval

Choosing View: Refresh in the menu bar updates the node status, message group status, browser status summary line, all messages in the message browser, and the service status. By default, the Java GUI automatically refreshes at the preset interval of 30 seconds. If you want, you can choose Edit: Preferences in the menu bar and modify this interval in the Preference window. However, if you make the refresh interval too a large, you may not be immediately informed of any status changes. For a description of each option on the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

Note: After the HPOM administrator performed any configuration updates, such as change of your responsibilities, managed nodes, or tools, Java GUI reflects the changes automatically. No actions are required to synchronize Java GUI after configuration changes.

Saving Console Settings

You can store any customizations you made in a Java GUI session by choosing File: Save Console Session Settings in the menu bar, as shown in the following figure.

The next time you start the Java GUI, the stored settings are read and restored in the Java GUI. For example, you could add a few URL shortcuts to the shortcut bar, reverse the positions of the shortcut bar and workspace pane, and add a few filtered message browsers to the browser pane. If you save these changes, they display the next time you log on to the Java GUI.

You can save the following console session settings:

Changing the Look and Feel of the Java GUI

You can change the look and feel of the Java GUI by choosing Edit: Preferences in the menu bar.

From the Preferences window, you can select one of the following look-and-feel options:

- Metal
- HP One Voice (default look)
- Windows (available only on Windows systems)
- Aqua (available only on Mac operating systems)

Customizing the Progress Window

You can change the image that appears inside of a progress window by placing an image named customImg.gif into your home directory.

The following figure shows the progress window. The progress window opens when HPOM performs tasks that take a long time to complete.



Note: HPOM resizes custom images to fit into the progress window.

Showing and Hiding the Position Controls

The position controls are the narrow band of horizontal bars near the top of the Java GUI that enable you to move the shortcut bar and the object pane horizontally. If you do not want to use the position controls, you can hide them by clearing View: Position Controls from the menu bar. Likewise, if the position controls are already hidden, you can make them visible again by selecting View: Position Controls from the menu bar.

The following figure shows how to enable the position controls from the menu bar.



Moving Panes and Areas

You can use the position controls to move the shortcut bar and the object pane horizontally, as shown in the following figure.


Showing and Hiding Panes and Areas

HPOM enables you to show or hide the following parts of the Java GUI:

- Shortcut bar
- Object pane
- Browser pane

If you want to hide the browser pane, simply remove all message browsers from the browser pane. You cannot hide the workspace pane.


The following figure shows how to enable the shortcut bar by selecting View: Shortcut Bar in the menu bar.

Customizing the Shortcut Bar

You can customize the shortcut bar as follows:

Switch the Shortcut Bar On and Off

Switch the shortcut bar on or off from the View menu in the menu bar.

Add Object Pane Items

Add selected object pane items to the shortcut bar by selecting **Add to Shortcuts** from the pop-up menu in the object pane.

Customize Shortcut Groups

Add, rename or delete shortcut groups from the pop-up menu in the shortcut bar.

Customize Shortcuts

Rename or delete shortcuts from the pop-up menu in the shortcut bar.

Customize Icon Size

Customize the size of the icons in the shortcut bar from the General tab of the Preferences window. For details, see "Customizing the Shortcut Bar" on page 182.

To start or customize a shortcut, right-click the shortcut icon and then select an item from the pop-up menu.

Choosing a Web Browser

Instead running an external web browser in the background, you can run your favorite web browser from within the HPOM Java GUI itself. As a result, you can access intranet sites, search the Internet for business-related information, and view your message browsers from within a single, integrated interface. Integrated web browsers display in the workspace pane of the HPOM Java GUI.

Specifying the Location of Windows dll Libraries

The Java GUI installation creates a new lib directory in the installation tree. This directory contains the OvEmbWebBrowser21.dll and OvEmbWebBrowser27.dll libraries. When the Java GUI is started as an application, the dll libraries are loaded from the lib directory.

When launching the Java GUI by using WebStart or as an applet, the dll_path parameter enables you to specify where the dll libraries will be extracted and loaded from.

For example:

- If the Java GUI is launched by using WebStart:
 - Standard connection:

If the dll_path parameter is not set or if the path is write-protected or invalid, the dll libraries are extracted to the default location and loaded from it (that is,

%OSDRIVE%\USERS\\AppData\Local\Temp).

Customizing the Toolbar

All toolbar components are visible, by default. You can hide or make visible any of them. For more information about the toolbar components, see "Toolbar" on page 44.

You can also reposition any of the toolbar components by creating a floating toolbar or by moving a component within the docked toolbar.

For more information on how to perform these actions, see "Customizing the Toolbar" on page 188.

Customizing Pop-up Menus

If you have selected messages in the message browser, you may want to focus exclusively on the tools that are related to those messages. A large number of unrelated tools can, at times, make the pop-up menu unwieldy.

HPOM enables you to limit the number of tools that display in pop-up menus. The Tailored Set of Tools limits pop-up menu items to tool that are related to currently selected messages. Related tools are defined with the \$OPC_MSG string in the application call. If there are no tools with currently selected \$OPC_MSG string, the pop-up menu does not contain any tools.

To enable tailored pop-up menus, you select **Tailored Set of Tools** from the General tab in the Preferences dialog box, as shown in the following figure. Likewise, to switch the feature off, you clear the check box.

You can enable or disable message event notification, run local tools (for example, to produce acoustic warnings), or reset the severity threshold for notification, from the Events tab of the Preferences window, as shown in the following figure.

You can set the general font size in the General tab of the Java GUI Edit: Preferences window.

Customizing Font Size in Service Graphs and Maps

You can set the default value of the font size in service graphs and maps in the Service Graph Font Size drop-down list Services tab of the Java GUI Edit: Preferences window.

Each time a new service graph or map is opened this value is used.

Disabling HPOM Communications Status dialog

You can enable, or disable the HPOM Communications Status dialog by selecting the **Show Communications Status Dialog** check box in the General tab of the Java GUI Edit: Preferences dialog box. Or by setting the itooprc file. "itooprc Resource File" on page 375. Disabling this dialog is useful in an environment with many clients logged in with the same user name at the same time. When one of these clients reloads the Java GUI configuration, the HPOM Communications Status dialog boxes are:

- displayed only on those clients where this option is enabled.
- refrained from disturbing the rest of the clients where this option is disabled locally.

Setting Up Message Browser Filters

Message browsers with message browser filters applied show only a subset of all available messages, filtered according to criteria you select yourself. For example, if you want to display messages with severity levels of Warning or Critical, you can specify that messages of all other severity levels are not loaded from the management server.

You can also set up message view filters to isolate specific messages in a message browser. Message view filters apply a second level of filtering to a browser that already has message browser filters applied. For more information about message view filters, see "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124

You can add new message browser filters and modify existing filters through the Filter Messages window, as shown in the following figure.

The Filter Messages window contains the following options:

• With Time Filter

The With Time filter is very useful for reviewing only those messages that arrive during a specific day or period of time. Time may be defined as absolute or relative to the time the browser settings are saved.

When using relative time filtering with enabled relative time recalculation, relative time filtering is done at a specified time interval. The active message browser is refreshed with new messages and drops the messages that become too old to satisfy the filter criteria. This behavior can be enabled by the administrator using the OPCUIWWW_FILTER_RELATIVE_TIME_RECALC server configuration variable. The relative time recalculation interval can be set by using the OPCUIWWW_FILTER_RELATIVE_TIME_INTERVAL server configuration variable. For more information about server configuration variables, see the *HPOM Server Configuration Variables* document.

Note: If the Java GUI is running on a system with a time zone setting different from the setting on the HP Operations management server, the time stamps in the messages displayed in the Java GUI are taken from the local system (the system where the Java GUI is running on) and not from the HP Operations management server. See also "ito_op.bat Options" on page 375.

• With Own States Filter

The With Own States filter may be used to see messages you own. It is not possible for the administrator to determine from the With Own States filter the identity of the owner of a given message.

• With Message Text Pattern Filter and With Pattern Filter

The message texts pattern filters (With Message Text Pattern and With Pattern) are used to see only messages that match a specified text pattern. You can specify a filter pattern in the Message Filters dialog box as follows:

- In the With Message Text Pattern field in the General tab.
- In the Name field of the Symbols and Objects tab. (The object type must be set to CMA and With Pattern must be selected.)

The syntax of the pattern in the Name field is the same as in the With Message Text Pattern field. The same limitations apply.

Control characters

If you use control characters such as angle brackets (<>) or square brackets ([]) in the With Message Text Pattern field, precede these characters with a backslash (\). Otherwise the following error message appears:

"Syntax error in pattern definition "[message". (OpC20-235)"

• Maximum of 254 characters

The message text pattern is limited to 254 characters.

Saving and Reusing Message Browser Filters

After you have configured a message browser filter, you can do one of the following:

Apply the Filter

You can apply the filter (after having provided a name). A filtered message browser opens, displaying only the messages that you want to see. The Filter Messages window remains open. If you are satisfied with your filter, you can save it for later reuse.

Save Filter Settings

Use the Filter Messages window to save the settings for reuse, as shown in the following figure. In this way, you can see the same or similar information at a later date without having to repeat the configuration process.

Reuse Filter Settings

Use the Browser Settings window to choose from a list of existing settings that may be modified and renamed to suit individual needs, as shown in the following figure. These settings are independent of your home session and browser layout. To access the Browser Settings window, select **Actions: Filtering > Use Saved Settings** from the menu bar, or open a saved filter of desired type from the object pane.

Note: You can use the Save Setting and the Browser Settings windows only to save or alter the settings of the window from which you opened them. In addition, if the respective "parent" browser window is closed, both windows are closed automatically.

The Browser Settings window allows you to select a saved filter. To use a setting for a new filtered active message browser, filtered history message browser, or filtered pending messages browser, select the desired setting in the list box first.

Saving Message Browser Filters to the Object Pane

HPOM enables you to access saved filters in the object pane. For example, if you want to see all messages that could show a possible problem in the Performance area, you would create a filter that shows all warnings, all minor, major, and critical messages, and all unknown messages with message group Performance. You would then save the new filter. Later, to see the messages in your new filter, you could select the filter from the object pane, and open a filtered message browser.

HPOM enables you to access message browser filters quickly and easily.

Setting Up Message View Filters

Message view filters temporarily hide messages from view. They consist of criteria and rules that define which of the already loaded messages are displayed in an already existing message browser.

The loaded messages may already have gone through a first level of filtering applied through message browser filters. In this case, message view filters apply a second level of filtering.

Rules and Criteria in Message View Filters

Message view filters consist of rules and criteria:

Rules

Rules in message view filters can contain one or more criteria. The rules define the relation between multiple criteria and rules. You can combine criteria and rules with a logical AND or OR. Each relation can be negated by using the NOT operator. Rules can be nested to create complex filters.

Criteria

Criteria define the search pattern of the filter. A criterion consists of a message browser column, an operator, and a value to match:

• Message browser column

A message browser column as input for the filter, for example, Application or Time Received.

• Operator

An operator such as equals (==) or begins (BEGINS). A wide range of operators is available to make your criteria as flexible as possible.

The list of available operators depends on the selected message browser column. For example, the begins operator is not appropriate for columns that contain numeric data. For a list of available operators, see "Operators for Message View Filters" on page 132.

• Value

A value, for example, jacko.deu.hp.com. You can define a value in the following ways:

- Type your own custom value.
- Choose a value from the list of available messages.
- Select a predefined value such as Management Server or Today. (Predefined values always appear in parentheses.) See also "Predefined Values for Message View Filters" on page 132.

In combination with the equals (==) operator, you can also use wildcard characters to match multiple strings:

• Question mark

A question mark (?) matches any single character.

Asterisk

An asterisk (*) matches any group of one or more characters.

Note: To match a question mark (?), an asterisk (*), or a backslash (\), precede these characters with a backslash (\). When writing message view filters in text format, enclose values that contain spaces in quotation marks (").

For more information about the syntax used in message view filters, see "Syntax for Message View Filters" on page 129.

Quick message view filters

Quick Message View Filters

The pop-up menu on the message browser headline offers quick access to filters that show only those messages that match the selected value of a column.

For example, in the following figure, the pop-up menu shows entries for the tools SNMPTraps and alarmgen, because the browser contains only messages generated by these tools. If SNMPTraps is selected, the set of visible messages changes, and the browser shows only messages that are generated by the SNMPTraps tool. Selecting alarmgen changes the message browser to additionally show messages generated by the tool alarmgen.

If you select more than one value for a single column, the message must match only one of these values (OR relation). If you apply quick filters to more than one message browser column, the messages must match all criteria (AND relation). The operator in a quick message view filter is always equals.

The following example shows a quick filter in text format:

```
"Application" == "SNMPTraps"
OR "Application" == "alarmgen"
```

This filter matches messages that are generated by the SNMPTraps or the alarmgen tool. Two criteria are combined by an OR rule. Each criterion consists of a message browser column (Application), an operator (==), and a value (SNMPTraps or alarmgen).

Simple Message View Filters

Simple message view filters are similar to quick message view filters, but are defined in a different way and offer more flexibility.

Simple message view filters have the following characteristics:

• Rules in simple message view filters

In simple message view filters, an OR rule combines criteria that filter the same message browser column. An AND rule combines criteria that filter different message browser columns. You cannot change the AND and OR operators in rules of simple filters.

You can, however, negate rules in simple message view filters by using the NOT operator.

· Operators in criteria of simple message view filters

For simple message view filters, you can choose among all available operators. (For quick message view filters, only the equals operator is allowed.)

Configuring simple message view filters

Use the Simple View tab of the Message View Filter window to define simple message view filters as shown in the following figure.

The following example shows a simple filter in text format:

```
NOT "Object" CONTAINS "opc"
AND (
   "Application" == "alarmgen"
   OR "Application" == "SNMPTraps"
)
```

This filter matches messages that are not associated with an object that contains the word opc, and that are generated by the SNMPTraps or the alarmgen tool.

The filter contains three rules:

- The first rule is a negative rule. It contains a criterion that uses the Object message column and the CONTAINS operator.
- The second rule is an AND rule. It combines the first rule with a third, nested rule.
- The third rule combines two criteria with the OR operator. Each criterion consists of a message browser column (Tool), an operator (==), and a value (SNMPTraps or alarmgen).

Advanced Message View Filters

Compared to quick and simple message view filters, advanced message view filters offer maximum flexibility. You can configure any criterion and any rule as needed, without any restrictions apart from the fact that the filter syntax must be correct. For more information about the filter syntax, see "Syntax for Message View Filters" on the next page.

The following figure shows the Advanced View tab of the Message View Filter window where you configure advanced message view filters. In the figure, a criterion is currently selected. When you select a rule, the lower half of the window changes so that you can change the logical operator of the rule or invert the rule, if needed.

The following example shows an advanced filter in text format:

The following example shows a complex message view filter:

The filter matches messages with the following characteristics:

- Severity is greater than or equals to minor (that is, minor, major, or critical).
- Message is owned by you, failed automatic actions, and has operator-initiated actions available. The unmatched, instructions, and annotations status must not be set.
- Message text does not begin with Memory.
- Message was received today or issued by a node from the hp.com network.

The message view filter syntax uses the following parameters:

filter

```
A filter is a rule.
```

rule

A rule can be negated with the NOT operator.

A rule can be enclosed in parentheses (). Parentheses define the precedence order. By default, AND takes precedence over OR.

Two or more rules (rule) can be related with a logical operator.

A rule can consist of a single criterion.

logical

The logical operators AND and OR.

criterion

A criterion consists of a column name (COLUMN_NAME), operator, and value (VALUE).

COLUMN_NAME

Message attribute or column ID key. For a list of available column names, see "Parameters for the itoopbrw File" on page 368.

operator

For a list of available operators for criteria in message view filters, see "Operators for criteria" on page 132.

VALUE

Any string value for message view filters. The following applies:

• Values with spaces

Enclose values that contain spaces in quotation marks (").

Predefined values

Predefined values are available for node and time-related values. For a list of predefined values, see "Predefined Values for Message View Filters" on the next page.

• Severity column

Reserved words for message severity are Unknown, Normal, Warning, Minor, Major, and Critical. The words are not case-sensitive.

• Number of duplicates column

Only positive integer and zero (0) values are allowed.

• Flags column

Seven characters (that is, one for each flag) are expected. The following values are allowed:

Flag	Valid Values
1 (State)	? - O M X R N
2 (Unmatched)	? - X
3 (Instructions)	? - X
4 (Automatic action)	? - X S F R
5 (Operator-initiated action)	? - X S F R
6 (Annotations)	? - X

The question mark (?) represents any value. The hyphen (-) means that the flag is not set.

Time and date columns

The valid time and date format depends on the locale used when launching the Java GUI.

Note: If you do not specify the locale when you launch the Java GUI, the system locale is set automatically to the locale of the system the Java GUI is running on. In the cases of the en_US and ja_JP locales, the date format is set to MM/DD/YY and YY/DD/MM respectively.

Operators for Message View Filters

There are two types of operators for message view filters:

Operators for criteria

The available criteria operators depend on the type of data displayed in the message browser column. There are operators for columns with numeric or string data.

The following operators are available:

Data Type	Operator	Keyword
String data only	begins with	BEGINS
	ends with	ENDS
	contains	CONTAINS
Numeric or string data	equals	==
	greater than	>
	greater than or equals	>=
	less than	<
	less than or equals	<=

Operators for rules

The following operators are available for rules:

AND

Logical operator AND (logical conjunction).

• OR

Logical operator OR (logical disjunction).

• NOT

A rule can be inverted with the NOT operator. For example, if you want to find messages that do not begin with a certain character, use NOT "*<COLUMN_NAME>*" BEGINS "*<VALUE>*" or select the **NOT** check box in the Message View Filter window.

Predefined Values for Message View Filters

A number of predefined values for message view filters exist to help you make your filters more flexible

and reusable. Predefined values always come first in the list of available values, and are enclosed in parentheses () to help you identify them as predefined values.

Time values are relative values. They are resolved on the Java GUI client system based on the locale and time zone that is set on that system. This means that the data resulting from applied message view filters may be different for users in different regions.

The only valid operator for predefined time values is the equals (==) operator.

The following table lists the predefined values that can be used in message view filters.

Node values	(Management Server)	"MGMTSV"	Fully qualified domain name (FQDN) of the management server system.

Saving Message View Filters

You can save message view filters in the following ways:

Console session settings

When you save your console settings, any message view filters that are currently applied to message browsers are also saved. The next time you start the Java GUI, your message browsers automatically have the message view filters applied.

To save your console settings, select File: Save Console Session Settings from the menu bar.

Message browser layout

When you save a customized message browser layout, any currently applied message view filter is also saved to the *itoopbrw* file. The next time you open a browser with a saved layout, the message view filter is automatically applied to the browser.

To save your message browser layout, select **View: Save Message Browser Layout** from the menu bar.

Named message view filters

If you find that you use the same message view filters during several Java GUI sessions, you may want to save the filters for future use. Named message view filters are stored independently of the console settings and the browser layout so that you can later load and apply them to a message browser.

HPOM distinguishes global and personal named message view filters:

. Global message view filters


Global message view filters are stored by the HPOM administrator on the management server. Operators can load global filters for their personal use, but cannot create or save them.

. Personal message view filters

Personal message view filters are available only to the operator who created them. They are also stored on the management server system, but in user-specific locations.

You can access and apply named message view filters by loading them into the Message View Filter window or by selecting them in the object pane as shown in the following figure.

Note: A named message view filter currently cannot be applied to history or pending message browsers from the object pane.

Adding Message Browser Tabs in the Browser Pane

When you open a filtered message browser, it is automatically displayed in the workspace pane. To move the filtered message browser from the workspace pane to the browser pane, you need to click the **Put Message Browser to Browser Pane** toolbar button ("Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286). After it is in the browser pane, the browser can be moved back to the workspace pane by using the same toolbar button.

Switching Message Colors to an Entire Line

To toggle between the default and colorized modes, choose **Edit: Preferences...** from the menu bar. Then, in the General tab of the Preferences window, select or clear the **Colored Lines** check box, and then click **OK**. For instructions, see "Customizing the Color Preferences for the Message Browser" on page 209. For a description of each option on the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

The preferences are saved on the computer where the Java GUI is running. The preferences are also saved to all Java GUIs running on that client. If you start another Java GUI on another client, the settings previously saved on that other client are used. If you want, you can change the settings on that other client as well.

Customizing the Message Browser Columns

HPOM enables you to change the physical layout of browser columns:

Resize Columns

Resize them by dragging the column borders to the left or right.

Reorder Columns

Reorder the columns by dragging the column labels.

Show or Hide Columns

Show or hide columns by choosing in the Customize Browser Columns window which message attributes to show or hide. For details, see "Showing and Hiding Message Browser Columns" on the next page.

Customize Column Labels


Specify new labels for message browser columns in the Customize Browser Columns window. For details, see "Customize Message Browser Columns Dialog Box" on page 316.

Align the Column Content

Align the column content by using a pop-up menu in the message browser opened on the message browser headline. Alignment can be set to left, right, or center.

These settings can be saved for future sessions by using the Save Message Browser Layout item of the View or pop-up menus.

Showing and Hiding Message Browser Columns

You can configure HPOM to display only a subset of all available message attributes in the message browsers. This also applies to custom message attributes. This is done in the Customize Browser Columns window.

To access this window, choose **Customize Message Browser Columns** from the View menu in the Java GUI or right-click the message browser headline and select **Customize Message Browser Columns...** from the pop-up menu.

The Customize Browser Columns window contains two tabs:

General tab

List of general message attributes. For details, see "Customize Message Browser Columns Dialog Box" on page 316. The following figure shows the General tab for displaying default columns in the Customize Browser Columns window. The selected items are displayed in the current message browser with the specified label or ID (if there is no label).

Custom tab

Customized message attributes. For details, see "Customize Message Browser Columns Dialog Box" on page 316. The following figure shows the Custom tab for displaying custom message attributes as columns in the Customize Browser Columns window.

The Custom tab has three sections:

• Available Custom Message Attributes

Attributes already defined in the database.

- Predicted Custom Message Attributes Attributes you expect to be present in the future.
- New Predicted Custom Message Attribute New operator-defined attributes.

From either of these tabs, you can configure to display the message attributes for the current message browser. After you press **OK**, this configuration applies only to the current (active) message browser.

Saving the Customized Message Browser Layout

To save the browser layout for opened message browsers, use the Save Browser Layout option for every particular type of the browser:

Filtered Browsers

Matches the filter name for filtered message browsers. The saved layout applies only to the named message browser. You cannot globalize to other named message browsers.

Default Browsers

Matches the type for default message browsers:

- Filtered active messages browser
- Filtered history message browser
- Filtered pending messages browser

Operating with the Java GUI with Speech Assistance

You can operate the Java GUI by using JAWS (Job Access With Speech). JAWS is a screen reader program that enables visually impaired users to read the screen either with a text-to-speech output or by a Refreshable Braille display.

To take advantage of speech assistance during your work with the Java GUI, you must have, in addition to JAWS, the JAB (Java Access Bridge) software installed. Enable JAB as described on the official Oracle web site.

Reading the Content of Charts in Message Dashboard

Charts in message dashboard are not accompanied with the speech output when you hover over them. JAWS reads only the type of the chart you select, for example, History Chart or Current State Chart. You can read the content of these charts in one of the following ways:

- by using the option Show Chart Values available from the right-click menu of the chart
- by selecting the chart and choosing View>Message Browser>Current State Chart(History Chart)
 >Show Chart Values

You can read the content of the displayed window line by line, up to eight lines. If there are more than eight lines, the scroll bar appears. The values that are read are current, and if the content of the chart has changed over the period of time (for example, in the History Chart), all parameters from the specified time frame are read respectively. These parameters change with the refresh intervals, so you must repeat the reading to receive the newest results.

Note: While reading, the focus is on the OK button. To change focus to the text area, use the Tab button. You can also read these values by using the keyboard navigation. To close the window click **OK** or hit the **Esc** on your keyboard.

Using Global Java GUI Property Files

When you customize the Java GUI, your changes are stored in property files, which reside in your home directory. The next time you start the Java GUI, your property files are evaluated and your customized settings are loaded. Customizations are stored in the following property files:

Console settings

Changes to the console settings are stored in the file HP_OV_consoleSettings_<server_name>_<user>. See also "Saving Console Settings" on page 110.

Preferences window

Changes made in the Preferences window are stored in the Java GUI resource file itooprc. See "itooprc Resource File" on page 375.

Browser settings

Changes made to the message browsers are stored in the browser settings file itoopbrw. See "itoopbrw File" on page 367.

Note: You can use the HTTP or HTTPS protocol when specifying the location of global property files.

The administrator can configure a global mode for Java GUI clients so that local property files are ignored in favor of global settings. The global property files reside in a shared location under administrator control.

With global mode enabled, you are not able to save your customizations. Instead, a message is displayed informing you about global mode being enabled. Only the administrator and, if configured, selected operators are allowed to continue saving and using their local settings.

When the global property files change in the shared location, HPOM displays a message and requests a restart of Java GUI.

For more information about enabling global property files, see the HPOM Administrator's Reference.

Secure HTTPS Communication

This section describes how to secure the communication between the Java GUI and the management server by setting up an HTTPS-based Java GUI.

Instructions on how to install and enable the HTTPS-based Java GUI, as well as how to disable the non-secure communication between the Java GUI client and the HP Operations management server, are detailed in the HPOM Installation Guide for the Management Server.

HTTPS-Based Java GUI Architecture

The standard Java GUI supplied with HPOM 8 has no secured link to the management server. This functionality is provided with the HTTPS-based Java GUI, that is the Java GUI which uses a HTTPS protocol with Secure Socket Layer (SSL) encryption for communication with HP Operations management server. The SSL encryption is based on the Core functionality components.

The HTTPS protocol acts as a guardian for applications (tools), gauging which incoming communication requests are trustworthy for secure exchange of data. For details on how the secure communication is established, see "Establishing Secure Communication" on the next page.

The HTTPS functionality provides three prerequisites for network security:

- Secrecy
- Data integrity
- Authentication

After a user logs on to the HTTPS-based Java GUI, the communication using the HTTPS protocol is initiated between the client and the management server, based on the authentication of certificates. For more information about the certificates, see "Certificates" on page 143.

The implementation of HTTPS-based communication also secures Service Navigator requests. The HTTPS protocol establishes a secure link between the HPOM Java-based operator client and the HP Operations management server.

Establishing Secure Communication

The process of establishing a secure communication is as follows:


Java GUI client connects to the opcuihttps process, which acts as a proxy between the Java GUI client and the HP Operations management server using the HTTPS protocol. For information about how to configure opcuihttps settings and the HTTPS-based Java GUI connection through firewalls, as well as for a list of parameters related to the HTTPS-based Java GUI, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

The Java GUI communicates with the opcuihttps process using a secure HTTPS protocol on the port 35211. As an outbound-only variant, it is possible to connect to opcuihttps through the BBC port 383 (refer to the *HPOM Administrator's Reference* guide for information on how to configure this connection.) The opcuihttps process then redirects the HTTPS requests to the standard Java GUI port (2531) using socket communication. All forwarded HTTPS requests are then handled by the inetd (on UNIX) and xinetd (on Linux) process, as well as the requests from non-secure Java GUI clients.

The opcuinttps process also processes replies from the HP Operations management server and mediates them to the Java GUI using the HTTPS protocol.

This way all communication requests, from the Java GUI to the HP Operations management server and the other way round, become trustworthy for secure exchange of data.

The following figure shows the client-server communication.



* inetd on UNIX and xinetd on Linux.

Authentication Process

The authentication process which ensure establishing a secure communication has four steps:

1. Operator logs on.

The operator enters a user name and a password at logon.

For the logon to work, a certificate does not need be installed on the HTTPS-based Java GUI client. For details, see "Certificates" on the next page.

2. Certificate is generated.

If the Java GUI contacts the management server for the first time, a server certificate is generated.

The management server then sends the certificate to authenticate itself to the Java GUI client.

Note: If you choose to use the server certificate for more than a current session, it gets stored in the local Certificate Store. This certificate will then be used for each subsequent connection between Java GUI and the management server.

3. Client identifies the server.

Based on the certificate it has received from the management server, the client identifies the management server.

If you use a full authentication mode, the client also authenticates itself with the client certificate. This way the higher level of security is achieved. For more information about the authentication modes, see "Certificates" below.

4. Communication channel is opened.

If the authentication is successful, a communication channel is opened.

Note: If HTTPS-based communication between Java GUI and the HP Operations management server fails to establish, you are prompted to use a non-secure communication type. If you press **Cancel**, the log-on window is displayed.

If you set the https_only parameter in the ito_op start-up script to yes, you are not prompted to use a non-secure communication. For more information about the start-up parameters for the HTTPS-based communication, see the "Configuring HTTPS-based Communication on the Java GUI Client" on page 210.

The Java GUI indicates the chosen communication type:

• HTTPS-based communication

If you use the HTTPS-based Java GUI communication, a *closed* padlock icon appears on the log-on window and on the status bar.

Standard communication

If you use the standard HTTPS Java GUI communication, an open padlock icon appears in the GUI.

Certificates

The HTTPS-based Java GUI provides network security through the exchange and authentication of electronic **certificates** between client and server. A certificate is a way of endorsing a public key, and includes, in an encrypted format, the user name and public key of the sender.

Certificates are signed with the private key of the trusted **Certification Authority** (CA) who issued it. The CA then appends its public key to the certificate, which means that it can be verified by the person receiving it.

Authentication Modes

The SSL encryption is provided for the following authentication modes:

Server authentication

This is the default authentication mode, where only server certificates are required. It is possible to connect to an HP Operations management server from an anonymous Java GUI client.

• Full authentication

The full authentication mode requires that client certificates are installed on the client systems.

Note: When the full authentication mode is enabled, launching the Java GUI by using WebStart may not be possible.

For details about providing certificates for both authentication modes, see "Providing Certificates" on page 212.

Detecting Problems with HPOM

Viewing a Message Node Manually

In the managed environment, nodes are displayed hierarchically in two locations:

Shortcut Bar

To view nodes in the shortcut bar, click the **Nodes** bar. For an overview of the shortcut bar, see "Shortcut Bar" on page 20.

Object Pane

To view nodes in the object pane, click the **PLUS SIGN (+)** next to the Nodes or Node Layout Group icon. For an overview of the object pane, see "Object Pane" on page 21.

Viewing a Message Node Automatically

When you detected a problem, you can automatically highlight the affected node in the object pane.

To access a message node automatically, follow these steps:

- In the message browser, select the message you have investigated. For details, see "Message Browser" on page 35.
- 2. Right-click the message, and then select Select Node in Object Pane from the pop-up menu.

Right-clicking **Select Node in Object Pane** highlights the node or nodes in the object pane. You can now start tools on that node.

Searching the Object Pane

You can search for a specific item in the object pane by using the basic search function or the advanced search function. For an overview of the search function, see "Searching the Object Pane" on page 68.

To search for a specific item in the object pane, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Find... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the Find dialog box, enter your search criteria.

For descriptions of options in the Find dialog box, see "Find Dialog Box" on page 323.

Note: You can search for whole worlds only, matching case, or both. When the search function finds a specific item, the item is highlighted in the object pane. If the item is not visible because the object tree is collapsed, the tree is expanded, and the item is scrolled into the visible area of the object pane. Normally, the search starts from the top of the object tree. However, if you start a search while an item is already highlighted, the search starts from the

selected item.

3. Click Find Next.

The basic search enables you to search the entire object pane.

Viewing Message Event Notifications

Message event notification keeps you informed about new messages with high severity. This notification is especially helpful if you have many windows opened at the same time, or if there are a lot of new messages with low severity coming in. For an overview of message event notification, see "Message Event Notification" on page 69.

When a message event notification dialog box opens, you can choose one of the following two options:

Show Message Browser

Opens the associated message browser to show the message with high severity. If the message is associated with more than one message browser (for example, because they use the same filter), only one message browser is displayed.

Close

Closes the message event notification dialog box.

Note: You can enable or disable message event notification, or reset the severity threshold for notification, from the Preferences dialog box. To find out how to configure message event notification, see "Configuring Message Event Notification" on page 189. For descriptions of options in the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

Viewing Messages

When you start the Java GUI, a message browser opens in the browser pane, and automatically displays the latest 50 active messages from the nodes assigned to you.

Note: For an overview of the message browser, see "Message Browser" on page 35. For an overview of the browser pane, see "Browser Pane" on page 34.

You can change the maximum number of messages displayed so that all messages are shown. For details, see "Changing the Number of Displayed Messages" on page 208. The default number of messages displayed is 50, but you can change it as needed.

To further narrow your view of the messages in the message browser, you can open filtered message browsers that display only messages matching your selected view filters. For details, see "Viewing Active Messages" on page 148.

Note: Use message view filters to quickly isolate specific messages in a message browser. Message view filters temporarily hide messages from view. To learn how to use message view filters, see "Working with Message View Filters" on page 195.

Viewing All Active Messages

To view all active messages, n the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering > All Active Messages.

A message browser opens in the workspace pane, displaying all active messages.

Note: To move the message browser from the workspace pane to the browser pane, click the **Move to Browser Pane** button on the toolbar. For details, see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286.

Viewing Selected Messages

You can open a message browser displaying only a selection of messages (for example, if you want to focus on messages from a particular node or message group).

Note: Viewing selected messages enables you to open a filtered message browser quickly. To open a filtered message browser with a different filter criteria, see "Viewing Active Messages" on the next page.

To view selected messages, follow these steps:

1. In the object pane, right-click a node, a message group, or a service.

For an overview of the object pane, see "Object Pane" on page 21.

A pop-up menu opens.

- 2. In the pop-up menu, select one of the following:
 - Filter Active Messages
 - Filter History Messages

In the workspace pane, a message browser opens displaying only messages generated from the selected node, message group, or service. Depending on which option you selected in the pop-up menu, the message browser shows either active or history messages.

For an overview of the workspace pane, see "Workspace Pane" on page 29.

Viewing Active Messages

You can save message browser settings so that you can apply the same filter when required.

Note: Viewing active messages enables you to open a filtered message browser with a different filter criteria. To open a filtered message browser quickly, see "Viewing Selected Messages" on the previous page.

To view filtered active messages, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering > New Active Filtered Browser.
- 2. In the Filter Messages dialog box, type a name for the filter.

For a description of each option in the Filter Messages dialog box, see "Filter Messages Dialog Box" on page 319.

- 3. Select the filtering criteria you want to apply.
- 4. Click OK.

A new filtered active message browser opens, displaying only the messages matching your selected criteria.

Viewing History Messages

To view filtered history messages, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering > New History Filtered Browser.
- 2. In the Filter Messages dialog box, type a name for the filter.

For a description of each option in the Filter Messages dialog box, see "Filter Messages Dialog Box" on page 319.

- 3. Select the filtering criteria you want to apply.
- 4. Click OK.

A new filtered history message browser opens, displaying only the messages matching your selected criteria.

Note: You can create a new history filter on a selected message. The menu item for creating a new history filter can be accessed in one of the following ways:

- By right-clicking the selected message (the pop-up menu).
- By selecting Actions: Messages from the menu bar.

Viewing Older Messages

The arrival of new messages can cause that the messages you are currently viewing become invisible in the message browser.

To make sure that the messages you currently work on remain visible in the message browser while new messages are arriving, lock the message browser by clicking the Lock check box placed at the bottom of the message browser, as shown in the following figure.

The locked message browser shows the changes in the messages that are already visible. It, however, does not display acknowledged messages and messages that arrived after you set the lock.

Moving the scroll slider unlocks the message browser. Changing sorting, clicking the column header, or scrolling inside the message browser with keys does not unlock it, thus allowing the navigation through messages while the message browser is locked.

In addition, appropriate information is displayed in a locked message browser status bar to indicate its status.

Viewing Pending Messages

Use the filtered pending messages browser to review and manage messages that arrive on the HP Operations management server outside defined service hours. For an overview of the filtered pending messages browser, see "Filtered Pending Messages Browser" on page 41.

To view filtered or unfiltered pending messages, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering > New Pending Filtered Browser.
- 2. In the Filter Messages dialog box, select all or specified pending messages:
 - All Pending Messages

Click **OK** to see all pending messages.

• Specified Pending Messages

To see only some pending messages, use the following tabs:

。 General

In the General tab, you can select messages received within a certain time frame, messages owned by selected parties, messages selected in the message browser, messages that do *not* match the selected criteria, messages with a selected severity level, and messages that match a specified text pattern.

• Symbols and Objects:

In the Symbols and Objects tab, you can select symbols and objects chosen from the message browser or the object pane.

• Pending Details:

In the Pending Details tab, you can select buffered messages with an expired buffer time frame and messages received within a certain time frame.

3. Click OK.

A new filtered pending messages browser opens, displaying only the messages that match your selected criteria.

Note: Messages in the pending messages browser are read-only. If you want to move a pending message directly to the history database, simply acknowledge it. If you want to work with a pending message, you must first unbuffer it to move it into the message browser.

Investigating Problems with HPOM

If HPOM detects a problem in your managed environment, you need to investigate the problem. Investigating Problems with the Message Browser

You can investigate problems with the message browser as follows:

Basic Information

You get basic information about a message by reviewing the message in the workspace pane or the browser pane. Only the most important information is shown. For details, see "Viewing Messages in the Message Browser" below.

You can modify and even forward the message to another operator or to the HPOM administrator. For details, see "Sending an HPOM Message to Another Operator" on the next page.

Detailed Information

You view detailed information about a message by reviewing the Message Properties dialog box where you can view all information associated with the message, including instructions, annotations, and any configured actions. For details, see "Viewing Detailed Message Information" on the next page.

Viewing Messages in the Message Browser

By default, the message browser headline displays the most important attributes of a message. For an overview of the message browser and its headline, see "Message Browser" on page 35. For a description of default elements in the message headline, see "Message Browser Headline" on page 348.

If you want, you can modify the message browser as follows:

Sort Messages

You can sort messages by date and time, or by the attribute (including the custom message attribute). For details, see "Changing the Layout of Browser Windows" on page 207.

Change Attributes

To send a message, follow these steps:

- 3. In your email program, paste the text into the body of a message, and then send the message to another operator or to the HPOM administrator.

Viewing Detailed Message Information

To view detailed message information, follow these steps:

1. Access the Message Properties dialog box.

In the browser pane, do one the following:

- Double-click the message.
- Select the message, and then, from the menu bar, select Actions: Messages > Properties.
- Right-click the message and use the pop-up menu.
- Select the message, and then, from the toolbar, click Show Properties. For details, see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286.

The Message Properties dialog box opens.

- 2. In the Message Properties dialog box, access options by clicking tabs, such as the following:
 - Original Message

May contain more information about the message itself.

• Instructions

May contain information about how to solve the problem.

3. Optional: Print the contents of the Message Properties window by clicking Print...

A print dialog opens where you can specify further options.

Modifying the Attributes of a Message

In some situations it may be useful to modify the attributes of a message (for example, if you want to give a message a higher severity or a more meaningful message text).

Note: You can modify message attributes only if your HPOM administrator has provided you with sufficient operator privileges.

To modify the attributes of a message, follow these steps:

- 1. In the message browser, select the message you want to modify.
- Right-click the message, and then select **Modify** from the pop-up menu. The Modify Message Attributes dialog box opens.
- 3. Modify the message severity or text.
- 4. Click OK.

Your changes are applied immediately to the message you selected. You now own the message.

Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard Workspace

You can view message severity in the Message Dashboard workspace of the workspace pane.

You can view message severity in one of the following two formats:

Current State Chart

Displays the severity of all messages in the currently selected message browser. For details, see "Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard" on page 82.

History Chart

Displays the severity changes over time of all messages in the currently selected message browser. For details, see "Viewing Message Severity in the Message Dashboard" on page 82.

You can switch between these two charts by using the Switch to Pie Chart (the current state chart) and the Switch to History Chart icons on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286). You can also open a new message browser with the same filter as the original browser from the message browser, current state chart, or history chart.

Investigating Message Histories

The history database contains all of your acknowledged messages (that is, all messages for which you have completed work). It can serve as a knowledge database in which you can search for previous solutions to problems. You access the history database by opening a filtered history message browser and reviewing the displayed messages.

Opening a filtered history message browser may take a long time to complete because history messages are retrieved from the database and not from the cache. During the download, the Java GUI cannot be used for other tasks. If you need to access the Java GUI while history messages are being downloaded, cancel the download and consider changing the filter criteria to better match the history messages you are interested in.

You can also limit the maximum number of messages displayed in a history message browser.

Accessing the History Database Quickly

To access the history database quickly, follow these steps:

- In the object pane, select the desired node, message group, or service.
 For an overview of the object pane, see "Object Pane" on page 21.
- 2. Open a filtered history message browser.

Right-click the message, and then select Filter History Messages from the pop-up menu.

A filtered history message browser opens, displaying only acknowledged messages from the selected node, message group, or service. By default, only messages generated the same day are displayed. If you want to see message generated on other days, you must specify a detailed filter.

Specifying a Detailed Filter

To specify a detailed filter, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering > New History Filtered Browser.
- 2. In the Filter Messages dialog box, select the filtering criteria you want to apply.

3. Click OK.

A filtered history message browser opens, displaying only the messages that match your selected criteria (see "Filtered History Message Browser" on page 40).

Changing Your Current View

- 2. In the Filter Messages dialog box, specify further criteria.

You can open as many different filtered message browsers as needed.

The filtered pending messages browser displays all messages that arrive on the HP Operations management server outside service hours. These messages remain on the management server until a defined unbuffer time is reached.

Owning Messages

Owning a message indicates to other operators that you have read a message and want to perform the actions associated with that message. When you assume ownership of a message, actions associated with the message are restricted to you. However, other users are still allowed to view the message.

The number of messages owned by you and owned by others is displayed in the color bar of the message browser.

To own a message, follow these steps:

- 1. In the workspace pane, select the message you want to work with (see "Workspace Pane" on page 29).
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - On the toolbar, click the Own button (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
 - Right-click the message, and then select **Own** from the pop-up menu.
 - From the menu bar, select **Actions: Messages > Own**.

Disowning Messages

Disowning a message indicates that you no longer want to work with that message. Only the owner or the HPOM administrator may disown a message.

To disown a message, follow these steps:

- 1. In the workspace pane, select the message you no longer want to work with (see "Workspace Pane" on page 29).
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - On the toolbar, click the **Disown** button (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
 - Right-click the message and then select **Disown** from the pop-up menu.
 - From the menu bar, select **Actions: Messages > Disown**.

Unbuffering a Pending Message

Before you can start working with a pending message, you must first unbuffer it.

To unbuffer a pending message, follow these steps:

- Open a filtered pending messages browser and select the message you want to unbuffer. For details, see "Viewing Messages" on page 146.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Right-click the message and then select **Unbuffer** from the pop-up menu.

- 5. If you decide that the configured action is appropriate, click **Perform** to initiate the action.

- Right-click the message, and then select **Perform/Stop Action > Perform Operator-Initiated Action** from the pop-up menu.
- Select the message, and then select Actions: Messages > Perform/Stop Action from the menu bar.

Note: If you started the action by mistake, or if the action seems to be pending, you can also stop it.

6. Check the annotation (if configured) for the output of the action.

You can perform operator-initiated actions as often as needed.



Starting a Tool from the Message Browser

HPOM enables you to start tools on a node from a pop-up menu in the message browser, as shown in the following figure. For example, if a critical message event arrives with the Error writing on disk. Disk might be full. message text from the abc.hp.com node, you must immediately investigate the disk space on this node. To investigate the disk space on the node, select the message

and launch the Disk Space tool from the pop-up menu. The tool is then started on the abc.hp.com node.

If you start a tool from multiple messages in the message browser, the tool takes the node attributes from all selected messages. If some selected messages have duplicate (identical) node attributes, the tool uses the node attributes only once, thereby preventing the tool from being started on the node more than once.

To start a tool from the message browser, follow these steps:

- 1. In the message browser, right-click a message.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, choose one of the following items:
 - Start > <Tool>

Starts the tool without further customization of this tool.

The following figure shows all operator-assigned actions as viewed from the Actions menu.

The list of available tools in the pop-up menu can be further reduced by selecting the **Tailored set of Tools** check box in the General tab of the Preferences dialog box.  - a. From the tool tree in Step 1 of 3, choose the tool you want to execute, and then click Next>.

A node list combination box is displayed. You can add selected nodes to this list.

c. Specify the command you want to execute.

Include any additional parameters, the user name, and the password (if necessary) under which to run the command.

If the command accepts node names or message IDs as an option, you can specify nodes in the Command field, (for example, -nodes \$OPC_NODES).

Possible variables are the following:

• \$OPC_NODES

Returns the names of all regular nodes that are selected at the time the tool is executed. The names are separated by spaces. The nodes need not be in the Node Bank.

o \$OPC_MSG_NODES

Returns the names of all nodes on which the events that generated currently selected messages took place. The names are separated by spaces. The nodes need not be in the

Node Bank. If the same message is selected in more than one of these browsers, the duplicate selections are ignored. Only nodes of messages currently selected in the top-most browser are returned.

o \$OPC_EXT_NODES

Returns the node pattern of all external nodes that are selected at the time the tool is executed. The names are separated by spaces.

o \$OPC_MSGIDS_ACT

Returns the Message IDs (UUIDs) of the messages currently selected in the Active/All and any Message Browser. If the same message is selected in more than one of these browsers, the duplicate selections is ignored.

SOPC_MSGIDS_HIST
 SOPC_MSGID
 SOPC_MSGID

Returns the Message IDs (UUIDs) of the messages currently selected in the History Message Browser.

o \$OPC_MSGIDS_PEND

Returns the Message IDs (UUIDs) of the messages currently selected in the Pending Messages Browser.

o \$OPC_ENV(env variable)

Returns the value of the environmental variable for the user who has started HPOM, (for example, PATH, NLS_LANG, EDITOR, SHELL, HOME, TERM).

• \$OPC_USER

Returns the name of the HPOM user who is currently logged on to the node.

Note: Do not use the \$AGENT_USER variable. Only the HPOM administrator can set this variable as a start-up attribute of a tool.

For more information, see the HPOM Administrator's Reference.

d. Click Finish> to exit the Customized Startup wizard, and then start the tool.

Broadcasting a Command

You can broadcast a command to one or more specified managed nodes to start a corrective action. You can also broadcast a command to investigate problems (for example, by issuing the ps -ef command to all specified nodes to check the number of current processes).

Note: The Broadcast command may not be available if it is not configured for you by the HPOM administrator.

To broadcast a command, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the managed node or nodes to which you want to broadcast the command.
- Right-click the managed node or nodes to which you want to broadcast a command, and then select Start > Broadcast from the pop-up menu.

The Start Customized Tool wizard opens, with Broadcast selected in Step 1 of 3.

- 3. Click Next>.
- 4. In Step 2 of 3, verify that the correct nodes are specified.

At this point, you can make corrections or enter additional nodes.

- 5. Click Next>.

- 7. Click Finish.

All outputs are displayed in a new workspace pane window.

 - Right-click the message you want to annotate, and then select Add Annotation from the popup menu.

- 3. In the Add Annotation dialog box, type the text for your annotation.

Your annotation is added to the message.

Note: You can read all annotations associated with a message by opening the Message Annotation dialog box. Clicking the **UP ARROW** displays the next annotation, and clicking the **DOWN ARROW** displays the previous annotation. You can also modify or delete annotations.

1. If needed, change the page setup by selecting File: Page Setup... from the menu bar.

The new setting is saved for the current session only.

 - Double-click the message in the message browser, and then click **Print**... in the Message Properties dialog box.
 - Select the message in the message browser, and then select **Actions: Messages > Print** from the main menu bar, and choose one of the following:
 - Selected Messages...
 - All Messages in Browser...
 - Details of Selected Messages...
 - Details of All Messages...
- 3. Right-click the selected messages in the message browser, and then select one of the following from the pop-up menu:

- Print > Selected Messages...
- Print > All Messages in Browser...
- Print > Details of Selected Messages...
- Print > Details of All Messages...

The Print dialog box opens where you can specify further options.

Printing Application Output

- If needed, change the page setup by selecting File: Page Setup... from the menu bar. The new setting is for the current session only.
- 2. Make sure that the application output window is active by clicking it.
- 3. Do one of the following:
 - Select File: Print... from the menu bar.

The Print dialog opens where you can specify further options.

Click the Print button on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
 The application output is printed directly to the default printer.

Exporting HPOM Messages

To export one or more messages or message details, follow these steps:

- 1. In the message browser, right-click one or more messages that you want to export.
- 2. Choose one of the following options:
 - From the pop-up menu, select **Export...** followed by one of the following options:
 - Selected Messages...
 - All Messages in Browser...
 - Details of Selected Messages...
 - Details of All Messages in Browser
 - From the menu bar, select Actions->Messages->Export... followed by one of the following options:
 - Selected Messages...
 - All Messages in Browser...
 - Details of Selected Messages...
 - Details of All Messages in Browser
 - From the menu bar, select **File->Export...**
- 3. In the Export... window, choose the location and the name of the file to which the message or the messages will be exported, and then click **Save**.

If you want to export only one message, you can also choose the following procedure:

- 1. Either right-click a message in the message browser, and then select **Properties**, or double-click a message in the message browser.
- 2. In the Message Properties window, click the **Export...** button.
- 3. In the Export... window, choose the location and the name of the file to which the message will be exported, and then click **Save**.

The file with the HPOM report is exported and saved, and you can open it by choosing the program you want to use from the list of the available programs.

Acknowledging Messages

When a message is resolved, you can acknowledge it from the message browser, and then move it to the history database. Later, if you want to work with the message again, you can unacknowledge it.

Note: The HPOM administrator can configure an automatic acknowledgment for messages with either automatic or operator-initiated actions. When the action is successfully completed for a message with an automatic action and an automatic acknowledgment, the message is sent directly to the history database. The message disappears from the message browser window,

without your intervention.

Similarly, messages can be acknowledged automatically by succeeding messages if HPOM establishes a relationship between them. The relationship could be that succeeding messages report a deterioration of the original problem (for example, the amount of free disk space has reduced even more). Or the relationship could be that the original problem has been solved (for example, the tool is running again).

Note: By default, the Java GUI acknowledges, unacknowledges, owns, and disowns messages. One message is acknowledged at a time by using the common message APIs. Acknowledging more messages at once could result in slowing the Java GUI and the entire system performance.

Acknowledging Selected Messages

To acknowledge selected messages, follow these steps:

1. In the message browser, select one or more messages you want to acknowledge.

For an overview of the message browser, see "Message Browser" on page 35.

- 2. Do one of the following:
 - From the menu bar, select Actions: Messages > Acknowledge.
 - On the toolbar, click the Acknowledge button (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
 - Right-click the selected messages in the message browser, and then select **Acknowledge** from the pop-up menu.

Acknowledging All Messages in the Current View

You can acknowledge every message for which you are responsible. If you have worked on all messages from node beans, you can acknowledge all messages in the current message browser. To do so, open a filtered message browser for all messages from the node beans, and then use the menu bar to acknowledge all messages in the current view.

To acknowledge all messages in the current view (for example, on a specific node), follow these steps:

- 1. In the object pane, select the node that you worked on.
- Right-click the selected node, and then select Filter Active Messages from the pop-up menu. The Filtered Active Messages browser opens with the active messages associated with that node.
- 3. Do one of the following:
 - From the menu bar, select Actions: Messages > Acknowledge All in Current View.
 - In the filtered message browser, select all messages. Then click the Acknowledge Selected Objects button on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
 - In the filtered message browser, select all messages. Then right-click the selected messages in the message browser, and select **Acknowledge** from the pop-up menu.

All messages are moved to the history database.

Unacknowledging a Message

Sometimes it is useful to unacknowledge a previously acknowledged message, so you can work with it again.

To unacknowledge a message, follow these steps:

- 1. Open the filtered history message browser.
- 2. Select the message you want to unacknowledge.
- 3. On the toolbar, click the **Unacknowledge** button (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286). You can also do one of the following:
 - From the menu bar, select **Actions: Messages > Unacknowledge**.
 - Click the Unacknowledge Selected Objects button on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
 - Right-click the selected messages in the message browser, and then select **Unacknowledge** from the pop-up menu.

The message is moved back to your active message browser, where you can work with the message again.

Sending Information Messages

In some situations it may be useful to send a message to other HPOM users, (for example to inform them of an unexpected system failure or to remind them of a planned outage). Similarly, the HPOM

administrator may send a message to you, (for example to ask you to reload your current configuration).

When you receive a message from another user, the HPOM Communication Status dialog box opens and displays the text of the message as well as the time when the message was created.

To send a message to other users, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, choose **File: Send Message to Operator(s)**. The Send Message to Operator (s) dialog box opens.
- 2. Under Message, type the text of the message to send.
- 3. Select the receiver of the message:
 - Send to All Operators sends the message to all currently logged on users.
 - Send to Selected Operators sends the message to the specified users only. If you want to specify more than one user, type the HPOM user names separated by commas (,).
- 4. Click OK.

The message is sent to the specified HPOM users and the dialog box is closed.

You can also use the opcwall command line tool to send a message to other HPOM users. For more information, see the *opcwall(1)* manual page.

Changing Your Operator Password

HPOM enables you to change your own operator password as often as you want.

Note: On the first logon as any of the default users, you must change your default password for security reasons. You can change your password again at a later time, but you will not be allowed to set the password back to default.

Note: You can change only your own operator password, not the passwords of other HPOM

operators. When you change your password, you must use it for all future HPOM sessions, or until you change it again.

To change your operator password, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, choose File: Change Password.
- 2. Under Old Password, type your current password.
- 3. Under New Password, type your new password.
- 4. Under Confirm New Password, type your new password again.

You receive a system message confirming your password change, as shown in the following figure.

Loading the Configuration

The first time you log on to the Java GUI, you receive a set of default components. HPOM administrators can change this configuration globally for all operators. As an operator, you can accept the latest default configuration by using the Reload Assigned Defaults option. For detailed information about the operator defaults assigned by the system or the HPOM administrator, as well as how to load the latest default configuration, see "Loading the Default Configuration" on page 104.

Reloading the Configuration

After your HPOM administrator performs configuration updates, such as the change of your responsibilities, managed nodes, or tools, the Java GUI reflects these configuration changes automatically because HPOM provides a synchronization mechanism between the server and the Java GUI during the configuration update. No actions are required to synchronize the Java GUI after the configuration changes and you can see the configuration changes in the Java GUI immediately.

However, in case of some configuration updates, such as the change of the filter definition or the change of services with the disabled Automatic Service Reload option, you need to reload your new configuration from the HP Operations management server. You do not need to log out of the Java GUI.

To reload the configuration, from the menu bar, select File: Reload Configuration.

If for any reason online configuration synchronization should be disabled, the OPCUIWWW_DISABLE_ ONLINE_CONFIG_SYNC server configuration variable must be set to TRUE (the default value is FALSE). Preventing configuration update notification messages from appearing in the Java GUI for online configuration synchronization is done by setting OPCUIWWW_DISABLE_ONLINE_CONFIG_SYNC to DISABLE_NOTIF_ONLY. Note that setting OPCUIWWW_DISABLE_NOTIF_ONLY_AUTO_RECONNECT to TRUE when OPCUIWWW_DISABLE_ONLINE_CONFIG_SYNC is set to DISABLE_NOTIF_ONLY results in the Java GUI reconnecting automatically after major configuration changes take place.

You can also refresh the message browser manually. For details, see "Refreshing the Java GUI Manually" below.

Refreshing the Java GUI Manually

The Java GUI automatically refreshes the node status, message group status, service status, browser status summary line, and all messages in the message browser at a preset interval. You may also refresh this information manually.

To refresh the message browser manually, do one of the following:

- From the menu bar, select View: Refresh.
- On the toolbar, click the **Refresh** button.

The number of messages refreshed depends on whether the Show All Messages icon or the Show Latest Messages icon is selected on the toolbar. For descriptions of icons on the toolbar, see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286

To find out how to change the browser refresh preset interval for the current session, see "Customizing the Refresh Interval" below. For descriptions of toolbar icons, see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286.

Customizing the Refresh Interval

Refreshing a browser updates the node status, message groups status, browser status summary line, all messages in the browser, and the service status (see "Message Attributes" on page 349). The HPOM Java GUI automatically refreshes at a preset interval. By default, this interval is set to 30 seconds.

To customize the refresh interval, follow these steps:

1. From the menu, select Edit: Preferences.

For a description of each option in the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

2. In the Refresh Interval field of the General tab, type the desired refresh interval in hours, minutes,

and seconds (hh:mm:ss).

Caution: If you set the refresh interval too high (for example, 24:00:00), you may not be informed of status changes in a timely manner.

3. Click OK.

The refresh interval is used only for retrieving the latest messages or service status. It does not update browsers with the Relative Time filter set on.

Note: After your HPOM administrator performs configuration updates, such as change of your responsibilities, managed nodes, or tools, the Java GUI reflects changes automatically. No actions are required to synchronize the Java GUI after configuration changes.

Customizing Console Settings

HPOM enables you to customize and save console settings. The next time you start the Java GUI, the stored settings are read and restored in the Java GUI.

Note: If the global mode is enabled, you may not be able to save your console settings.

To enable or disable the position controls, do the following:

- To disable the position controls, clear View: Position Controls from the menu bar.

Moving the Shortcut Bar or Object Pane

To move the shortcut bar or the object pane horizontally, drag the narrow band of horizontal bars immediately above the pane and drop it at the desired location.

To create a new workspace in the workspace pane, follow these steps:

- 3. In the Workspace Properties dialog box, type the name you want to appear under the workspace tab, a description of the workspace, and indicate whether the workspace is for an ActiveX control.

Changing Your Integrated Web Browser

By default, HPOM embeds a web browser in the workspace pane. You can change this default to your favorite web browser.

To change your integrated web browser, follow these steps:

1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.

The Preferences dialog box opens.

2. In the Preferences dialog box, click the Web Browser tab.

Note: If you want to change to an ActiveX control, you need to first create an ActiveX container in the workspace pane.

- 3. In the pane that appears when you click the Web Browser tab, select one of the following options:
 - Use external web browser

Click **Browse** to select an external web browser (for example, Mozilla) installed on your computer.

• Use ActiveX Internet Explorer control

Before you choose this option, you must create a workspace pane that is an ActiveX container. For details, see "Customizing Workspace Pane Workspaces" on page 185.

Note: The ActiveX Internet Explorer Control option is available on Windows systems only.

Customizing Pop-up Menus

HPOM enables you to limit the number of tools that appear in pop-up menus. The Tailored Set of Tools check box limits pop-up menu items to tools that are related to currently selected messages. Related tools are defined with the \$OPC_MSG string in the application call. If there are no tools with the currently selected \$OPC_MSG string, the pop-up menu does not contain any tools.

Enabling Tailored Pop-up Menus

To enable tailored pop-up menus, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the pane under General tab of the Preferences dialog box, select the Tailored Set of Tools check box.

Disabling Tailored Pop-up Menus

To disable tailored pop-up menus, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the pane under General tab of the Preferences dialog box, clear the Tailored Set of Tools check box.

Customizing the Toolbar

You can customize the toolbar in the following ways:

Hide or make visible any of the toolbar components

By default, all components of the toolbar are visible. You can hide any of them by clearing the option from the View: Main Toolbar menu, or from the toolbar pop-up menu. You can make any of the components visible again by reselecting these options.

Reposition the toolbar components

You can reposition the toolbar in the following ways:

Create a floating toolbar

You can create a floating toolbar from any of the components by pointing to the vertical bar on the left side of the toolbar and dragging it from the taskbar anywhere on the screen, even outside the Java GUI window. However, when you place any of the floating toolbar components back to the taskbar, it is automatically placed as the last toolbar component in the order.

. Move a component within the docked toolbar

You can move any of the toolbar components to another location on the taskbar by pointing to the vertical bar on the left side of the toolbar and dragging it to the left or right.

Configuring Message Event Notification

You can enable or disable message event notification, or reset the severity threshold for notification, from the Preferences dialog box.

To configure message event notification, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the Preferences dialog box, click the **Events** tab.
- In the pane opened with Events tab, modify your message event notification preferences.
 For descriptions of options under the Events tab of the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.
- 4. Click OK.

Note: To save your message event notification preferences for future sessions, select **File: Save Console Session Settings** from the menu bar.

Customizing the Font Size

When customizing the font size, you can either customize the general font size or the font size in service graphs and service maps.

Customizing the General Font Size

To set the general font size in the Java GUI, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the pane opened with General tab of the Preferences window, specify a value in the Application Font Size text field.
- 3. Click **OK**.

The changes take effect immediately.

Customizing the Font Size in Service Graphs and Service Maps

To set the font size in the Java GUI, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the pane opened with Services tab of the Preferences window, specify a value in the Service Graph Font Size drop-down list.
- 3. Click OK.

The changes take effect immediately.

Customizing the Display of the HPOM Communications Status Dialog Box

Java GUI clients check for changes to the global property files in the shared location. If a change is detected, the HPOM Communications Status dialog box displays a message that informs the operator of the changes and requests a restart of the Java GUI.

The Show Communications Status dialog option enables or disables the HPOM Communications Status dialog box from displaying. By default, this option is selected.

Disabling the HPOM Communications Status Dialog Box

To disable the display of the HPOM Communications Status dialog box, follow these steps:

- 1. Select Edit: Preferences... from the menu bar.
- 2. In the General pane of the Preferences dialog box, clear the Show Communications Status dialog check box.

Disabling this option is useful in an environment with many clients logged on with the same user name at the same time. When one of these clients reloads the Java GUI configuration, the HPOM Communications Status dialog boxes are displayed only on those clients where this option is enabled and refrained from disturbing the rest of the clients where this option is disabled locally.

HPOM enables you to set this option manually by adding the show_comm_status_dlg parameter option to the itooprc resource file. For more information, see "itooprc Resource File" on page 375

Detaching Windows

HPOM enables you to detach windows from the main Java GUI window, so that you can move them outside the main window (for example, to another monitor). You can detach message browsers, service

graphs, service submaps, and custom service maps.

Detaching a Window from the Main Java GUI Window

To detach a window from the main Java GUI window, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the window that you want to detach.
- 2. Select **View: Detach Window** from the main menu bar, or click the **Detach Window** icon in the main toolbar.

HPOM places the detached window at the center of your screen and adds a menu and a toolbar to the detached window.

Attaching a Detached Window to the Main Window

To attach a detached window to the main Java GUI window, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the workspace where you want to attach the window.
- 2. Select the detached window that you want to attach.
- 3. Select **View: Attach Window** from the menu bar of the detached window, or click the **Attach Window** icon on the toolbar of the detached window.

HPOM attaches the window to the currently selected workspace and removes the menu and toolbars from the window.

If you want to obtain more space within a detached window, you can hide the following window components:

- Menu or toolbar in detached windows
- Status summary area in detached message browsers
- Horizontal scroll bar in detached message browsers

Showing or Hiding the Menu or Toolbar in Detached Windows

To hide the menu or toolbar in detached windows, follow these steps:

1. Right-click the background of the toolbar of a detached window.

The toolbar pop-up menu opens.

2. Select the window component that you want to hide in the pop-up menu.

The selected window component disappears from the detached window.

To show a hidden component again, select the component on the toolbar pop-up menu.


Showing or Hiding the Status Summary Area in Message Browsers

To show or hide the status summary area in message browsers, follow these steps:

• To hide the status summary area in a detached message browser, click the **Hide Browser Status Summary** icon in the lower-right corner of the browser, or press **CTRL+SHIFT+S**.

The status summary area disappears from the message browser.

• To show the summary area again, press CTRL+SHIFT+S again.



Showing or Hiding the Horizontal Scroll Bar in Message Browsers

To show or hide the horizontal scroll bar in message browsers, follow these steps:

 To hide the horizontal scroll bar in a detached message browser, click the Hide Horizontal Scroll Bar icon in the message browser toolbar, or press CTRL+SHIFT+H.

The horizontal scroll bar disappears from the message browser.

• To show the scroll bar again, click the toolbar icon again, or press CTRL+SHIFT+H again.

Creating a Filtered Message Browser

HPOM enables you to create your own filtered active, history, and pending message browsers. You can then save and reuse the filters.

To create a filtered message browser, you can choose one of the following two methods:

Creating a New Filter

You can create a new filter in one of the following two ways:

. From the Menu Bar

In the menu bar, choose Actions: Filtering and one of the following:

- $_{\circ}~$ New Active Filtered Browser
- New History Filtered Browser
- New Pending Filtered Browser

Then define the new filter in the Filter Messages dialog box.

• From the Pop-up Menu

In the object tree, right-click Personal Filter Settings and then select Add New Filter from the pop-up menu. Then define the new filter in the Filter Messages dialog box.

This option is available for operators only. Administrators can only add new filters in the Global Filter Settings.

• Reusing an Existing Filter

To reuse an existing filter, follow these steps:

- a. Select Actions: Filtering > Use Saved Settings.
- b. Select an existing filter, rename the filter, and then update the filter.

Options for Displaying External Nodes in the Message Browser

When creating the browser filter in the Java GUI, the following options are available for displaying external nodes:

- To filter on external nodes in general, use the OPC: prefix.
- To filter on external nodes with an IP address match pattern, use the OPC: EA prefix.
- To filter on external nodes with an IP name match pattern, use the OPC: EN prefix.
- To filter on external nodes with a non-IP match pattern, use the OPC:EO prefix.

Saving the Browser Filter Settings

If you find that you use the same filtered active, history, or pending messages browsers during several HPOM sessions, you may want to save the browser filter settings for future use. By saving the browser filter settings, you avoid having to recreate the same filtered message browser each time you start the HPOM Java GUI.

Note: Saving browser filter settings saves only the filter used to view messages, not the layout of the browser columns.

If you want to save the size and layout of the message browser, see "Saving the Browser Layout" on page 205.

To save the browser filter settings, follow these steps:

- 1. From the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering, and then one of the following:
 - New Active Filtered Browser
 - New History Filtered Browser
 - New Pending Filtered Browser

The Filter Messages dialog box opens.

2. In the Filter Messages dialog box, select your filtering criteria.

For descriptions of options in the Filter Messages dialog box, see "Filter Messages Dialog Box" on page 319.

3. Click Save...

The Save Browser Settings dialog box opens.

4. In the Save Browser Settings dialog box, type a name for the filter.

Type a descriptive name, so you can easily identify the filter when you want to use it again.

5. Click OK.

Your browser settings are now saved.

Note: Your HPOM administrator may also save browser settings that are available to you. The type of these browser settings is global, so that they can be used by any HPOM operator.

To access filtered message browsers, select the Filter Settings group of a pop-up menu in one of two locations:

Shortcut Bar

Moving Filtered Message Browsers

When you open a filtered message browser, it is automatically displayed in the workspace pane. You can move the filtered message browser from the workspace pane to the browser pane, and vice versa.

Moving a Message Browser to the Browser Pane

To move a filtered message browser from the workspace pane to the browser pane, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the filtered message browser you want to move.
- Click Put Message Browser to Browser Pane on the toolbar (see "Toolbar Icons and Dropdown Lists" on page 286).

Moving a Message Browser to the Workspace Pane

To move the filtered message browser from the browser pane to the workspace pane, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the filtered message browser you want to move.
- 2. Click Put Message Browser to Workspace Pane on the toolbar.

Working with Message View Filters

Message view filters let you isolate specific messages in a message browser by applying filter criteria and rules to the browser. The browser displays only the messages that match the filter.

Note: When creating a message view filter, you do not need to provide the precise casing because the Java GUI supports a case-insensitive search.

Creating Quick Filters on Message Browser Columns

The pop-up menu in the message browser headline offers a quick and convenient way to find and work with a subset of messages in a message browser. See also "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124 for more information about this filter type.

Using quick filters on message browser columns:

- Right-click the label of the message browser column that you want to filter. A pop-up menu opens.
- 2. Select Message View Filter and the value from the column by which you want to filter.

Example:

To show all messages generated by the SNMPTraps tool, open the pop-up menu on the Application column label, and select **Column Filter: SNMPTraps** from the pop-up menu.

The message browser displays only those messages that match the message view filter. In addition, the message view filter icon appears in the column label and in the filtered message browser.

Note: The Java GUI truncates the values in the pop-up menu if there are too many values or the values are too long to display. This is typically the case for values in the Message Text column. If no values are shown at all and Custom is selected in the pop-up menu, a simple or advanced message view filter is currently applied, and can only be changed in the Message View Filter dialog box.

Messages in the browser are updated each time a message view filter is applied and, for filtered time and date related columns, at every refresh interval.

For more information about removing message view filters, see "Working with Message View Filters" on the previous page.

Creating Simple Message View Filters

To create simple message view filters, use the Simple View pane of the Message View Filter dialog box.

For more information about this filter type, see "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

Creating simple message view filters:

- 1. Select the message browser that you want to filter.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Select Actions: Filtering > Message View Filter... from the menu bar.
 - Right-click the message browser headline, and then select **Message View Filter: Custom...** from the pop-up menu.
 - Click the Open Message View Filter Dialog Box icon in the main toolbar.

The Message View Filter dialog box opens with the Simple View pane displayed. If no message view filter is configured for the browser, this pane is empty.

If the Advanced View pane opens, an advanced message view filter is applied. To switch to the Simple View pane, first remove the existing advanced filter.

3. Click Add.

An empty criterion is added to the pane, and the lower half of the dialog box is now available for you to make selections.

4. Select or type the Column name on which you want to filter.

The list of available column names offers all existing names, including custom message attribute names.

5. Optional: Select **NOT** to invert the criterion.

For example, if you choose **NOT** and the equals operator, the criterion filters messages that *do not* match the chosen value.

6. Select Operator.

The operators vary depending on the contents of the specified message browser column. Only appropriate operators are offered for numeric or string data. See also "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

7. Select Value.

You can type your own custom value, choose a value from the list of available messages, or select a predefined value, such as **Management Server** or **Today**. See also "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

If the equals operator is selected, you can also use the question mark (?) and asterisk (*) wildcard characters. A question mark matches any single character. An asterisk matches any group of one or more characters.

- 8. *Optional:* For time-related columns and the Flags columns, select the ^{select} button, and use the subsequent dialog boxes to help you type a value.
- 9. Press Enter if the filter is not updated in the pane.
- 10. Optional: To create additional criteria, click Add, and then modify the criteria as required.
- 11. Apply the filter:
 - Click **Apply** to apply the filter without closing the dialog box.
 - Click **OK** to apply the filter and close the dialog box.

If the filter does not conform to the syntax rules, a message appears and explains the problem.

See "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124 for a description of the required syntax.

The message browser displays only those messages that match the message view filter. In addition, the message view filter icon appears in the column label and in the filtered message browser.

Messages in the browser are updated each time a message view filter is applied and, for filtered time and date related columns, at every refresh interval.

Creating Advanced Message View Filters

Use the Advanced View tab of the Message View Filter dialog box to create advanced message view filters. See "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124 for more information about this filter type.

You cannot switch from the Advanced View pane to the Simple View pane if an advanced filter is defined because the complex structure of an advanced filter can be displayed only in the Advanced View or the Text View tab.

Creating advanced message view filters:

- 1. Select the message browser that you want to filter.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Select Actions: Filtering > Message View Filter... from the menu bar.
 - Right-click the message browser headline, and then select **Message View Filter: Custom...** from the pop-up menu.
 - Click the Open Message View Filter Dialog Box icon in the main toolbar.

The Message View Filter dialog box opens. If no message view filter is configured for the browser, the Simple View tab displays. Click Advanced View to open the Advanced View tab.

If the Advanced View tab opens, an advanced message view filter is already applied to this browser. You must delete it before you can create a new one. Or simply modify the existing filter.

- 3. Create criteria:
 - a. Click New Criterion.

An empty criterion is added to the tab. The lower half of the dialog box is now available for you to make selections.

b. Select or type the Column name on which you want to filter.

The list of available column names offers all existing names, including custom message attribute names.

c. Optional: Select NOT to invert the criterion.

For example, if you choose **NOT** and the equals operator, the criterion filters messages that *do not* match the chosen value.

d. Select Operator.

The operators vary depending on the contents of the specified message browser column. Only appropriate operators are offered for numeric or string data. See also "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

e. Select Value.

You can type your own custom value, choose a value from the list of available messages, or select a predefined value such as (Management Server) or (Today). See also "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

If the equals operator is selected, you can also use the question mark (?) and asterisk (*) wildcard characters. A question mark matches any single character. An asterisk matches any group of one or more characters.

- f. *Optional:* For time-related columns and the Flags columns, select the ^{select} button, and use the subsequent dialog boxes to help you enter a value.
- g. Press Enter if the filter is not updated in the tab.
- h. Click New Criterion again, and modify any additional criteria as required.

When you add a second criterion, it is combined with the first criterion by an AND rule, which means that the messages must match both criteria.

- 4. Create a rule:
 - a. Click New Rule.

An empty rule is added to the tab and the lower half of the dialog box changes, so that you can configure the rule.

- b. Select the rule operator. You have a choice between AND and OR.
- c. Optional: Select **NOT** to invert the rule.

For example, if you select the NOT and the AND operator, the rule filters messages that *do not* match either of the configured criteria.

- d. Press Enter if the filter is not updated in the tab.
- e. Add criteria to the rule as required.

Note: You can also create a rule by selecting two or more criteria or rules, and by clicking New Rule. The selected items become members of the new rule. The selected items must directly belong to the same parent rule. Otherwise, a new rule cannot be created for them.

- 5. Optional: Use Move Up and Move Down to change the order and nesting of criteria and rules.
- 6. Apply the filter:
 - Click **Apply** to apply the filter without closing the dialog box.
 - Click **OK** to apply the filter and close the dialog box.

If the filter does not conform to the syntax rules, an error message appears and explains the problem. See "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124 for a description of the required syntax.

The message browser displays only those messages that match the message view filter. In addition, the message view filter icon appears in the column label and in the filtered message browser.

Messages in the browser are updated each time a message view filter is applied and, for filtered time and date related columns, at every refresh interval.

Writing Message View Filters in the Text View

If you feel more comfortable with writing message view filters in text format, you can use the Text View tab of the Message View Filter dialog box to define message view filters.

Note: Enclose column names and values that contain spaces in quotation marks (").

Creating message view filters by using the Text View tab:

- 1. Familiarize yourself with the message view filter syntax described in "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.
- 2. Select the message browser that you want to filter.
- 3. Do one of the following:

- Select Actions: Filtering > Message View Filter... from the menu bar.
- Right-click the message browser headline, and then select **Message View Filter: Custom...** from the pop-up menu.
- Click the Open Message View Filter Dialog Box icon in the main toolbar.

The Message View Filter dialog box opens.

- 4. Click **Text View** to open the Text View tab.
- 5. Place the cursor in the editable text area, and type your filter definition.
- 6. Click **Check** to verify that your filter definition is syntactically correct.

An information message informs you about the results. If errors are detected, correct the filter, and then check the syntax again.

- 7. Apply the filter:
 - Click **Apply** to apply the filter without closing the dialog box.
 - Click **OK** to apply the filter and close the dialog box.

If the filter does not conform to the syntax rules, a message appears and explains the problem.

The message browser displays only those messages that match the message view filter. In addition, the message view filter icon appears in the column label and in the filtered message browser.

Messages in the browser are updated each time a message view filter is applied and, for filtered time and date related columns, at every refresh interval.

Saving Named Message View Filters

You can store message view filters as part of the console session settings and of any customized browser layout. The next time you start the Java GUI or open a browser with a saved layout, the stored message view filters are immediately applied to the browsers.

You can also store message view filters independently of the console settings and the browser layout as described in this section. Saved message view filters are listed in the Filter Settings folder of the object tree. See also "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

Saving a named message view filter:

- 1. Select the message browser that you want to filter.
- 2. Do one of the following:

- Select Actions: Filtering > Message View Filter... from the menu bar.
- Right-click the message browser headline, and then select **Message View Filter: Custom...** from the pop-up menu.
- Click the Open Message View Filter Dialog Box icon on the main toolbar.

The Message View Filter dialog box opens. If a message view filter is already applied to the message browser, the Message View Filter dialog box displays this filter.

3. Optional: If the Message View Filter dialog box is empty, create a message view filter.

For more information, see "Working with Message View Filters" on page 195 and "Working with Message View Filters" on page 195.

4. Click Save...

The Save Message View Filter dialog box opens.

5. Select the filter type: Global or Personal.

If you are not the HPOM administrator, the Global option is not available to you. You can store the filter for your personal use only.

6. Type a descriptive name for your message view filter into the Name field.

Filter names can contain only alpha-numeric characters and the underscore character (A ... Z, a ... z, 0 ... 9, and _). The length is limited to 254 characters.

- 7. Click **OK** to save the filter, and then close the Save Message View Filter dialog box.
- 8. In the Message View Filter dialog box, click **OK** to apply the filter, and then close the dialog box.

Applying Saved Message View Filters

You can apply saved message view filters to a specific browser or to the All Active Messages browser.

Applying a Saved Message View Filter to a Specific Browser

- 1. Select the message browser that you want to filter.
- Load the saved message view filter into the Message View Filter dialog box, and click Apply.
 For information about loading saved message view filters, see "Modifying Saved Message View Filters" on the next page.

Applying a Saved Message View Filter to the All Active Messages Browser:

- 1. Select a saved message view filter in the Filter Settings folder of the object tree.
- 2. Do one of the following:

- Select Open for All Active Messages in the pop-up menu.
- Double-click the saved filter.
- Drag the saved filter onto the workspace or browser pane.

The All Active Messages browser opens and displays all active messages that match the applied message view filter.

Modifying Saved Message View Filters

After you save a message view filter, you can access it again by loading it into the Message View Filter dialog box.

You can also modify a saved message view filter by selecting the filter in the object pane and selecting **Modify...** in the pop-up menu. You can then modify the filter in the Message View Filter dialog box and save it, but you cannot apply it to a browser because the filter requires (but does not have) the context of a specific browser.

Note: When you load a saved message view filter into the Message View Filter dialog box, it replaces any previously listed filters.

Loading a Message View Filter

- 1. Select the message browser that you want to filter.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Select Actions: Filtering > Message View Filter... from the menu bar.
 - Right-click the message browser headline, and then select **Message View Filter: Custom...** from the pop-up menu.
 - Click the Open Message View Filter Dialog Box icon on the main toolbar.

The Message View Filter dialog box opens.

3. Click Load....

The Load Message View Filter dialog box opens.

- 4. Select the saved message view filter that you want to load.
- 5. Click **OK** in the Load Message View Filter dialog box.

In the Message View Filter dialog box, the selected filter replaces any previously listed filters.

6. Modify the loaded message view filter as required.

Note: Operators can load both global and personal filters, but can only save personal filters. Administrators can load and save only global filters.

7. Click **OK** to apply the loaded filter, and close the Message View Filter dialog box.

Removing Filters from Message Browser Columns

You can undo message view filtering by removing filter criteria from a single message browser column or by removing the entire filter from the browser.

Removing a Single Criterion from a Message Browser Column

- Right-click the label of the message browser column from which you want to remove the criterion.
 A pop-up menu opens.
- 2. Clear the criterion in the Message View Filter pop-up menu.

The criterion is removed from the selected message browser column. The message view filter icon remains in the column label if other filter criteria are selected for the message browser column.

If filter criteria are applied to other message browser columns, the browser shows only those messages that match the remaining criteria.

Removing All Criteria from a Single Message Browser Column

- Right-click the label of the message browser column from which you want to remove the filter. A pop-up menu opens.
- 2. Select Message View Filter: All.

The filter criteria are removed from the selected message browser column only, and the message view filter icon kisappears from the column label.

If filter criteria are applied to other message browser columns, the browser shows only those messages that match the remaining criteria.

Removing a Message View Filter from a Message Browser

- 1. Select the message browser from which you want to remove the message view filter.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Select Actions: Filtering > Remove Message View Filter from the menu bar.
 - Right-click the message browser headline, and then select **Remove Message View Filter** from the pop-up menu.

The message browser shows all messages it is configured to display and the message view filter icon disappears from the message browser. **Note:** Removing a message view filter from a message browser does not delete any saved message view filters.

Saving the Browser Layout

If you change the size of the browser or customize the columns during several HPOM sessions, you may want to save the browser layout for future use. By saving the browser layout, you avoid having to change the size of the browser or change the sorting order, column width, column labels, and so on, every time you start the Java GUI.

Note: Any changes to the browser filters must be saved separately. For details, see "Saving the Browser Filter Settings" on page 194.

Saving the Physical Layout of a Non-filtered Message Browser

1. Change the message browser size, as well as the sorting order, column width, column labels, and so on.

2. Apply message view filters.

- 3. Make sure the browser for which you want to save the layout is active.
- 4. In the menu bar, select View: Save Message Browser Layout > Save as Default For, and then one of the following:
 - Active

Saves the current browser as the default active message browser.

• History

Saves the current layout as the default for filtered history message browsers.

Pending

Saves the current browser layout as the default for filtered pending message browsers.

HPOM saves the layout in the *itoopbrw* file in your home directory.

Saving the Physical Layout of a Filtered Browser

To save the physical layout of a filtered browser, follow these steps:

1. Open a browser with the saved message browser filter settings.

Note: If you have not already done so, define the message browser filter and save it. Then open a browser with the new saved filter settings. To find out how to define a message browser filter, see "Creating a Filtered Message Browser" on page 192.

2. Change the message browser size, as well as the sorting order, column width, column labels, and so on.

For instructions, see "Changing the Layout of Browser Windows" on the next page.

3. Apply message view filters.

For instructions, see "Working with Message View Filters" on page 195.

4. Make sure that the browser for which you want to save the layout is active.

5. Select View: Save Message Browser Layout > Save For Filter Name.

HPOM saves the layout in the *itoopbrw* file in your home directory.

This file is usually stored in the following directories:

- Windows 2003 and XP
 - C:\Documents and Settings\<user>
- Windows Vista, Windows 2008 R2 (64-bit), and Windows 7
 C:\Users\<user>
- Other platforms /home/<user>

The new layout is read from the configuration file the next time you start the GUI. The new layout is used as the default layout for subsequent sessions.

Reloading the Layout of a Filtered Browser

To reload a previously saved browser layout with a filter name, select **Actions: Filtering > Use Saved Setting**.

Changing the Layout of Browser Windows

The layout of browser windows can be changed to help you browse messages according to your requirements:

Changing Attribute Columns

You can move or resize the attribute columns by dragging the column borders to the left or right. You can also hide the columns.

Reordering Browser Columns

You can reorder browser columns by dragging the column labels.

Sorting Messages

You can sort messages according to attributes by clicking column labels. An arrow appears in the column labels to indicate by which attribute the messages are sorted.

Message fields with numerical values can also be sorted. Numerical values can be integer values or floating point numbers. Scientific notation is supported also. Example values of message fields are the following:

- 982374 (integer)
- 123.045 (floating point)
- 10e-2 (scientific notation)

Aligning the Column Content

You can align the column content by using a pop-up menu in the Message Browser opened in the message browser headline. Alignment can be set to left, right, or center.

Customizing Columns

You can show or hide message browser columns, and change their labels by selecting the message browser you want to customize, and then selecting **View: Customize Message Browser Columns...** from the menu bar. Or right-click the message browser headline, and select **Customize Message Browser Columns...** from the pop-up menu. For details, see "Customize Message Browser Columns Dialog Box" on page 316.

Note: Changing the layout of a browser window is effective for the current session only unless you save the new layout for future use. To find out how to save the browser layout, see "Saving the Browser Layout" on page 205.

Changing the Number of Displayed Messages

You can view either all messages or only the most recent messages in the active or history message browser.

Note: The following procedures are effective for the current session only.

Viewing All Messages in the Message Browser

To view all messages in the active or history message browser, do one of the following:

- On the toolbar, click the Show All Messages icon (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
- From the menu bar, select View: Number of Messages > All Messages.

Viewing Only the Latest Messages in the Message Browser

To view only the latest messages in the message browser, do one of the following:

- On the toolbar, click the Show Latest Messages icon (see "Toolbar Icons and Drop-down Lists" on page 286).
- From the menu bar, select View: Number of Messages > Latest Messages.

The default number of messages displayed in the Latest Messages view is 50.

Changing the Number of Messages in the Messages Browser

In the menu bar, you can choose to view Latest Messages or All Messages in the active or history message browser. If you choose Latest Messages, you can change the number of messages to be displayed at one time. For details, see "View Menu" on page 277.

To change the number of messages displayed in the active or history message browser, follow these steps:

1. From the menu bar, choose Edit: Preferences.

For a description of each option on the Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

- 2. In the General tab, type the maximum number of messages displayed in the active or history message browser:
 - Display the latest messages for active message browsers.
 - Display the latest history messages for history message browsers.
- 3. Click OK.

Customizing the Color Preferences for the Message Browser

Normally, HPOM colors just the Severity column in the message browser. If you want, you can configure HPOM to color the entire line in the message browser according to the severity of each message. Coloring the entire line is useful when running HPOM in an environment where at-a-glance classification of message severity is of primary importance. To make this change, you simply toggle the **Colored Lines** check box in the Preferences window.

To customize the color preferences for the message browser, follow these steps:

1. From the menu bar, select Edit: Preferences.

2. In the General tab, select or clear the **Colored Lines** check box.

By default, the check box is cleared.

3. Click **OK**.

Note: The preference settings are saved on the computer where the Java GUI is running and applied to all Java GUIs running on that client. If you start the Java GUI on another client, the settings on the other client are used.

Configuring HTTPS-based Communication on the Java GUI Client

To configure HTTPS-based communication between the Java GUI and the management server, set the parameters listed in the following table in the ito_op (ito_op.bat on Windows) Java GUI start-up script. The table presents the available start-up options for setting the HTTPS-based communication type.

Option	Format	Default	Description
https	yes no	yes	Sets the HTTPS-based communication type to be used at the startup. If set to no, the standard non-secure communication is used.
lcore_	yes no	no	This option is necessary for setting the full SSL

Start-up Script Options for Setting the HTTPS Protocol

defaults			authentication. If set to yes, the default Core functionality directories are used.
https_ only	yes no	no	If set to yes, disables the communication fallback to the standard socket communication.
https_ port	< number >	35211	The port on which opcuinttps is listening. The standard Java GUI uses port 2531.

Note: When starting the Java GUI from the command line by using ito_op (ito_op.bat on Windows), you can specify *only* the https parameter.

Set all other start-up parameters by adding them either to the ito_op (ito_op.bat on Windows) script at the end of the line where the Java GUI start-up command is stated, or to the itooprc configuration file that is located in the user's home directory.

Note: Start-up parameters specified in the itooprc configuration file using the global settings mode on the HP Operations management server are ignored upon HPOM Java GUI startup. Only locally specified start-up parameters are applied. For more information about global settings mode, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

For information about how to configure opculhttps settings as well as for the list of the parameters related to the HTTPS-based Java GUI, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

Installing the Core Functionality

The Core functionality is required on the client system if you choose to set the full authentication mode and the HP Operations agent is not installed on the Java GUI client.

Using the Core functionality enables you to configure the proxy server through which the connection between the HP Operations management server and the Java GUI client is established. However, having the Core functionality installed is not mandatory for the proxy server configuration. For more information, see "Configuring the HTTPS-based Java GUI Connection Through Firewalls" on page 214.

Note: Instructions on how to install and enable the HTTPS-based Java GUI, as well as how to disable the non-secure communication between the Java GUI client and the HP Operations management server, are detailed in the *HPOM Installation Guide for the Management Server*.

Installing the Core Functionality

To install the Core functionality, follow these steps:

1. Copy the HPSharedComp package from the HP Operations management server vendor tree at the following location:

/var/opt/OV/share/databases/OpC/mgd_node/vendor/\
<VENDOR>/<FAMILY>/<OS>/<HPOM_VERSION>/RPC_BBC

to the Java GUI client system.

For example, for Windows 7 (64-bit), this package is located in the following directory:

/var/opt/OV/share/databases/OpC/mgd_node/vendor/ms/x64/win2k3/A.11.00.000/RPC_
BBC/

2. Install the package. On Windows 7 (64-bit), for example, this package is HPSharedComp.msi.

To Provide Certificates for Server Authentication Mode

To use the HTTPS-based Java GUI, it is not necessary to have any certificate installed because the GUI connects to the HP Operations management server anonymously.

The certificates are generated upon the first connection to the HP Operations management server and are stored together with the public key in the local Certificate Store. The certificates are then used by the opcuinttps server in the process of authentication.

Depending on whether the certificate exists in the local Certificate Store, the following scenarios are possible:

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• Certificate is already stored on the client.

The communication between the Java GUI and the HPOM management server is established without any notice.

• Certificate does not exist on the client.

The HPOM Server Certificate dialog box with the following options is displayed:

Yes

HP Operations server certificate is accepted only for the current session. At the next logon, you are prompted to accept this certificate again.

No

Connection to the HP Operations management server is canceled. In the newly displayed log-on window, you can choose another HP Operations management server or cancel the log-on procedure.

Always

HP Operations server certificate is used for the current and all subsequent Java GUI sessions.

Providing Certificates for Full Authentication Mode

To provide the certificates for the full authentication mode, follow these steps:

1. Configure the opcuihttps process to enable the full authentication mode. To do so, type the following, and then restart the opcuihttps process:

ovconfchg -ovrg server -ns opc.opcuihttps -set\ SSL_CLIENT_VERIFICATION_MODE
RequireCertificate

For more information about configuring the opcuinttps parameters, see the HPOM Administrator's Reference guide.

2. Ensure that the client certificate is present on the client system.

If the Operations HTTPS agent is installed on the Java GUI client system, you can use its HPOM client certificate for authentication. Otherwise, you should install the client certificate manually. For details about the manual client certificate installation, see "Installing the Client Certificate Manually" below.

3. Set the Java GUI start-up parameter lcore_defaults to yes, so that the Java GUI can use the default Core functionality. The Core functionality is either installed with the HP Operations agent in case it exists on the Java GUI client, or you have to install it additionally. For more information, see "Installing the Core Functionality" on page 211.

Installing the Client Certificate Manually

To install the client certificate manually on the client system, follow these steps:

- On the Java GUI client system, install the Core functionality if it is not already installed. For information about installing the Core functionality, see "Installing the Core Functionality" on page 211.
- On the Java GUI client system, create a client core ID by using the following command: ovcoreid
- 3. On the HP Operations management server, create a new certificate, associate the public key for this certificate, and store it in a file. Type the following:

```
ovcm -issue -file <filename> -name <system_name> \
-pass <passphrase> -coreid <client_coreid>
```

In this instance, <*system_name*> is the HP Operations management server hostname, <*passphrase*> is the password, <*client_coreid*> is the client core ID, and <*filename*> is the name of the file where the certificate is stored.

- 4. Transfer the file containing the certificate to the client system (for example, by using the ftp service).
- Install the certificate on the client system by typing the following: ovcert -importcert -file <filename> -pass pass

Configuring the HTTPS-based Java GUI Connection Through Firewalls

For the HTTPS-based Java GUI to communicate with an HP Operations management server through a firewall, you can either configure the firewall to allow the HTTPS-based Java GUI direct access to the HP Operations management server, or you can configure the HTTPS-based Java GUI to use a proxy server for communication with the HP Operations management server. The default port on which the opcuihttps process is listening on the management server is 35211. The standard Java GUI uses port 3521.

There are different methods for specifying a proxy server for the HTTPS-based Java GUI:

Syntax for Proxy Server Configuration

For each method, configure the proxy server <proxy_config> by using the following syntax:

```
<proxy>:<port>+(<a>)-(<b>);<proxy2>:<port2>+(<a>)-(<b>);...
```

<proxy>

Full hostname of the proxy server.

<port>

Port on which the proxy server is running.

<a>

Comma or semicolon separated list of hostnames for which this proxy server is used (for example, the name of the HP Operations management server to which the connection is made).

Comma or semicolon separated list of hostnames for which this proxy server is used (for example, the name of the HP Operations management server to which the connection is not allowed).

Note that for *<a>* and **, the first matching proxy is used.

Example:

web-proxy:8088-(*.hp.com)+(*.deu.hp.com;*)

In this example, the web-proxy proxy is used with port 8088 for every server (*) except hosts that match *.hp.com (for example, www.hp.com). If the hostname matches *.deu.hp.com (for example, merlin.deu.hp.com), the proxy server is also used.

It is also possible to use IP addresses instead of hostnames (for example, 15.*.*.*). Make sure that you specify the correct number of dots.

The default is an empty string and no proxy server is specified.

Configuring a Proxy Server by Using the ito_op Command Line Tool

To specify a proxy server for the ito_op (ito_op.bat) command line tool, specify the bbc.http:proxy parameter:

ito_op ... -bbc.http:proxy <proxy_config>

For example, to enable a connection to the HP Operations management server barney.hp.com through the proxy server proxy.hp.com, which runs on port 8088, type the following:

ito_op -bbc.http:proxy proxy.hp.com:8088+(barney.hp.com)

For details of <proxy_config>, see "Syntax for Proxy Server Configuration" above.

Configuring a Proxy Server by Using the itooprc File

You can also set the bbc.http:proxy <proxy_config> parameter in the itooprc file. The itooprc file is located in the user's home directory.

For example, to enable a connection to the HP Operations management server barney.hp.com through the proxy server proxy.hp.com, which runs on port 8088, add the following line to the itooprc file:

bbc.http:proxy proxy.hp.com:8088+(barney.hp.com)

Configuring a Proxy Server in the Login Dialog Box

If the Java GUI is configured to use HTTPS communication, the Login dialog box displays an additional field for selecting a proxy server. The Proxy field offers the following options:

Add New

Select **Add New** to type a new proxy server into the Proxy field of the Login dialog box. The value is stored in your local itoopproxy configuration file. For details of the proxy configuration syntax, see "Syntax for Proxy Server Configuration" on the previous page.

For example, to enable a connection to the HP Operations management server barney.hp.com through the proxy server proxy.hp.com, which runs on port 8088, type the following: proxy.hp.com:8088+(barney.hp.com)

None

Select **None** if you do not want to use a proxy server for this connection.

Default

Select **Default** if a proxy server is already specified by using the ito_op command line tool or in the ito_op_applet.html applet file.

<proxy_server>

Select an already defined *<proxy_server* > to use for the connection to the HP Operations management server.

When you select a proxy server in the Login dialog box, this proxy server becomes the default for any subsequent connections to the HP Operations management server. The default proxy server setting is stored in your local itoopproxy configuration file.

If the Java GUI is accessed directly, without the Login dialog box being displayed, the default proxy server is used.

Configuring a Proxy Server for Java GUI Applets

To configure a proxy for the HTTPS-based Java GUI running as an applet, follow these steps on the management server:

1. Edit the file:

/opt/OV/www/htdocs/ito_op/ito_op_applet.html

by setting the proxy definition in the following line:

<PARAM NAME = bbc.http:PROXY VALUE = "proxy_config">

2. Restart the HTTPS-based Java GUI applet.

For example, to enable the connection to the HP Operations management server barney.hp.com through the proxy server proxy.hp.com, which runs on port 8088, type the following:

"proxy.hp.com:8088+(barney.hp.com)">
```

Configuring a Proxy Server with the Core Functionality

To configure a proxy server with the Core functionality, follow these steps:

Chapter 2: Daily Tasks with Service Navigator

HP Operations Service Navigator

HP Operations Service Navigator is an add-on component of the Java GUI. It enables you to manage your IT environment while focusing on the IT services you provide.


While HP Operations Manager lets you detect, solve, and prevent problems occurring in networks, systems, and applications in your IT environment, Service Navigator takes you one step further. Service Navigator lets you map the problems discovered by HPOM to the IT services you want to monitor. Instead of focusing on single elements within a complex IT environment, you can now manage your IT environment by focusing on the IT services you are responsible for.

Service Navigator is based on HPOM and depends on the monitoring, message, and action capabilities HPOM provides. If a problem occurs on one of the objects managed by HPOM, a message about this problem is generated and sent to the user responsible for the area concerned. With Service Navigator installed and configured, this message is mapped to the service that is affected by the problem, and sent to the user responsible for that service.

The severity status of the problem also changes the severity status of the service so that the user can easily identify services that are in a problematic state. To solve service-related problems, HPOM's problem resolution capabilities are further extended to include service-specific analysis operations and actions.

If enabled, Service Navigator logs each change of the status in the database so that reports about service availability can be generated.

The following figure shows the main window of Service Navigator. In addition to the customary HPOM managed nodes and message groups, managed services are displayed in the scoping pane on the left. The content area on the right is split into two sections. The upper section displays a service hierarchy in graphical form where each service is represented by an icon. The lower section contains the standard HPOM message browser configured to display only the messages that are related to your service.



Managing Service Problems with Service Navigator

Service Navigator helps you to quickly identify and solve the most critical problems affecting your services before service performance deteriorates.

You can handle service problems by using Service Navigator in one of the following ways:

• Traditional way:

Highlight the service that is affected, and then perform an analysis of the impacted services to find out which other services are affected.

• Service-oriented top-down way:

Open a service graph and monitor the status of displayed services. When a service changes status, perform a root cause analysis to find out the cause of the problem.


Analysis of the Impacted Services

Whereas the root cause analysis drills down the service hierarchy to the service that caused the status to change, analysis of the impacted services works the other way: it searches upwards through the service hierarchy and displays all other services that are affected by the change in the status. The nature of the effect is determined by considering the configured status propagation and calculation rules. This helps operators to prioritize their tasks by simply determining which problem has the highest impact (for example, a problem that impacts critical business services and a large number of users should be solved first). Analysis of the impacted services identifies whether critical business services are affected.

In the following figure, the Update subservice has the major severity that impacts the Display Queues and Processes services. Both services are affected by a problem related to Update. Note that the service impact graph, just like the root cause graph, is static; it does not get updated but displays the status of the services at the time it was generated.

Analysis of the impacted services is also available for messages: select a message in a browser, and click **Get Impacted Services**. This highlights the impacted services in the service tree in the scoping pane.

Note that analysis of the impacted services considers only negative effects (that is, for example, a status change from major to critical, but not from critical to major). This means that the impact graph does not necessarily display the top-level service, but stops where the last service was impacted.



Root Cause Analysis


In a service hierarchy with many hierarchical levels it can be difficult to determine why a service adopts a certain severity status. The service can turn critical because of a critical message, a critical

subservice, or several affected subservices.

Service Navigator helps you find the cause for a certain severity status by performing a root cause analysis. You simply highlight the icon of the service you are interested in, and select **Get Root Cause**. A new window that displays the service you selected and all other subservices that contributed to its status.

The root cause analysis performs a top-down investigation. It stops on the hierarchical level where the cause of the problem lies. Note that there may be more branches or levels below that one, which are not displayed, because the services on these levels did not contribute to the problem.

For an example of a root cause graph, see the following figure. Note that the root cause graph is static; it does not get updated but displays the status of the services at the time it was generated.



Service Navigator Concepts

The concept behind Service Navigator is that of a hierarchical service structure. Service Navigator lets you build a hierarchy that reflects the relationships and dependencies between the service-relevant managed objects in your IT environment.

This section explains the concept of a service hierarchy and how a service can be logically related to a subservice as well as the dynamic aspects of the relationship between a service and its subservices in terms of status severity.

Service Hierarchy

A service hierarchy is a logical organization of the services you provide, each higher level covering a wider or more general service area than the next lower level.

The relationship between services in a hierarchy can be one of the following types:

Containment

A service is contained in a service (that is, a service is part of, and defined within, another service). The contained service cannot exist without the containing service. A service can contain more than one subservices.

• Usage


A service is contained in a service but, at the same time, is used, or referenced, by another service. The used service can exist without the using service; the using service depends on the used service.

For the purposes of status propagation and calculation it is of no consequence whether a service is contained in or used by another service. Note, however, that a service can be defined only once, but be used or contained many times.

Service Navigator supports up to 256 hierarchical levels.


The following figure shows an example of a service hierarchy for an SAP/R3 system. The SAP/R3 service includes components of SAP database servers and application servers, as well as a printer spooler. Each of these subservices is divided into further elements. Together they build the SAP/R3 service hierarchy. The relationship between the services is of the *containment* type, except for the relationship between Application Server 02 and its subservice. Application Server 02 uses a subservice contained in Application Server 01.

With HPOM, one service can use another subservice, so you do not have to set up specific subservices for each of your service hierarchies. You can set up a generic service (for example, monitoring the operating system on an SAP/R3 application server that can be used by any other service hierarchy responsible for monitoring the SAP/R3 application server).



Status of a Service

The status of a service is the current operational status of a service. The status is indicated by status colors, each color signaling how severe the current situation is. For example, the red color indicates a critical problem situation. For an illustration of the HPOM severity status model, see the following figure.



Since a service contains or uses several subservices, and since each subservice in turn contains or uses other subservices, the severity status of the service must be determined and calculated on the basis of the severity statuses of the next lower services in addition to the severity statuses of the messages targeting the service.

This is done on the basis of status propagation and status calculation rules. These rules define the relationship of a service to its subservices in terms of how they interpret each other's severity status. Status rules are defined in the service configuration file; see *HPOM Administrator's Reference* for more information.

Example:

A service contains two subservices, one has the critical severity status, the other has the normal severity status. The service sets its own severity status to critical because a critical state is more serious than a normal state.

However, Service Navigator offers you much greater flexibility in terms of how the service interprets other severity statuses. For example, a subservice may be less important than another subservice; that is, problems in that subservice have a smaller effect on the service than problems in another subservice. In this case, you would want to decrease the severity status of one subservice, but increase the severity status of the other subservice. This is defined by applying different status propagation rules to the relationship between a service and a subservice; see also "Status Propagation Rules" on the next page.

Status calculation rules, on the other hand, define how a service computes its severity status from the severity statuses of its subservices after the status propagation rules are applied. In this example, the service sets its severity status to critical because one of its subservices is critical. This is an

application of the status calculation rule Most Critical. You can, however, define other rules, as explained in "Status Calculation Rules" on the next page.

You can also make one service count more than another service by adding a weighting factor for the purposes of status calculation. See the section on "Weighting" on page 229 for more information.

Status Propagation Rules

Status propagation rules define how a service determines the severity of a subservice. The relationship between two services can be one of the following:

increase

If the subservice is interpreted as more important, that is, its severity status has more effect on the next higher service than other subservices on the same hierarchical level, its severity status is increased by a level.

For example, if a subservice has the severity status minor and status propagation is defined as increase, its severity status is increased from minor to major.

unchanged

The subservice propagates its severity status unchanged to the service. This is the default configuration.

For example, if a subservice has the severity status normal, the service interprets it as normal.

decrease

If the subservice is interpreted as less important, that

is, its severity status has less effect on the next higher service than other subservices on the same hierarchical level, its severity status is

decreased by a level.

For example, if a subservice has the severity status critical and status propagation is defined as decrease, its severity status is decreased from critical to major.

ignore

The severity of the subservice does not influence the service. Propagation does not take place.

set to

The severity of the subservice is set to a specified severity. The new severity status can be either higher or lower than the original status.

For example, the severity of a subservice can always be set to the severity status critical.

The following figure shows how the selected status propagation rule influences the status of a service. The subservices ABAP and Buffer Space are interpreted as more important than the Processes and Display Queue subservices. Therefore, the severity statuses of the former are increased, the severity statuses of the latter are decreased. The Application Server service now has a manipulated but correct view of the actual situation.


Status propagation rules can be set in the following ways:

Default Propagation Attribute

A default propagation attribute is applied (for example, the severity of a subservice is always increased).

Severity-specific Propagation Attribute

Severity-specific propagation attributes are applied. This means that, depending on the severity of the subservice, a specific propagation rule is applied (for example, the severity normal is always ignored, but the severity warning is always increased).



Status Calculation Rules

Status calculation rules define the formula for calculating the severity of a service based on the severity of its subservices and the messages targeting the service directly. Calculation rules model the

behavior of the relationship between services. For example, by selecting a calculation rule you determine whether the highest severity of the subservices or the highest average severity of the subservices determines the severity of the service.

The concept is based on setting thresholds that must be exceeded before the status of the service changes. The service adopts the status of the subservice or message that first exceeds the threshold.

The following status calculation rules are available:

Most Critical

The service adopts the status of the subservice with the highest severity. The absolute threshold is set to 0. (This is a special case of the Single Threshold rule.)

The Most Critical rule models a worst-case scenario: the highest severity of the subservices "wins".

Single Threshold

The highest severity of the subservices that is found more often than the threshold will be the severity of the service. (This is a special case of the Multiple Threshold rule where the same threshold is defined for all severities.)

The Single Threshold rule computes the highest average severity of all subservices. This average severity is then adopted by the service.

Multiple Thresholds

The concept is the same as Single Threshold but you can set individual thresholds for each severity except the severity normal.

Note: It is *not* possible to specify more than one threshold for the same severity. If multiple thresholds are specified, only the last one will be active.

The Multiple Thresholds rule, for example, allows a few severe problems to be more important than many problems of a lower severity.

The threshold itself can be defined as an absolute value or as a percentage. For information on the format of a percentage that should be used when specifying a relative threshold value in the service configuration file, see *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

When calculating the value that is compared to the threshold, the severity of the subservice and their lower severities are counted. For example, if a subservice has the severity critical, the severities major, minor, warning, and normal are also counted. See also the following figure.

"Example: Status Calculation Scenario " on the next page shows how the severity of each subservice in the following figure and each message is calculated. The first column lists all subservices and messages. The second column states the severity of each subservice as it is interpreted by the service. This is determined by the status propagation rules explained in the section "Status Propagation Rules" on page 225. The remaining columns are then compared to the severity of the subservice, and 1 is entered if they match, 0 if they do not match. You must also enter 1 for each lower severity of a matching subservice.

For example, the service Application Server interprets the severity of the subservice ABAP as minor. The original severity of ABAP is warning, but the relationship is defined as increase. Consequently, the status normal is increased to minor (see also the following figure). You enter a 1 in the column where minor matches minor, and a 1 for every subsequent lower severity, in this case for warning and normal.

When you have performed this for all subservices, you add up each column to arrive at a total for each severity.

Depending on the status calculation rule and the threshold you have selected, the service Application Server changes severity. For example, if one of the following was configured:

• Most Critical: the service changes to critical because the highest severity found amongst the subservices and messages (critical) is adopted by the service.

¹The messages directly targeting a service are seen as an entity: the message with the highest severity affects the service.

- Single Threshold 50%: the service changes to major because the severity that first exceeds the threshold of 50% is adopted by the service. In this case the severity major with 50% is the first to exceed the threshold of 50%.
- Multiple thresholds:
 - threshold of 15% for severity critical
 - threshold of 50% for severity major
 - threshold of 60% for severity minor
 - threshold of 70% for severity warning


The service changes to critical because the first threshold to be exceeded is 15% (severity critical). Note that there is no need to specify a threshold for the severity normal because normal is the lowest severity status.

Weighting

Weighting enables you to associate a factor with a subservice. This is done by specifying the *<Weight>* tag when defining the service in the service configuration file. The subservice is then weighted more compared to all other subservices, and consequently affects status calculation differently than without the weighting factor. *<Weight>* can be a decimal number.

You can also add a weighting factor to the messages directly targeting the service. The tag is <//> *MsgWeight>* and is specified when defining the service in the service configuration file.
MsgWeight> can be a decimal number. The following figure illustrates how the messages directly targeting the service contribute to its status. These messages can also be seen as a "virtual message service".

The following figure also shows that the calculation rule of the service considers both <Weight> (or <MsgWeight>) and <PropRule> (or <MsgPropRule>).



For example, if you define the weight of the OS subservice to be 2 instead of 1 that is the default for all subservices, OS is weighted more when the status of the service is calculated. However, the weight is not taken as an absolute number, but as a fraction of all subservices and messages. Service Navigator calculates the factor by using the following formula:

Weighting Factor =	Factor of a subservice/message
weighting ration =	Sum of all factors of all subservices/messages

The following example assumes that factor 2 is attributed to OS whereas all other subservices have default factor 1. In addition, the messages targeting the service directly are weighted with message factor 2. The sum of all factors is 8. According to the formula that Service Navigator uses to calculate the factor, the weighting factor for ABAP is: 1 divided by 8 equals 0.125; and the weighting factor for OS is: 2 divided by 8 equals 0.25. The message weighting factor is: 2 divided by 8 equals 0.25. See also "Example: Calculating the Weighting Factor" below.

When calculating the status of a service, Service Navigator multiplies each severity with the factor and arrives at the results shown in "Example: Status Calculation Modified by the Factor " below.

If you now compare the results with "Example: Status Calculation Scenario" on page 228, you can see the effect the weighted subservice OS and the weighted messages have on the overall status calculation. If one of the following was configured:

 Most Critical: the service changes to critical because the highest severity found amongst the subservices (critical) is adopted by the service.

This is not different from the example without the weighting factor ("Example: Status Calculation Scenario" on page 228) because critical is still the highest severity found amongst the subservices and messages.

• Single Threshold 50%: the service changes to major because the severity that first exceeds the threshold of 50% is adopted by the service. In this case the severity major with 50% is the first to exceed the threshold of 50%.

This is not different from the example without the weighting factor ("Example: Status Calculation Scenario" on page 228) because major is still the first to exceed the threshold.

- Multiple thresholds:
 - threshold of 15% for severity critical
 - threshold of 50% for severity major
 - threshold of 60% for severity minor
 - threshold of 70% for severity warning

The service changes to major because the first threshold to be exceeded is 50% (severity major). This is different from the example without the weighting factor (insert link) because critical does not exceed the threshold, but major does. So instead of adopting the severity critical, the service adopts the severity major.

There is no need to specify a threshold for the severity normal because normal is the lowest severity status.

¹The messages directly targeting a service are seen as an entity: the message with the highest severity effects the service.

Service Multi-Status Calculation Views

A service status is, as described in the "Status of a Service" on page 223, a result of the formula for calculating the severity of a service. The service severity is calculated considering the severities of messages targeting the service and of services related to this service. However, services can also reflect the status based on the ownership of messages targeting them.

You can monitor and work with services displayed in the following two status calculation views:

Overall

The service status calculation view based on all messages present in the active message browser.

Operational

The service status calculation view based on all non-owned messages present in the active message browser.

You can realize the differences between these two views best in an actual situation. For example, a message with severity Critical targets a service and colors it red. Consequently, all upper services in the service hierarchy change their color depending on the propagation rule set for them.

The Overall status calculation view displays these services in the same way, irrespective of the targeting message ownership status. In this example, these services are colored red. You can observe this in the object pane, service graph or map, and in the shortcut bar where the nodes containing these services are also colored red.

When you take the ownership of the message, the severity of the service does not change until the message is acknowledged.

If your status calculation view is set to Operational and you take ownership of the message, the severities of the targeted service and all dependent services change back to the severity visible before the message arrives.

The benefit of service multi-status calculation views is that you can get an insight of how the service hierarchy would look if the message targeting a service is acknowledged; in other words, if the problem is solved.

This is very useful, especially if you monitor your services in both calculation views simultaneously, as shown in the following figure.

The following figure shows both Overall and Operational status calculation views. In the service graph presenting the Operational status calculation view, the currently displayed view is clearly indicated in the window title bar. In addition, an icon appears in the bottom right corner to indicate that the currently set view is Operational.

Note: You can monitor the service multi-status calculation changes not only by using the Java GUI. You can integrate the status changes with a third party client. For more details, see *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

Setting Service Status Calculation Views

Service status calculation views are set in the following ways:

• In the ovconfchg configuration file (enabling and setting the default view)

Service status calculation views are enabled and set by the HPOM administrator in the ovconfchg configuration file. The HPOM administrator also specifies the global default calculation view that is displayed every time you start Service Navigator. It is also possible to rename the service status calculation views. For more information, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

• In the Preferences dialog box (setting the default view)

Even though the HPOM administrator sets the status calculation views, you do not have to accept all these settings. You can set your custom status calculation view if more than one is enabled in the

ovconfchg configuration file. You can achieve this by selecting the status calculation view in the Services tab in the Preferences dialog box. For more details about the Preferences dialog box, see the section "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

• From the 'calculation' toolbar drop-down list (only for the currently active service graph or map)

The service status calculation view set using the toolbar list is displayed within the currently active service graph or map, but it does *not* change the default calculation view in the object pane or in the shortcut bar. If no service graph or map is currently active, the 'calculation' drop-down list is disabled.

For more details about the 'calculation' drop-down list, see the section "Toolbar Icons and Dropdown Lists" on page 286.


Note: As soon as you restart the Java GUI, these changes on service graphs and maps are lost, and the default status calculation view is reset again.

• From the service graph's or map's pop-up menu (for the currently active service graph or map only)

This is an alternative to the toolbar 'calculation' drop-down list that can be used when the services toolbar is turned off. The service status calculation view that is set using the service graph's or map's pop-up menu is displayed within the currently active service graph or map, but it does *not* change the default calculation view in the object pane. As with the 'calculation' drop-down list, the default calculation view is reset after the Java GUI is restarted.

Setting Watermarks on Service Graphs and Maps

To easily differentiate between two service status calculation views, you can set watermarks on service graphs and maps for any of the status calculation views. A watermark represents the text displayed in the background of a service graph or a map. The following figure shows an example of a custom watermark for the Overall status calculation view.



You can enable and customize watermarks for any of the calculation views in the Watermark Advanced Setting dialog box that is accessible in one of the following ways:

• From the Preferences dialog box

To open the Watermark Advanced Setting dialog box, click the **Advanced** button in the Services tab in the Preferences dialog box. For more details about the Preferences and the Watermark Advanced Setting dialog boxes, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336 and "Watermark Advanced Settings Dialog Box" on page 345.

• From the service graph's or map's pop-up menu

To open the Watermark Advanced Setting dialog box, select the Watermark Settings option from the Service Status Calculation pop-up menu. Right-click the area in the bottom right corner of the service graph or map to access the menu. For more details on the Watermark Advanced Setting dialog box, see the "Watermark Advanced Settings Dialog Box" on page 345.

Enabling and Disabling Customized Watermarks

To enable or disable one ore more already customized watermarks on the service graphs and maps, use the Show Watermark on Service Graphs and Maps check box in the Services tab in the Preferences dialog box.

This check box is automatically selected if you enable the watermark for at least one of the status calculation views in the Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box. Likewise, if you disable watermarks for both status calculation views in the Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box, the Show Watermark on Service Graphs and Maps check box is automatically cleared.

For more details about the Preferences and the Watermark Advanced Settings dialog boxes, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336 and "Watermark Advanced Settings Dialog Box" on page 345.

Mapping Messages to Services

HPOM generates a message as a result of an event or a change of the status on a managed node. If the event matches preconfigured filters (that is, the HPOM message conditions), the message is generated, formatted, and then sent to the responsible user. If the event does not match the filtering criteria, the event is ignored.

Formatting consists of attaching attributes to the message. Attributes are, for example, the node or the application on which the event happened, the object that was affected, or the message group of the message.

Service Navigator enables you to attach a service name as an additional attribute to the message. If an event occurs on a managed object and this event matches the filtering criteria, HPOM generates a message and attaches the service name as an attribute to this message. The service name of the message is then compared with the service names in your hierarchy. If the service name of the message is matched by a service name in the hierarchy, the message is sent to the GUI of the user to whom that service is assigned.

The comparison of a service message with a service can take place on the node that generated the message or on the management server, depending on how the HPOM administrator has configured the system.

When mapping messages to services, you should first consider what the problem is, and then which service is affected, before setting the service name.

The service name can be set by using the opcmsg(1) parameter.

Example:

/opt/OV/bin/OpC/opcmsg application=appl \
object=obj msg_text=msg_text service_id=service_id

For more information, see the *opcmsg(1)* manual page.

Naming the service takes place when you define the service in the configuration file. Service names must be unique for each service so that HPOM can identify the service and map messages to that service. Note that the service name can contain HPOM variables and can make use of a pattern-matching mechanism.

This mechanism enables you to keep your HPOM policies as generic as possible, namely by using variables to match service names, and by using one policy to match services.

Service Navigator GUI

When you start the Service Navigator GUI, you see that the HPOM Java GUI is extended to include the following:


- service tree in the scoping pane on the left
- additional toolbar buttons
- additional options in the menu bar and pop up menu

Service Graphs, Submaps, and Custom Service Maps

The following figure shows a service submap and a service graph in the Service Navigator GUI.



Service Graphs

Service Navigator displays a simple hierarchical view of services through a service tree in the scoping pane of the GUI. This information can also be graphically presented in the content area with service graphs. These are graphical representations of the hierarchy of services and their subservices. Service graphs are dynamic and are updated whenever the severity of a displayed service changes. To expand the hierarchy, click the **PLUS SIGN (+)** below the icon label. To collapse the hierarchy, click the **MINUS SIGN (-)**.

You can select one or more service icons, and apply any operation from the right-click pop-up menu. For an example of a service graph, see the following figure.

Note: You can also double-click a service icon in the service graph to expand or collapse the service hierarchy below. If the service's submap is defined to be displayed with the background image display, it will be opened instead.

Service Submaps

Service submaps are graphical representations of subservices of a selected service. No hierarchical information is displayed. Service submaps are most useful for providing a clear view of the status of the subservices within parent services when hierarchical relationships are not of primary interest. For an example of a service submap, see the following figure.


Subservice submaps of the current service submap are accessed by double-clicking the service icon.

Enhancing Service Submaps

Service submaps can be enhanced with alternative background images (for example, a network schematic or a country map). You can also define the display position of subservice icons on the background image to create clearer overview of the services being managed. For example, position service icons over their geographical locations on a country map.

The customized Service Submap window of a service can be split into two horizontal panes if there are services without any positional information. These icons are then placed in the lower pane.

The following figure shows the service submap of the Friuli branch service. The Friuli branch service has some subservices located on the submap background and others without positional information placed in the lower pane.



Note: These options are available in the Java GUI only if previously configured by the HPOM administrator.

For information on how to customize your service submaps, see the HPOM Administrator's Reference.

Custom Service Maps


Custom service maps are graphical representations of services. Multiple services from the service hierarchy can be selected and displayed within a custom service map. Custom service maps are very useful for maintaining an overview of the most important services or even displaying them on a large screen in the IT Center.

Labeling Services

All service icons are identified by using a label. The label appears below an icon in the shortcut bar, the service graph, the service submap, and the custom service map. Additional text or image labels can also be displayed by service icons. An unlimited number of labels can be applied to an icon, the practical limitation being the space available on the display.

Additional labels are used to display information that is important for monitoring the service. For example, the CPU load of the systems that are hosting the service can be displayed as a numerical value and as a bar graph for at-a-glance information. An example of how these labels can be applied to service icons is shown in the following figure.

A collection of reserved service attribute names that are recognized by the GUI are used for labeling. For more information, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.



Note: These options are available in the Java GUI only if previously configured by the HPOM administrator.

There are two ways of labeling services by using reserved service attributes:

Service Configuration File

As part of the service configuration file. The values for these labels are acquired at Service Navigator startup and cannot be changed or removed during the current session.

• Dynamically

It is also possible to automatically update the text or the image of a label and display the most up-todate information by using the messages. The refresh rate is determined by that set for the message browser.

For more information, see the HPOM Administrator's Reference.

Personalizing Your Service Graph and Map View

When operating with many service graphs and maps, especially large ones, it can become difficult to access a particular service or to easily navigate through the graph or map.

You can personalize your service graph and map views in Service Navigator to obtain a more focused overview of the services and make easier to work with them.

You can achieve this by using the following Service Navigator features:

- "Service Graph and Map Zooming" below
- "Navigating Through Service Graphs and Maps" on the next page
- "Easy Scrolling and Repositioning of Services in Service Graphs " on page 247
- "Making Selections in Service Graphs" on page 246
- "Customizing Font Size in Service Graphs and Maps" on page 248
- "Customizing Font Size in Service Graphs and Maps" on page 248

Note: Zooming and navigating are supported in both service graphs (including Service Root Cause Graph and Service Impact Graph) and service maps. Easy scrolling, repositioning of services, and making selections are supported *only* in service graphs.

Service Graph and Map Zooming

You can set the size of service graphs and maps by using the manual and automatic zooming adjustments of the following zooming commands:

- "Service Graph and Map Quick Zooming" below
- "Setting Default Zoom Ratio" on the next page

Service Graph and Map Quick Zooming

You can instantly magnify or reduce your view of the service graph or map in the following ways:

· By using the 'zoom' drop-down list from the toolbar

From the 'zoom' toolbar drop-down list, select a value from a predefined set of proportional zoom ratios expressed in percentages, from 5% to 100%.

There are two other zoom options available from the 'zoom' toolbar drop-down list:

• Fit

The Fit zoom option zooms the whole service graph or map, so that it fits exactly into the current window.

• Custom

The Custom zoom option opens the Zoom Settings dialog box where you can specify the overall zoom ratio, the horizontal, and the vertical zoom ratio, as shown in the following figure.

• By using the Zoom Settings pop-up menu

The options available from the 'zoom' toolbar drop-down list are also available from the Zoom Settings pop-up menu.

To raise the Zoom Settings pop-up menu, right-click any empty (white) area of the Service Graph or Service Submap window.

Setting Default Zoom Ratio

You can set the zoom ratio that is used each time a new service graph or a new map is opened in the Services tab in the Preferences dialog box.



Navigating Through Service Graphs and Maps

Navigating by Using the Navigation Panel

The Navigation Panel is a resizable window that helps you to easily navigate through the whole service graph or map area and to get a better overview of the services.

The following figure shows the Navigation Panel and Service Graph windows in the Service Navigator workspace.



The view box in the Navigation Panel window represents the boundaries of the service graph area that is displayed in the Service Graph window.

Note: A Navigation Panel window in one pane has no influence on another pane. If you want to navigate through service submaps that are split into two horizontal panes, such as service submaps with a geographical display, you must use the Navigation Panel window in each pane to navigate through that pane.

When two service maps or submaps are displayed, you can switch the target for the Navigation Panel window by clicking the title bar of a service (sub)map where you want to navigate.

If the entire service graph or map is not visible in the current workspace, you can use the Navigation Panel window to bring another area of the service graph into view by dragging the view box over the Navigation Panel window.

It is also possible to magnify or reduce the size of the service graph or the map area visible in the Service Graph or Service Submap window. You can achieve this by manually resizing the view box in the Navigation Panel window.

You can also magnify or reduce the size of the Navigation Panel window by using the Navigation Closeup pop-up menu, as shown in the following figure.

Note: You can also use the Navigation Panel window to navigate through the Service Impact Graph and Service Root Cause Graph windows.

The Navigation Panel window can be enabled or disabled in one of the following ways:

- By selecting View > Navigation Panel from the menu bar.
- By choosing the Toggle Navigation Panel icon from the toolbar.

Navigating from the Toolbar

The Go to Service drop-down list is available only from the toolbar list. This drop-down list is part of the Service Toolbar component. It contains a list of all services currently present in the Java GUI cache that can be displayed within the selected service graph.

Note: You can use the Go to Service drop-down list for navigating only from service graphs.

When you select a service and click the **Go** button on the service toolbar, the service is displayed in the center of a service graph surrounded by its neighboring services. This way you can easily navigate through your service graph.

Note: If the Service Load on Demand option from the **Edit > Preferences** dialog box is enabled, only the names of the services that are currently retrieved from the management server are displayed in the

Go to Service drop-down list.

Making Selections in Service Graphs

In large service graphs with many service icons and connection lines, it can be difficult to determine relationships between service icons.

To easily distinguish between service icons and determine the relationships among them, you can do one of the following:

Select service icons

When you select a service icon, all connection lines to its subsequent services are highlighted, as shown in the following figure.

Multiple selections of service icons, either by using the CTRL key or a mouse (lasso selections), are also possible.

Highlight connection lines

It is possible to highlight any connection line among service icons to determine their relationships.

Note: You can select the service icons and their connection lines only in active Service Graph windows. When the Service Graph window becomes inactive, all selections are no longer highlighted.

Easy Scrolling and Repositioning of Services in Service Graphs

The following features make your work with the service graphs easier:

Easy scrolling

You can scroll the whole service graph area by dragging it with the mouse, without need to use the scroll bars. The dragging continues even if you move the mouse outside the Service Graph window.


Repositioning of service icons

You can reposition service icons and their connection lines by using drag and drop. If several service icons are selected, you can simultaneously move them over the service graph area.

You can switch between the customized and the auto service layout. The auto service layout assumes the original (default) state of service icons positioning. When you change the position of service icons, the layout switches to the customized. If you switch back to the auto service layout, the positioning is restored to the previous state (default). All new changes made in this layout are now reflected in the new customized layout, while the changes made previously are lost unless saved to the console session settings file.

Easy scrolling and repositioning of service icons make it much easier to determine the connections that belong to particular services as well as allow you to personalize the service graph shape. The following figure shows the repositioned Internet Services icon.

Note: You can move service icons outside service graphs and maps, and you can also move service graphs and maps outside the workspace pane. To learn more about Java GUI drag and drop operations, see "Performing Drag and Drop Operations" on page 51.



Note: Any action that changes the service graph structure, such as expand or collapse, restores the service icons to their default positions.

Customizing Font Size in Service Graphs and Maps

You can customize the font size in service graphs and maps in one of the following ways:

• By using the 'font size' drop-down list from the toolbar

You can change the font size in your currently active service graph or map by choosing one of the available values from the 'font size' toolbar drop-down list.

• By specifying the value in the Zoom Settings dialog box

You can set the font size in your currently active service graph or map by specifying a value in the Zoom Settings dialog box.

Note: In the Zoom Settings dialog box, you can also set the overall zoom ratio, the horizontal, and the vertical zoom ratio, as shown in the following figure.

The Zoom Settings dialog box opens when you choose the Custom option from the 'zoom' toolbar drop-down list or from the Zoom Settings pop-up menu in your Service Graph or Service Submap window. To learn more about the Zoom Settings dialog box, see "Service Graph and Map Zooming" on page 243.

• By setting the default value in the Preferences dialog box

You can set the font size that is used each time a new service graph or a new map is opened in the Services tab in the Preferences dialog box.

Note: You can also set the general font size that applies to all Java GUI components except for the service graphs and maps. For more information, see "Customizing the Font Size" on page 189.

Customizing the Size of Service Icons and Severity Status Indicators

To avoid the overlap between service icons and severity status indicators in large service graphs and maps, you can customize the size of service icons and severity status indicators by using the service_icon_zoom parameter of the itooprc resource file. Its default value is 100 (%), which is the original size of these icons and indicators, and can be set from 1 through 100. The service_icon_zoom parameter can also be used in ito_op_applet.html.

Saving the Service Graph Layout

You can save the service graph layout according to your own arrangement of the services, except for the Root Cause and Impact Static Service graphs. The saved information includes the position of the services and the expanded status of the services.

There are two types of layout, the auto layout, which is the default layout, and the custom layout. The toggle button enables you to switch between the auto and the custom layout on a currently selected service graph. If it is ON, the custom layout is enabled. If it is OFF, the auto layout is enabled.

Loading Services on Demand

Loading services on demand enables you to specify the number of levels in a service hierarchy that are retrieved from the management server, instead of retrieving the entire service tree.

This is especially useful in environments with slow connection lines, such as ISDN or PSTN, or in environments with large service configurations. It enables you to load only the necessary configuration, and therefore to reduce the time needed for the Java GUI startup and to decrease the overall load of the Java GUI.

The retrieval of levels in a service hierarchy is a transfer of service information from the management server to the Java GUI. The retrieved service information is stored in the Java GUI cache.

However, not all service information stored in the Java GUI cache is displayed at once. It can be displayed as follows:

- At the Java GUI startup, by default only the top-level service and its subservices (level 1) are displayed in the service tree or graph, regardless of the number you specified for the hierarchical levels to be retrieved. Nevertheless, if you saved services to console settings from any previous Java GUI session, the saved configuration is displayed.
- After the Java GUI startup, you can display the retrieved levels in a service hierarchy in one of the following ways:
 - By expanding any service icon from the last displayed hierarchical level. This displays the next level in a graph or an object pane.
 - By using the Expand Service Graph Level toolbar icon. The next level is expanded from the selected service. This icon can be used to expand services only in a service graph.

 By expanding the services using the pop-up menu of the selected service, in a service graph and in an object pane. This way you can expand more than one level at once, as described in "Example of Expanding More Hierarchical Levels by Using the Pop-up Menu" on the next page.

The hierarchical levels of services are retrieved by the Java GUI at its startup and on every subsequent user's request.

A user's request is any request for particular services that are currently not present in the Java GUI, such as expanding services. Services can be expanded, for example, by using the Expand Service Graph option from the pop-up menu of the selected service.

Every user's request retrieves the specified number of levels in a service hierarchy from the management server. However, there are special cases when more levels than specified are retrieved. These are the following:

- A message arrives with the name of the service that has not yet been retrieved from the management server. If you choose Select Service in Object Pane from the pop-up menu of the message, this service, together with all missing services on its path from the root service, is retrieved from the management server.
- Services that have been saved to console settings, as well as all missing services on their path from the root service, will also be retrieved from the management server at the Java GUI startup.

Loading services on demand is enabled by default. You can disable this feature or change the settings in the Services tab in the Preferences dialog box. All changes made in this pane are automatically stored in the itooprc file and take effect immediately.

Note: The Services tab is grayed out and thus *not* accessible if no services are assigned to the operator currently using the Java GUI.

For more information about the Services tab of the Java GUI Preferences dialog box, see "Preferences Dialog Box" on page 336.

When you disable loading services on demand, you are notified through the HPOM Communications Status window that the reload of configuration is in progress. This is because the Java GUI retrieves the entire service tree from the management server. When this option is enabled again, the configuration will not reload because it is already present in the Java GUI.

In addition to setting the number of levels in a service hierarchy, the following can also be configured:

• An automatic reload of the service configuration when a change occurs on the management server.

When this is enabled, the service tree or graph always reflects the latest configuration on the management server. After the automatic reload, the service graph and the object pane layouts remain unchanged.

 A possibility to retain services in the Java GUI cache displayed in any service graph or object pane, visible or minimized. All other retrieved services are removed from the cache. Next time you make a request for services that are no longer stored in the cache, they must be reloaded from the management server.

This reduces memory consumption in the Java GUI while maintaining performance.

Example of Expanding More Hierarchical Levels by Using the Pop-up Menu

The following example describes how to expand more than one hierarchical level at once by using the pop-up menu of a selected service.

The following figure shows the service graph marked with number 1 shows the selected E-mail service and its subservices America and Europe. The Europe service is expanded by one hierarchical level.

If you choose the Expand Service Graph option from the E-mail service pop-up menu, the Expanding Tree or Graph dialog box appears. In this dialog box, you can choose to expand one of the following:

• OK

Only part of the service tree or graph, which means the part that is already retrieved from the management server.


• Expand All

Service tree or graph that shows all subservices of the selected service.

In the service graph marked with number 2, where only part of the service graph was expanded, you can observe which services are retrieved from the management server when the Europe service was expanded.

The service graph marked with number 3 shows all subservices of the E-mail service.

During the retrieval of services from the management server, indication lights in the Java GUI status bar change their color to indicate that services are being transferred. For more information, see "Status Bar" on page 43.



Service Logging and Reporting

A critical aspect of IT management is the capability to generate reports about your service delivery performance.

If configured, Service Navigator creates a log entry in the HPOM database whenever a service changes the severity. Reports retrieve the logs from the HPOM database and display the information in

the graphical or statistical form. You can design and generate your own reports or use the service reports that are bundled with HP Reporter.

Service reports cover a wide range of reports, starting from reports about the current status of a service, to reports about trends based on historical status data. The following Service Navigator reports are bundled with HP Reporter:

Service availability

This report displays the duration of a service in each status. Each status is presented in percent using a pie chart. Alternatively, a bar chart can be displayed. The report is based on all status logs in the HPOM database.

Message trend by service

This report displays the number of messages received for each service over time. It is based on all active and history messages in the HPOM database that affect a service. The report displays a line graph for each service.

• Top active messages by service

This report displays the three services with the highest number of active messages, broken down by severity. The report is based on all active messages in the HPOM database and displays a bar chart.

For more information about these reports, see the HP Reporter documentation. For information about the contents of the HPOM database and how to design and generate your own reports, see the *HPOM Reporting and Database Schema*.

Service logging is easily enabled (or disabled) by using a Service Navigator command line tool. Command line tools are also available to download or upload service data from or into the HPOM database. This can be useful for database maintenance purposes. See *HPOM Administrator's Reference* for more information.

The service logging file lists the services for which logging is enabled and is placed at the following location:

/etc/opt/OV/share/conf/OpC/mgmt_sv/opcsvcm/loggings

Note: Never edit the service logging file directly.

Managing Problems with Service Navigator

In addition to monitoring the managed objects in your environment, Service Navigator allows you to monitor services. As a result, you can focus on the status of the services for which you are responsible and watch for any changes in their severity levels.

In general, the HPOM logical problem-solving model also applies to Service Navigator:

Detecting Problems

If a problem occurs on one of the managed objects that affects one of your managed services, a message arrives in your message browser informing you of the problem. The severity status of the service also changes to reflect the new situation. For details, see "Detecting Problems with HPOM and Service Navigator" below.

Investigating Problems

By using a filtered message browser, you can find out where and why the problem affecting the service has occurred. In addition, the Get Root Cause and Get Impacted Services analyses show you where the cause of the problem lies, and which other services are affected. For details, see "Investigating Problems with HPOM and Service Navigator" on page 258.

Solving Problems

HPOM provides a number of tools to help you solve the problem (for example, automatic or operatorinitiated actions, operator instructions, and tools). In addition, the HPOM administrator may have configured service-specific actions. For details, see "Solving Problems with HPOM and Service Navigator" on page 260.

Documenting Solutions

The problem management process is documented by instructions and annotations associated with each message. Instructions and annotations can serve as a helpful reference the next time the problem arises. For details, see "Documenting Solutions with HPOM and Service Navigator" on page 261.

After you solve a problem and document its solution, you acknowledge the message that alerted you to the problem in the first place. Acknowledging a message moves it from your active message browser to the history database. You can access the message again by opening the filtered history message browser.

Viewing Services

Services in the managed environment are displayed hierarchically in the object pane. If a problem occurs on one of your managed objects that affects a service for which you are responsible, the severity status of the service changes to reflect the new situation.

The service can change severity because one of its subservices changes severity, or because a message that directly affects the service arrives. In this case, the subservices of the service do not change the severity, only the parent service itself adopts a new status.

Viewing Services in the Object Pane

To view services in the object pane, do one of the following:

• Expand the Object Tree

In the object pane, do one of the following:

- Double-click the Services icon.
- Click the plus icon (+).

Collapse the Object Tree

In the object pane, click the minus icon (-).

Viewing Services in a Custom Map

To view services in a custom map, follow these steps:

- 1. Click the Services tab. In the displayed pane, right-click the service you want to monitor.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, select **Show in Custom Map**.

A new client window opens, displaying the subservices of the selected service in a service submap.

Note: If configured by the HPOM administrator, icons in the custom map can also show dynamic

labels with textual information and images that give you more information about the specific services at a glance.

Viewing Service Details

It may be useful to get detailed information about the general configuration of a service. The Service Properties dialog box contains details of the current configuration of the service.

To view service details, follow these steps:

- 1. In the object pane, right-click the service for which you want details.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, select Properties.

The Service Properties dialog box opens.

3. When you finish reviewing the details of the service, click **OK**.

Viewing Service-related Messages

The standard HPOM message browser displays all messages generated from the managed objects for which you are responsible. If you want to view only the messages that are related to a specific service, open a filtered message browser with corresponding filtering criteria.

To view service-related messages, follow these steps:

- 1. In the object pane, select the service that is affected.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Right-click the selected message to open a pop-up menu, and then select either Filtered Active Browser or Filtered History Browser.
 - From the menu bar, select Actions: Filtering > New Active Filtered Browser, and then select the filter criteria in the Filter Messages dialog box, as shown in the following figure.

Finding a Service in Multiple Service Hierarchies

Note: This section is only relevant for you if the HPOM administrator uses HP Operations Service Configuration for Service Navigator to configure services. Service Configuration is a graphical user interface for configuring service hierarchies for Service Navigator.

In Service Configuration, a service can have multiple parent services. This means that in the Java GUI, the same service can appear in multiple service hierarchies, each time having a different status and different associated actions.

A change in the status of one occurrence of the service does not necessarily mean that the status of all other occurrences also changes. However, it is good practice to identify all hierarchies that contain the service to ensure that other services are not impacted. Because all occurrences of the same service share the same identifier (the original ID), the Java GUI lets you easily identify all occurrences of the service.

To find a service in multiple service hierarchies, follow these steps:

- 1. In the object pane, right-click the service for which you want to find other services with the same original ID.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, select **Find in Service Views...**.

The Service Views dialog box opens.

The Service column contains all services that have the same original ID as the service for which you started the search. The Root Service column lists the root service of each service hierarchy that contains an identified service.

3. Select one of the identified services, and then click **Show Graph**. A service graph opens with the selected service highlighted.

Note: You can also double-click a service to open the service graph.

4. When you finish with the search results, click **Close** to close the Service Views dialog box.

Investigating Problems with HPOM and Service Navigator

After HPOM has detected a problem in your managed environment, you should investigate the problem. This section explains how to use either the message browser headline or the Message Properties dialog box to determine the details of the problem, including when it happened, on what node, how severe the problem is, and if any actions are preconfigured to solve the problem. The history database is also a good resource for investigating how similar problems have been solved previously.

Highlighting an Affected Service

After you have investigated the problem, you can easily highlight the service which is affected in the object pane.

To highlight an affected service with a fastlink, follow these steps:

- 1. In the message browser, right-click the message you are investigating.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, select Select Service in Object Pane.

HPOM highlights the service in the object pane. You can now further investigate the problem by starting the detailed Get Root Cause or Get Impacted Services analysis. For details, see "Identifying the Root Cause of a Problem" below and "Identifying Impacted Services" below.

Identifying the Root Cause of a Problem

It may be difficult for you to determine whether the service itself or one or more subservices has caused the service to change its severity. Service Navigator provides you with a get-root-cause analysis tool that lets you quickly find the service that caused the severity to change.

To identify the root cause of a problem, follow these steps:

- 1. Select the service in the object pane that caused the severity change.
- 2. Right-click the service, and then select Get Root Causes from the pop-up menu.

A new client window opens displaying Service Root Cause Graph for the service. You can now identify the subservice that caused the status change.

Identifying Impacted Services

A subservice contained in a parent service can also be used by another service. As a result, a change of the severity not only affects the immediate parent service, but also all other services that use the

subservice. To quickly determine which other services are affected by a change of the severity, Service Navigator displays all impacted services in Service Impact Graph.

Note: Subservices not impacted by the problem are not displayed in Service Impact Graph although they are subservices of the selected parent service.

However, Service Impact Graph may display additional impacted parent services that are not assigned to you. This is because the impact analysis is done on the entire service hierarchy regardless of any service assignments.

To identify impacted services, follow these steps:

- 1. In the object pane, right-click the service.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, select Get Impacted Services.

A new client window opens displaying Service Impact Graph for your service. The service you had selected and all services that are affected by the problem appear as icons in the graph.

Performing a Service Action

You can check if an action is configured for the service by viewing the service details.

To perform a service action, follow these steps:

- 1. In the object pane, right-click a service.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, select Start, and then choose the service action you want to execute.


The type of service action, either a web application or a command, determines how the output of the action is displayed:

- If a web application is started, a web browser opens.
- If a command is started, the output is displayed in a new workspace pane window.

Starting a Tool from a Service

To start a tool from a service, follow these steps:

- 1. Click the Services tab. In the displayed pane, right-click a service or a subservice.
- 2. From the pop-up menu, choose the tool you want to start.



Note: You can also start regular tools from the Service menus. For example, you can quickly run a background task on the management server while simultaneously viewing the service tree.

The final step in the HPOM problem-solving model is to document solutions. This step facilitates problem management in the future. To document solutions, you modify message instructions and move

resolved problems from the message browser to the history database by acknowledging them.

Chapter 3: Troubleshooting

General Troubleshooting

In general, if you encounter problems with HPOM, you should check error messages and make a note of all related symptoms.

• "Checking Error Messages" below

You can check error messages in the error dialog box, MS-DOS, or terminal window, and error log files.

• "Analyzing Symptoms" below

You can analyze the facts, the scope, the context, and duration of the problem.

Checking Error Messages

If you encounter a problem, you can check error messages in the following locations:

• Error Dialog Box

The error dialog box that pops up when an error occurs.

MS-DOS or Terminal Window

The MS-DOS or the terminal window that was used to start the GUI.

• Error log files

Error log files on the management server:

/var/opt/OV/log/OpC/mgmt.sv

For other supported agent platforms, ask your HPOM administrator for the location of the error log files.

Analyzing Symptoms

If you encounter a problem, make a note of the following related symptoms:

• Facts

Write down the following facts:

- Did you receive an error message?
- Did the user interface hang or crash?
- Did you receive a communication error?
- Scope

Determine which components are affected by the problem:

- Distinguish between GUI and server problems.
- If you suspect a problem is related to the server, try to duplicate the problem on a different GUI client to find out whether it is a client-specific problem.
- Context

Determine if anything is changed in your managed environment or with the product configuration:

- Hardware
- Software
- Files
- Security
- Name services
- Routing
- Utilization

Duration

Determine a time pattern, if any:

- How long did the problem last?
- How often did the problem occur?
- Is the problem consistent or intermittent?
 - Consistent

Fails every time

• Intermittent

Fails only sometimes

Specific Troubleshooting

These sections describe solutions to specific problems you may encounter:

Java GUI Does Not Start

If you receive an error message when trying to log on, make sure the management server is reachable and that the HP Operations server processes are running on the management server.

Problem

After entering the log-on information, you receive an error box with the following message:

Management server is not running.

Solution

To solve this problem, follow these steps:

1. Make sure the HP Operations management server is reachable.

Try the ping command from an MS-DOS terminal window:

ping <HP_Operations_management_server>

 Make sure the HP Operations server processes are running on the management server. Ask your HPOM administrator to check the status of the server processes.

HPOM Tool Does Not Start

If you can no longer start a tool set up in HPOM on a managed node, either adapt the start-up configuration of the HPOM default tool or use customized start-up options.

Problem A

A tool is upgraded, and its command path, access security, or something else has been changed.

Solution A

Adapt the start-up configuration of the HPOM default tool accordingly.

Problem B

The user's password for start-up configuration of the default tool is changed.

Solution **B**

Use customized tool startup options.

For details, see "Customizing the Start-up Attributes of a Tool" on page 165.

Problem C

A tool with no graphical interface, such as cmd.exe and telnet, does not appear to be running at the startup.

Solution C

Because the tool has no graphical interface, it is not visible, even though it is running. Starting tools like this one has to be properly configured by the HPOM administrator when assigning Java GUI operator defaults. For more information, refer to the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

Action Does Not Complete

If an automatic action, an operator-initiated action, or a scheduled action hangs and does not terminate, kill the specific process and modify the related policy condition, script, or command.

Problem

An automatic action, an operator-initiated action, or a scheduled action hangs and does not finish because of programming errors, requests for user input, and so on.

Solution

To solve the problem, follow these steps:

- 1. Run the ps command to determine the process ID of the endlessly running action.
- 2. Run the kill command for the specific process ID.
- 3. To prevent the problem from recurring, do one of the following:
 - Change the related policy condition.
 - Fix the script or the command.

Colors Do Not Display Properly

If a window opens but contains nothing except a single color or squares of colors, select another color scheme and restart HPOM.

Problem

The color scheme on your system has either the identical background and foreground colors or there is not enough color contrast between the foreground and the background. This is more often a problem with the UNIX system's displays than with other platforms (for example, the NorthernSky and Mustard color schemes on HP-UX cause this problem).

Solution

To solve this problem, select another color scheme on your window manager, and then restart HPOM.

Applets Do Not Start in a Workspace

If you want to access web pages that start Java applets in a workspace, the Java GUI itself must be running as an applet.

Problem

When starting a web page that starts a Java applet in a workspace, you receive the following error message:

Attachment to a running Virtual Machine failed

Solution

To solve this problem, the Java GUI itself must be running as an applet. Follow these steps:

- 1. Exit your current GUI session.
- 2. Start the Java GUI with the menu sequence Start: HP Operations for UNIX >JAVA Console Plugin.

Service Navigator Cannot Find the Service Definition

With Service Configuration for Service Navigator, a message can target multiple services. Any service-related message operations (for example opening a service graph from a selected message) therefore affect multiple services. If one of the affected services is not in your responsibility matrix, the following error message appears:

Problem

The Service not found error message appears when you start one of the following operations:

- · Select service or services in Object Pane
- Show Graph(s)
- Show Submap(s)
- Get Impacted Services

Solution

The service you tried to access is not part of your responsibilities and can therefore not be displayed to you.

Error Message is Displayed When Exiting or Logging off from the HTTPS Java GUI

Problem

Keyboard Shortcuts

The Java GUI enables you to type many commands by using the keyboard, without using the mouse.

The Java GUI contains two types of keyboard shortcuts:

Key Accelerators

Key accelerators directly access functionality without opening any menus. Key accelerators are available for the most commonly performed tasks in the Java GUI. An example of a key accelerator is **CRTL+S** that enables you to save the console session settings.

For a list of key accelerators in the Java GUI, see "Java GUI Key Accelerators" below.

Key Mnemonics

Key mnemonics enable you to jump straight to specific menu items by using one or more keystrokes once a menu is opened. Key mnemonics are available for almost all menu commands. Ways for accessing the key mnemonics are different for commands in the menu bar and in pop-up menus:

• Menu Bar

Press and hold down the **ALT** key, and then press the underlined letter of the menu that you want to access. For example, if you want to select File: Save Console Session Settings, press and hold down the **ALT** key, and then press **F** and **S** (**ALT+FS**).

For descriptions of options available in the menu bar, as well as their keyboard mnemonics, see "Menu Bar Items" on page 275.

• Pop-up Menus

Select an item with a right-click, or select an item and press **SHIFT+F10** to get a pop-up menu. For example, if you want to create a filtered active message browser on a particular node, rightclick the node, and then press **A**. Or click the node, press and hold down **SHIFT**, and then press **F10** and **A** (**SHIFT+F10+A**).



Exit (ALT+FX)

Shuts down the Java GUI. Before the Java GUI shuts down, an alert box asks if you want to save any console session changes for future sessions.



- Windows (only on Windows)
- Aqua (only on Mac OS)

Colored Message Lines

Enables you to color the entire message row in the message browser with the severity color of that message.

Application Font Size

Allows you to specify the general font size (in points) that applies to all Java GUI components except for service graphs and maps. The default is 11.

Stay On Top

Enables main and detached windows to stay on top of other windows.

Icon Size in Shortcut Bar

Enables you to control the size (in pixels) of icons. The default is 32.

Show Communications Status dialog

Enables (default) or disables the HPOM Communications Status dialog.

Help Page URL
```

Enables you to change the location of the HPOM online documentation.

```
Sort Owned Severity
```

Enables you to sort owned messages by severity.

Always use external web browser for help page

Enables you to set a different web browser in which the help topics are shown.

Tailored Set of Tools

Enables you to include only tools related to the selected message in the pop-up menus.

Number of Frequently Used Tools

Enables you to specify the number of most frequently used tools that are displayed above the separator line in the Start pop-up menus.

Filtered History Messages Time Period

Enables you to define the time period in which the filtered history messages are loaded.

Preferences: Web Browser Tab

The Web Browser tab in the Preferences dialog box has the following options:

Use external web browser

In non-ActiveX tabs in the workspace pane, selects a web browser external to the Java GUI. In ActiveX tabs in the workspace pane, selects the Microsoft Internet Explorer Active control. Click **Browse** to locate the external web browser on your machine.

Use ActiveX Internet Explorer control

Selects the Microsoft Internet Explorer Active X control. You can activate this control only on an ActiveX tab in the workspace pane.

Preferences: Events Tab

Execute Only for First Message

Sends event notification only for the first message that arrives with a severity equal to or higher than that of the type selected.

Execute for Every New Message

Sends event notification for every new message that arrives with a severity equal to or higher than that of the type selected.

Preferences: Services Tab

The Services tab in the Preferences dialog box has the following options:

Service Load on Demand

Use Service Load on Demand

Enables you to specify the number of levels in a service hierarchy that is retrieved from the management server at the Java GUI startup or at each subsequent user's request. Specify the number of hierarchical levels to be retrieved in the text field provided. Because Service Navigator supports up to 256 hierarchical levels, this is the maximum number that you can specify. The default value is 1.

Automatic Service Reload

Enabled by default. Enables or disables an automatic reload of the service configuration when a change occurs on the management server.

Use Smart Cache Reload

Allows you to keep only currently used services in the Java GUI. Specify the time interval between two smart cache reload invocations in the text field provided. The default value is 30 minutes.

Show Notification Dialog on Configuration Change

Allows you to choose whether you want to be informed about a configuration change. This is possible *only* if Use Service Load on Demand is enabled. Otherwise, it is always enabled and *not* accessible (dimmed).

Show Service Label in Messages

Allows you to display the label of a service in messages in the message browser. If the service label is not loaded into the Java GUI when using the Service Load on Demand functionality, the column displays no text.

Graph Zoom Settings

Zoom

Allows you to specify the preferred zoom value for service graphs or maps from a predefined set of proportional zoom ratios expressed in percentages, from 5% to 100%.

Custom

Allows you to specify the horizontal and vertical zoom values for service graphs or maps from a predefined set of proportional zoom ratios expressed in percentages, from 5% to 100%.

Service Graph Font Size

Allows you to specify the font size

(in points) in service graphs and maps. The default is 11.

Default Service Status Calculation

```
Use Administrator's Settings
```

Enables you to select the default service status calculation view specified by the HPOM administrator. This calculation view is automatically applied for the object pane and for each service graph and map you open.

Use Custom Setting

Enables you to specify the default service status calculation view regardless of the value specified by the HPOM administrator. This calculation view is automatically applied to the object pane and each service graph and map you open.

Show Watermark on Service Graphs and Maps

By selecting this check box you enable watermark or watermarks on service graphs and maps for the specified status calculation views.

This check box is automatically selected if you enable the watermark for at least one of the status calculation views in the Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box. Similarly, if you disable watermarks for both status calculation views in the Watermark Advanced Settings dialog, the Show Watermark on Service Graphs and Maps check box is automatically cleared.

Advanced

Opens the Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box where you enable and customize watermarks on service graphs and maps for any of the status calculation views.

Rename Browser Settings Dialog Box

The Rename Browser Settings dialog box opens when you select Rename from the Browser Settings dialog box. For details, see "Browser Settings Dialog Box" on page 315.

The Rename Browser Settings dialog box contains the following attributes:

Name

New name for the existing filter.

ОК

Saves a copy of the existing filter under the new name entered in the Name field.

Cancel

Closes the dialog box without saving the new filter name.

Rename Message View Filter Dialog Box

The Rename Message View Filter dialog box opens when you click Rename... in the Save Message View Filter or the Load Message View Filter dialog box. Use this dialog box to specify a new name for an already saved message view filter.

The Rename Message View Filter dialog box contains the following options:

Rename Message View Filter

New name for the message view filter.

Saves changes and closes the dialog box.

Cancel

Closes the dialog box without saving changes.

Save Browser Filter Settings Dialog Box

The Save Browser Filter Settings dialog box opens when you click Save... in the Filter Messages dialog box. For details, see "Filter Messages Dialog Box" on page 319.

The Save Browser Filter Settings dialog box contains the following options:

Name

New name for the existing filter.

ОК

Saves a copy of the existing filter under the new name entered in the Name field.

Cancel

Closes the dialog box without saving the new filter name.

Save Message View Filter Dialog Box

The Save Message View Filter dialog box opens when you click Save... in the Message View Filter dialog box. Use this dialog box to save a message view filter under a name so that you can reuse it in the future.

The Save Message View Filter dialog box contains the following options:

Filters

List of currently saved message view filters, sorted by name.

Global

Indicates that the filter is defined by the HPOM administrator. Global filters are available to all users, but can only be modified and saved by the HPOM administrator.

Personal

Indicates that the filter is defined by an HPOM operator for personal use only. Operators can save only personal filters, and administrators cannot save personal filters.

Rename...

Opens the Rename Message View Filter dialog box. For more information, see "Rename Message View Filter Dialog Box" on the previous page.

Delete

Deletes the selected saved message view filter from HPOM.

Name

Name of the message view filter.

Saves changes and closes the dialog box.

Send Message to Operator(s) Dialog Box

The Send Message to Operator(s) dialog box opens when you click File: Send Message to Operator(s)... from the menu bar.

The Send Message to Operator(s) dialog box contains the following options:

Message

Text box where you specify the text to be displayed to the users.

Selected by default. Sends the message to all currently logged on users.

Send to Selected Operators

Enables you to send the message to selected users only. Type the HPOM user name of the operator you want to inform. If you want to inform more than one user, separate the user names with commas.

Closes the dialog box without sending the message.

Service Properties Dialog Box

If Service Navigator is installed, you can open the Service Properties dialog box by selecting Actions: Services > Properties... from the menu bar. Detailed description of the service.

Node to which the service is attached. Service actions are then executed on the specified node.

Service Properties: Actions Tab

The Actions tab of the Services Properties dialog box displays the actions assigned to the selected service or subservice and includes the unique name, the type, and a detailed description of the service action.

Service Properties: Attributes Tab

The Attributes tab of the Services Properties dialog box displays the attributes assigned to the selected service. Service attributes are defined by the administrator and can be used to convey any additional information about a service.

Reserved attributes are used to apply background images to service submaps, position subservice icons in these backgrounds, and add additional labels to service icons. For more information about reserved service attributes, see the *HPOM Administrator's Reference*.

Service Properties: Status Info Tab

The Status Info tab of the Services Properties dialog box has the following options:

Current value of the parameter (for example 3).

Currently enabled one or more service status calculation views (for example, Overall).

Current service status for each enabled calculation view.

Service Properties: Service Mappings Tab

The Service Mappings tab of the Services Properties dialog box displays a list of service names in messages. If the "service name" attribute of a message matches one of the strings in this list or matches the service name in the General tab, the message targets this service. One message can target more than one service.

Service Views Dialog Box

If Service Navigator is installed, you can open the Service Views dialog box by selecting Actions: Services > Find in Service Views... from the menu bar. Or you can right-click a service item in the shortcut bar or the object pane, or a service graph in the workspace pane, and then select Find in Service Views... from the pop-up menu. To find out how to use this dialog box, see "Finding a Service in Multiple Service Hierarchies" on page 257.

The Service Views dialog box has the following columns:

Service

Lists services with the same original ID. (The original ID is displayed in the title bar of the dialog box.) Each service is listed with its label and its name.

Root Service

Lists the root service of each service view that contains the identified service. Each root service is listed with its label and its name.

Watermark Advanced Settings Dialog Box

The Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box opens when you perform one of the following:

- Click the Advanced button in the Services tab of the Edit > Preferences dialog.
- Select the **Watermark Settings** option from the Service Status Calculation pop-up menu. Rightclick the area in the bottom right corner of the service graph or map to access the menu.

The Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box contains the following options:

Enable

By selecting this check box you enable watermarks on service graphs or maps for the specified status calculation view. Select one or more status calculation views for which you want to set the watermark from the drop-down list above the check box.

Settings

Text

Text box where you specify the text to be displayed in the service graph or map background. If you leave this text box empty, the name of the status calculation view for which the watermark is set appears instead. When you change the status calculation view's name on the HP Operations management server, you consequently also change the watermark text.

Font Size

Enables you to set the size of the text you specified to be displayed as a watermark. Valid values range from 1 through 128.

Intensity

Enables you to set the intensity of the watermark expressed in percentages, from 0% through 100%. You can set the intensity by entering a value in the provided text box or by using a slider control.

Angle

Enables you to set the display angle for the watermark expressed in degrees, from -90 through +90. You can set the angle by entering a value in the provided text box or by using a slider control.

The Watermark Advanced Settings dialog box contains the following buttons:

ОК

Applies the settings and closes the dialog box.

Preview

Enables you to preview the settings in the service graph or map without applying them.

Cancel

Closes the dialog box without changing the settings.

Web Browser Properties Dialog Box

The Web Browser Properties dialog box opens when you right-click a web page in an internal web browser in the workspace pane and then select Properties from the pop-up menu. The appearance of the Web Browser Properties window differs depending on the type of web browser (for example, internal, Microsoft Internet Explorer, or Mozilla). If you use Internet Explorer, the Internet Explorer web browser properties dialog box is used.

If you use an internal web browser, the Web Browser Properties dialog box contains the following options:

Switches the workspace pane from Swing to AWT when running applets in the internal web browser. Using AWT prevents applets from running outside the internal web browser.

Note: Switching on AWT can cause some side effects, such as flashing when moving between workspace panes.

Start Customized Tool Wizard

The Start Customized Tool wizard has the following buttons:

Delete

Deletes any node that is highlighted in the node list combination box.

Displays the number of duplicates of the message that are suppressed.

Indicates whether help instructions, automatic actions, and operator-initiated actions exist for the message. For details, see "Message Attributes" below.

Time Received

Date and time the problem occurred.

Node

Node on which the problem occurred.

Tool

Application the message is associated with.

MsgGrp

Major area within the managed environment (for example, the operating system) where the event occurred.

Object

Object the message is associated with (for example, disk or memory).

Message Text

Short description of the event that generated the message.

Message Attributes

This section describes message attributes and flags:

Message Colors

Color coding that indicates the severity of the problem described by the message. For details, see "Message Colors" on the next page.

Message Fields

Attributes summarized in the message headline in the message browser. For details, see "Message Fields" on page 351.

Message Flags

Information about help instructions, automatic actions, and operator-initiated actions that may be associated with the message. For details, see "Message Flags" on page 353.

Message Colors

To help you solve problems, messages are color coded to indicate the severity of the problem they describe. For example, the color coding could indicate that the Normal and Warning messages are generated.

You can configure HPOM to color the entire line in the Message Browser according to the severity of each message (as opposed to the Severity column). To change the color preferences, select **Preferences** from the Edit menu, and then toggle the Colored Message Lines check box.

Levels of Severity

Severity	Icon	Description
Critical	8	The condition that affects a service or a node occurred and therefore the immediate corrective action is needed.
Major	Δ	The problem severity is high and therefore the normal use of the affected object is likely to be impeded.
Minor	Δ	The problem severity is relatively low and therefore the normal use of the affected object is not likely to be impeded.
Warning		A potential or impending service-affecting fault occurred and therefore you must take action to diagnose and correct the problem.
Normal	٩	The message output is as expected and therefore a process may start, complete, and display the status information.
Unknown	٩	The severity level was not defined in the policy running on the managed node for the event that generated the message.

Message Fields

Tool

Name of the tool related to the selected message. Default column label: Tool

Dup.

Flags

Flags associated with the message. For more information about message flags, see "Message Flags" on page 353.

Default column label: SUIAONE

Forward Manager

Manager that passes data to be forwarded to other management servers. Default column label: Not Available

Message Group

Message group to which the selected message belongs. Default column label: MsgGrp

Message Key

Message key that is associated with the selected message. Default column label: Message Key

Message No.

Unique identification number for the selected message. This number is useful when you want to programmatically access to a message by using the open HPOM APIs. Default column label: Message No.

Message Text

Complete text of the selected message. Default column label: Message Text

Message Type

Attribute used by HPOM to divide a set of messages into more manageable subgroups. The message type is defined by the HPOM administrator. Default column label: Message Type

MsgGrp

See Message Group.

No. of Duplicates

Number of duplicate messages that are suppressed. Default column label: Dup.

Node

Managed node from which the selected message was issued. This can be the original node or a different one if the message conditions have been reformatted by the HPOM administrator. Default column label: Node

Object

Object that caused, detected, or was affected by the event. Default column label: Object

Owned By

Current owner of the selected message. Default column label: Owned By

Service Name

Name of one or more services associated with the message. Default column label: Service Name

Service Label

Label of one or more services associated with the message. Default column label: Service Label

Source

Part of a tool from which the selected message came. For example, the source of a message can be a log file name, a console, an SNMP trap, or a threshold monitor.

Default column label: Source

SUIAONE

See Flags.

Time Acknowledged

Date and time the message was acknowledged. Once it is acknowledged, the message is moved from the active message browser to the filtered history message browser. Default column label: Time Acknowledged

Time Created

Date and time the selected message was created on the managed node. Default column label: Time Created

Time Last Received

Date and time the last duplicate message was received on the management server. Default column label: Time Last Received.

Time Owned

Date and time the owner of the message took ownership of the selected message. Default column label: Time Owned

Time Received

Date and time the selected message was received on the management server. Default column label: Time Received

Time Unbuffered

Date and time the message is unbuffered (that is, moved from the filtered pending messages browser to the active messages browser). This time is set by default to the start of the next period of defined service hours for the service to which the message relates. However, you can unbuffer messages manually at any time with the appropriate unbuffer menu option. Default column label: Time Unbuffered

Trouble Ticket

Indicates if the message has a trouble ticket associated to it.

Default column label: Trouble Ticket

Note: If the HPOM Java GUI is running on a system with the time zone setting different from the setting on the HP Operations management server, the time stamps in the messages displayed in the Java GUI are taken from the local system (the system where the Java GUI is running on) and not from the HP Operations management server. See also "ito_op.bat Options" on page 375.

Message Flags

Message flags provide you with the information about help instructions, automatic actions, and operator-initiated actions that may be associated with messages.

The following variables can only be used in tools started from the Java GUI:

\$OPC_ENV(env variable)

Returns the value of the environment variable for the user who started HPOM. Sample output:

PATH, NLS_LANG, EDITOR, SHELL, HOME, TERM.

\$OPC_EXACT_SELECTED_NODE_LABELS

Returns the labels of all nodes and node groups that are selected at the time the tool is executed. The names are separated by spaces.

\$OPC_EXT_NODES

Returns the node pattern of all external nodes that are selected at the time the tool is executed. The names are separated by spaces.

\$OPC_GUI_CLIENT

Executes the tool or the action on the client where the Java GUI is currently running. This variable is resolved differently, depending on whether the GUI client is running on a UNIX-based system with DNS or on a PC using MS WINS (Windows Internet Name Service). If you use WINS, \$OPC_GUI_ CLIENT returns the WINS hostname.

\$OPC_GUI_CLIENT_WEB

Starts a web browser on the client where the Java GUI is currently running. This variable is resolved differently depending on whether the GUI client is running on a UNIX-based system with DNS or on a PC using MS WINS (Windows Internet Name Service). If you use WINS, \$OPC_GUI_CLIENT_WEB returns the WINS hostname.

\$OPC_MGMTSV

Returns the name of the current HP Operations management server. Sample output:

richie.c.com

\$OPC_MSG_IDS

Returns the message IDs (UUIDs) of the messages currently selected in one ore more open message browsers. If the same message is selected in more than one browser, the duplicate selections are ignored. Only message IDs of the messages currently selected in the top-most browser are returned.

\$OPC_MSG_GEN_NODES

Returns the names of all nodes from which currently selected messages were sent by HPOM agents. The names are separated by spaces. The nodes need not be in the node bank. If the same message is selected in more than one of these browsers, the duplicate selections are ignored. Only nodes of the messages currently selected in the top-most browser are returned. Sample output:

\$OPC_MSG_NODES

Returns the names of all nodes on which the events that generated currently selected messages took place. The names are separated by spaces. The nodes need not be in the node bank. If the same message is selected in more than one of these browsers, the duplicate selections is ignored. Only nodes of the messages currently selected in the top-most browser are returned. Sample output:

kernighan.c.com richie.c.com

\$OPC_MSGIDS_ACT

\$OPC_MSGIDS_HIST

Returns the message IDs (UUID) of the messages currently selected in the history message browser. Only Message IDs of the messages currently selected in the top-most browser are returned.

\$OPC_MSGIDS_PEND

Returns the message IDs (UUID) of the messages currently selected in the pending messages browser. Only Message IDs of the messages currently selected in the top-most browser are returned.

Sample output:

edd95828-ac2a-71d0-0360-0f887a7c0000 ee96729a-ada9-71d0-0360-0f887a7c0000

\$OPC_NODES

Returns the names of all regular nodes that are selected at the time the tool is executed. The names are separated by spaces. The nodes need not be in the node bank. Nodes can be selected directly in a submap of the IP Map.

Sample output:

kernighan.c.com richie.c.com

\$OPC_NODE_LABELS

Returns the labels of all nodes in the node tree that are selected at the time the tool is executed. The names are separated by spaces.

\$OPC_USER

Returns the name of the HPOM user who is currently logged on to the management server. Sample output:

opc_adm

Message-related Variables

Parameters for Message-related Variables

There are a few variables that return TRUE or FALSE, depending on the existence of a specific message attribute. For example, if an automatic action is defined, TRUE is returned. Otherwise, FALSE is returned.

If an attribute is empty, an empty string is returned. If you use an attribute that does not exist, it is treated like part of a normal string, which means no evaluation happens and the string remains unchanged.

The data returned from variables is exactly the same type as that shown in the Message Properties dialog box.

The indexing for word extraction from strings and for access to specific annotations starts with 1, not with 0.

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC Indicates whether an automatic action is defined.

Sample output:

TRUE

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.ACKNOWLEDGE

If an automatic action is configured to provide an acknowledgement for the selected message and the actions are successfully completed, this variable returns yes. Otherwise, no is returned.

Sample output:

yes

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.ANNOTATION

If this variable returns yes, an automatic action provides annotations for the selected message. Note that if the action fails, an annotation is always written.

Sample output:

yes

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.COMMAND

Returns the script or the program, including its parameters, performed as an automatic action for the selected message.

Sample output:

dist_del.sh 30 warning

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.NODE

Returns the node on which an automatic action has been performed for the selected message.

Sample output:

kernighan.c.com

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.STATUS

Returns the current status of the message's automatic action. The variable can return running, failed, or successful.

Sample output:

successful

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR

Indicates whether an operator-initiated action is defined.

Sample output:

TRUE

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR.ACKNOWLEDGE

If an operator-initiated action is configured to provide an acknowledgement for the selected message and the actions are successfully completed, this variable returns yes. Otherwise, no is returned.

Sample output:

yes

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR.ANNOTATION

If this variable returns yes, an operator-initiated action provides annotations for the selected message. Note that if the action fails, an annotation is always written.

Sample output:

yes

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR.COMMAND

Returns the script or the program, including its parameters, performed as an operator-initiated action for the selected message.

Sample output:

ps -ef

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR.COMMAND[n]

Returns the *n*th parameter of the script or program, performed as an operator-initiated action for the selected message.

Sample output:

-ef

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR.NODE

Returns the node on which an operator-initiated action is performed for the selected message.

Sample output:

kernighan.c.com

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.OPERATOR.STATUS

Returns the current status of the message's operator-initiated action. The variable can return running, failed, or successful.

Sample output:

successful

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.TROUBLE_TICKET.ACKNOWLEDGE

This variable can return the following values:

yes

The message is automatically acknowledged after being forwarded to a trouble ticket system.

no

The message is not acknowledged after being forwarded to a trouble ticket system.

Sample output:

yes

\$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.TROUBLE_TICKET.STATUS

This variable can return the following values:

yes

The message was forwarded to a trouble ticket system.

no

The message was not forwarded to a trouble ticket system.

Sample output:

yes

\$OPC_MSG.ANNOTATIONS

Indicates whether annotations exist for a message. Returns TRUE if at least one annotation exists for a message. Otherwise, FALSE is returned.

Sample output:

TRUE

\$OPC_MSG.ANNOTATIONS[n]

Returns the *n*th annotation.

Sample output:

Performed Message Correlation;

Message Key Relation:

Message 59d06840-ac4f-71d5-1f67-0f887e320000 with condition id fe00fa34-9e34-71d5-143e-0f887e320000 ackn'ed 0 messages.

\$OPC_MSG.APPLICATION

Returns the name of the tool related to the selected message.

Sample output:

/usr/bin/su(1) Switch User

\$OPC_MSG.ATTRIBUTES

This variable can return the following values:

unmatched

The message did not match any message conditions.

log only

The message was not originally displayed in the message browser.

Sample output:

unmatched

\$OPC_MSG.CREATED

Returns the date and time the message was created on the managed node.

Sample output:

09/18/01 18:08:08

\$OPC_MSG.CREATED.EPOCH

Returns the number of seconds elapsed since January 1, 1970 until the message was created on the managed node.

Sample output:

1302619343

\$OPC_MSG.DUPLICATES

Returns the number of duplicate messages that have been suppressed.

Sample output:

17

\$OPC_MSG.GROUP

Returns the message group to which the selected message belongs.

Sample output:

Security

\$OPC_MSG.INSTRUCTIONS

Returns the text of the instruction.

Sample output:

Available space on the device holding the / (root) filesystem is less than the configured threshold. This may lead to ...

\$OPC_MSG.LAST_RECEIVED

Returns the date and time the last duplicate message was received on the management server.

Sample output:

09/16/09 03:17:23

\$OPC_MSG.LAST_RECEIVED.EPOCH

Returns the number of seconds elapsed since January 1, 1970 until the last duplicate message was received on the management server.

Sample output:

1302619343

\$OPC_MSG.MSG_KEY

Returns the message key that is associated with a message.

Sample output:

my_appl_down:kernighan.c.com

\$OPC_MSG.MSG_ID

Returns the unique identification number for the selected message.

Sample output:

217362f4-ac4f-71d5-13f3-0f887e320000

\$OPC_MSG.NO_OF_ANNOTATIONS

Returns the number of annotations of a message.

Sample output:

3

\$OPC_MSG.NODE

Returns the managed node from which the selected message was issued.

Sample output:

kernighan.c.com

\$OPC_MSG.NODES_INCL_DUPS

Returns the managed node from which the selected message was issued, including duplicate node names for multiple messages from the same node.

Sample output:

kernighan.c.com richie.c.com richie.c.com

\$OPC_MSG.OBJECT

Returns the object that was affected by, detected, or caused the event.

Sample output:

CPU

\$OPC_MSG.ORIG_TEXT

Returns the original text of the selected message.

Sample output:

SU 09/18 18:07 + 6 root-spooladm

\$OPC_MSG.ORIG_TEXT[n]

Returns the *n*th word in the original text of the message.

Sample output:

the

\$OPC_MSG.OWNER

Returns the owner of the selected message.

Sample output:

opc_op

\$OPC_MSG.RECEIVED

Returns the date and time the message was received on the management server.

Sample output:

09/18/01 18:08:10

\$OPC_MSG.RECEIVED.EPOCH

Returns the number of seconds elapsed since January 1, 1970 until the message was received on the management server.

Sample output:

1302619343

\$OPC_MSG.SERVICE

Returns the service name that is associated with the message.

Sample output:

VP_SM:Agent:ServicesProcesses@@kernighan.c.com

\$OPC_MSG.SERVICE_LABEL

Returns the service label that is associated with the message (for example, service label Disk 3 for service name node3_disk).

Sample output:

Disk 3

If there is no service label configured, this variable returns an empty string.

\$OPC_MSG.SERVICE.MAPPED_SVC_COUNT

Returns the number of service names in messages that are mapped to this message.

Sample output:

3

\$OPC_MSG.SERVICE.MAPPED_SVC[n]

Returns the name of the *n*th service name in this message.

Sample output:

Returns the complete text of the selected message.

\$OPC_MSG.TEXT[n]

Returns the *n*th word in the text of the message text.

Sample output:

following

\$OPC_MSG.TIME_CREATED.DAY

Returns the day when the message was created.

Sample output (if the message was created on January 2, 1970 at 10:11:15):

2

\$OPC_MSG.TIME_CREATED.HOURS

Returns the hour when the message was created.

Sample output (if the message was created on January 2, 1970 at 10:11:15):

10

\$OPC_MSG.TIME_CREATED.MINUTES

Returns the minute when the message was created.

Sample output (if the message was created on January 2, 1970 at 10:11:15):

11

\$OPC_MSG.TIME_CREATED.MONTH

Returns the month when the message was created.

Sample output (if the message was created on January 2, 1970 at 10:11:15):

Returns the second when the message was created.

Examples of Message-related Variables

This section contains examples of message-related variables and parameters you can use to perform daily tasks.

Accessing Message Attributes

You can access all message attributes by using the following variable:

\$OPC_MSG.ATTRIBUTES

All you need to do is to add an attribute name.

For example, to get the text of a message, use the following:

\$OPC_MSG.TEXT

When working with attributes that represent strings, you can access a specific word.

For example, to get the fourth word in the text of a message, use the following:

\$OPC_MSG.TEXT[4]

Annotations are an exception to this rule. In annotations, an index specifies the annotations that are returned.

For example, access the seventh annotation of the current selected messages with the following:

\$OPC_MSG.ANNOTATIONS[7]

• Finding Duplicate Messages

If you need information about the number of message duplicates for a tool, use the following:

\$OPC_MSG.DUPLICATES

• Extracting Creation Time and Severity

If you want to perform some statistical calculations, specify the message creation time and the severity as follows:

\$OPC_MSG.CREATED
\$OPC_MSG.SEVERITY

Extracting Message Text

If you defined a template condition that creates a message text with some status as the third word, and you want to extract this status easily and forward it to a tool called evaluate_status, use the following:

evaluate_status \$OPC_MSG.TEXT[3]

• Evaluating Action Attributes

If you want to use and evaluate action attributes, you can write shell scripts that check for automatic and operator-initiated actions, and get more information about their status and if they are annotated:

<script_name> \$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC

<script_name> \$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.STATUS

<script_name> \$OPC_MSG.ACTIONS.AUTOMATIC.ANNOTATION

The first parameter is TRUE if an automatic action was defined for the message. This script is useful only if there are more attributes used afterwards, but not for checking whether each attribute is an empty string.

Accessing Annotations

To access the second annotation of a selected message in a tool, use the following: **\$OPC_MSG.ANNOTATIONS[2]**

Updating Duplicated Severity

When suppressing or counting duplicate messages, the severity and the text of the message that first appears in the browser is retained. When the new incoming message has a different severity or a message text, these new values are displayed instead of the previous data.

To update the severity of the original message, run the following command:

ovconfchg -ovrg server -ns opc -set \ OPC_UPDATE_DUPLICATED_SEVERITY LAST_MESSAGE

Updating Duplicated Message Text

To update the text of an original message, run the following command:

ovconfchg -ovrg server -ns opc -set \OPC_UPDATE_DUPLICATED_MSGTEXT LAST_MESSAGE

itoopbrw File

HPOM administrators can use the *itoopbrw* file to customize the attributes of the current message browser.

Note: If a message view filter is applied to a message browser when the browser layout is saved, the message view filter definition is also saved in the *itoopbrw* file. For more information about the syntax used in message view filters, see "Setting Up Message View Filters" on page 124.

Parameters for the itoopbrw File

The itoopbrw file uses the following parameters:

ACTIVE

Values for the Active message browser filter.

ALIGN

Keyword identifying the alignment information for the specified column.

ASCEND

Direction of sorting: from beginning to end (top to bottom).

CENTER

Direction of alignment: center.

COLUMN_LABEL

Label of the message browser column.

<COLUMN_NAME>

Message attribute or column ID key. Use the exact custom message attribute ID for custom message attribute columns. Enclose column names that contain spaces in quotation marks ("").

Note: Some of the following message attributes have more than one possible matching ID. This ensures compatibility with the itoopbrw file syntax used in earlier versions of HPOM. Reserved words for general message attributes are the following:

Name of the operator who acknowledges the message.

Application | APPLICATION_COL
Name of the application (the tool) related to the message.

Flags | FLAGS_COL

Message flags associated with the message (SUIAONE).

Message key that is associated with the message.

Message No.

Unique identification number (message ID) for the message. This number is useful when you want to programmatically access a message by using the open HPOM APIs.

Complete text of the message.

Message Type

Attribute used by HPOM to divide a set of messages into more manageable subgroups. The message type is defined by the HPOM administrator.

No. of Duplicates | DUPLICATED_COL

Number of duplicated messages.

Node | ODE_COL

Managed node from which the message is issued.

Object | OBJECT_COL

Object that is caused, detected, or affected by an event.

Owned By

Current owner of the message.

Service Name

Name of the service associated with the message.

Service Label

Label of the service associated with the message.

Severity | SEVERITY_COL

Severity of the message.

Source

Part of the application (the tool) from which the message comes. For example, the source of a message could be a log file name, a console, an SNMP trap, or a threshold monitor.

Time Acknowledged

Date and time the message is acknowledged.

Time Created

Date and time the message is created on the managed node.

Time Last Received

Date and time the last duplicate message is received on the management server.

Time Owned

Date and time the owner of the message takes ownership of the selected message.

Time Received | TIME_COL | DATE_COL

Date and time the selected message is received on the management server.

Time Unbuffered

Date and time the message is unbuffered (that is, moved from the filtered pending messages browser to the active messages browser). This time is set by default to the start of the next period of defined service hours for the service the message relates to.

DESCEND

Direction of sorting: from end to beginning (bottom to top).

HISTORY

Values for the History message browser filter.

LEFT

Direction of alignment: left.

NAME

Keyword.

<NAME>

Name of the filter. Use backslashes to escape quotation marks and backslashes .

PENDING

Values for the Pending message browser filter.

RIGHT

Direction of alignment: right.

SORT

Keyword identifying the sorting information for the specified column.

VERSION

Keyword for the version of the itoopbrw syntax.

VERSION_STRING

Version number of the itoopbrw syntax.

<WIDTH>

Integer value representing the column width in pixels.

WIN_HEIGHT

Vertical dimension of the message browser window.

WIN_WIDTH

Horizontal dimension of the message browser window.

<WINH>

Integer value representing the height of the message browser window in pixels.

<WINW>

Integer value representing the width of the message browser window in pixels.

ito_op Start-up Options

This section describes the start-up options evaluated by the Java GUI when it is started by using the ito_op startup script.

You can start the Java GUI with the ito_op script by typing the following:

/opt/OV/www/htdocs/ito_op/ito_op &

When the Java GUI is started, the following evaluation sequence takes place:

- 1. Internal system default values are evaluated and considered first.
- 2. Startup parameters set in the itooprc resource file are evaluated. They are considered *instead* of default options.
- 3. Environment variables are evaluated and considered *instead* of parameters set in the *itooprc* resource file.
- 4. The command line options passed with the ito_op (ito_op.bat on Windows) startup script are evaluated and considered *instead* of all parameters set in the itooprc resource file.

Time Zone Specification

The Java GUI displays time-related information in the local time zone of the client. If the Java GUI and the HP Operations management server are located in different time zones, you can set the Java GUI to use the time zone of the management server by adding the appropriate text for the preferred time zone in the ito_op.bat file.

For example, to use the Australia/Sydney time zone, add the -Duser.time zone=Australia/Sydney text to the ito_op.bat file:

Valid time zones are listed in the *<JRE_HOME>\Lib\zi* directory (for example, GMT, Asia/Singapore, or Europe/Warsaw). If you specify an invalid time zone, GMT is used.

Java GUI Layout Configuration

You can configure the file name and the location for loading and saving the Java GUI layout as a command line option, for example:

ito_op.bat -config=<path/filename>
```

Specifying a Location for Saving Settings Files

You can specify a location where the HP_OV_consoleSettings_, itoopbrw, itooprc, and itooptools files will be stored by setting the CONFIG_PATH parameter in ito_op.bat. You can also set this parameter in the ito_op_ws.jnlp file or in the calling URL.

itooprc Resource File

The itooprc resource file is used to store operator preferences.

The itooprc file is created or updated automatically in the home directory of the user who activated the Java GUI after clicking the OK button in the Preferences dialog box.

Operator preference options are listed in the itooprc file. Each defined option must be listed in a separate line and followed by its parameter.

Note: The itooprc file should be edited only by experienced administrators or operators.

The following table describes the options that can be added in the itooprc file with their parameters.

Appendix A: Glossary

Α

acknowledgment

See message acknowledgment.

action

Response to a message that is assigned by a message source template or condition. This response can be automatic or operator-initiated. See also automatic action; operator-initiated action.

action agent

Also known as "opcacta." Starts and controls actions on managed nodes. Can be a script, a program, or an application. See also agent.

action manager

Also known as "opcactm." Manager that resides on the management server and controls action agents on managed nodes. The manager is called by the display manager to perform operatorinitiated actions or execute applications. The manager is called by the message manager if an automatic action is to be performed on a system other than the managed node from which the message comes.

action-allowed manager

Management server for a specific managed node that is allowed to execute actions on that node. By default, the only management server that is allowed to execute actions on a managed node is the Installation Manager. You can configure several management servers to execute actions on shared managed nodes. See also HPOM Installation Manager.

active message browser

See message browser.

agent

Program that receives requests from a manager program, and can gather information, perform processing, and generate responses. See also action agent; control agent; message agent.

annotation

See message annotation.

application

1. Simple script, process, or command. 2. Complex product that includes a number of programs and configuration files. See also operation view; HP application; HP service; HPOM application; HPOM internal application.

application defaults

Defaults, such as color or font, that can be changed by accessing the X Windows application defaults file. See also manual page opc(1).

audit entry

Entry written to the log file that documents an operator activity (for example, performing an action, launching an application, or logging on or off) or an administrator activity (for example, configuration).

authentication

Security feature that verifies the identity of the parties involved in a connection. See also encryption.

automatic action

Action triggered by an incoming event or message. No operator intervention is involved. See also message acknowledgment; operator-initiated action.

В

backup manager

Management server that replaces another management server (for example, in case of failure). This replacement management server becomes the primary management server. It usually has same configuration as the server it replaces. See also primary manager.

broadcasting

Simultaneously sending commands to one or more specified managed nodes. In the Java GUI operators, send these commands from the Tools tree in the Object Pane.

С

competence center

Designated centers of expertise for specific areas of a management system, such as databases or operating systems. When these centers are organized into a hierarchy, managed nodes are configured to send messages relating to specific subjects to defined management servers, where the knowledge exists to solve those problems. See also flexible management.

configuration management adapter

Also known as "opcbbcdist." Configuration management adapter between the HP Operations management server and the HTTPS agents that creates instrumentation from existing actions, commands, and monitors, and switches nodeinfo settings into the XPL format used on HTTPS nodes.

control agent

Also known as "opcctla." Agent on each managed node that is responsible for starting and stopping all other agents, and processing requests from the management server. During startup, or following a distribution request from the request sender, this agent starts the distribution agent, which gathers new configuration data from the management server. See also agent.

control switch

Switching the responsibility of a message from the source management server to target management servers. This responsibility switch gives the full set of actions and operations associated with the original message to the target management servers. The source management server retains a read-only copy of the message. See also message forwarding; notification message.

controlled node

Managed node to which all the management and monitoring capabilities of HPOM, including remote logon, can be applied. Actions can be performed and applications can be started on this node.

D

datastore service

Any kind of storage mechanism used to store information in a distributed environment (for example, a database storing metadata, persistent object information, historical information, and topological information).

default objects

See object.

default target nodes

List of nodes on which applications are started or to which commands are broadcast. The administrator defines this list. If the administrator grants operators customized start-up rights, the operators can modify the list from the Java GUI. See also managed nodes; node.

disabled nodes

Nodes that are temporarily removed from the environment of a specified operator. No agent processes are started and incoming messages from these nodes are ignored.

Е

EC

See message attributes.

encryption

Security option that prevents eavesdropping on messages and tampering with messages. This option ensures that only legitimate, authenticated parties can read the message. See also authentication.

event

Occurrence or incident within a computing environment that triggers a message. Typically, this occurrence is a change in status or a threshold violation. For example, the status of a printer changes when the paper tray empties.

event attribute

See message attributes.

event correlation

Correlation that allows real-time processing of event streams to identify relationships between events and, where possible, generate new and smaller streams with more useful and manageable information.

external nodes

Nodes located outside the HPOM domain. These nodes, which include all kinds of nodes (that is, not just IP nodes), have only some of the functionality of normal HPOM nodes. No HP Operations agent runs on these nodes. See also node group.

F

filtered message browser

Java GUI message browser displays a selection of messages. This browser enables you to viewing only specified messages rather than the entire Message Browser. See also history message browser; message browser; pending messages browser.

filters

Screening devices provided by message conditions that change, redirect, or suppress information on nodes or within the GUI. The administrator uses these screening devices to collect messages from various sources by defining message and suppress conditions. See also message conditions; suppress conditions.

flexible management

Spreading responsibility for managed nodes over a number of management servers, enabling those managed nodes to report to the various management servers according to the time, location, or subject of the messages received. See also competence center; follow-the-sun.

follow-the-sun

Distribution of responsibility across multiple management servers by time zone. Managed nodes send messages to the configured management servers according to time attributes defined by the administrator. See also flexible management.

G

graphical user interface See Java GUI.

GUI See Java GUI.

Η

history message browser

Java GUI browser that displays all acknowledged messages. By examining acknowledged messages, you can review techniques previously used to solve problems. See also message browser; pending messages browser; filtered message browser.

HP application

HP application that is integrated with the HPOM. See also application; HP service; HPOM application; HPOM internal application.

HP service

Script, process, or command that is integrated into HPOM from HP Software by using the opcservice command line tool. Unlike applications, services cannot be invoked from symbols. Services are either invoked automatically or manually from the menu bar. Services can be represented by symbols, or as part of a hierarchy under a group symbol. See also application; HP application, HPOM application; HPOM internal application.

HPOM administrator

Administrator responsible for installing and configuring HPOM software, setting and maintaining operating policies, maintaining non-HPOM software, and configuring operator workspaces and scripts. The administrator can access all functions of the HPOM operator interface. The administrator can create a fully customizable working environment for each operator, according to the individual management tasks and responsibilities of that operator. See also opc_adm; operators; user profile.

HPOM application

Application that has been integrated into HPOM. See also application; HP application; HP service; HPOM internal application.

HPOM Installation Manager

Management server from which the HP Operations agent software is installed on the managed node. By default, this management server monitors the heartbeat of the agent and counts the licensing. See also action-allowed manager; primary manager.

HPOM internal application

Application of the type Broadcast. See also application; HP application; HP service; HPOM application.

HPOM operators

See operators.

HPOM password See password.

HP Operations Manager (9.22)

HTTPS-based Java GUI

Solution for providing a secure communication between Java GUI and the HP Operations management server built on HTTPS protocol with Secure Socket Layer (SSL) encryption. See also Java GUI.

instruction text interface

Interface that enables the administrator to define an external program used to present instructions to a chosen operator. Depending on the external program used, the administrator can then present different instructions for each message.

J

Java GUI

Java graphical user interface. See also object pane.

L

license key

A license key contains information about the licensed object and the number of licenses (LTUs) on the key. The HP Operations management server and HP operations agent are examples of licensed objects.

license password

A unique character array that contains information about one or more licenses for a licensed object. Passwords are added to the license password repository to install licenses (LTUs).

license to use (LTU)

An LTU is a license that is acquired by the customer and is used by product components that require licensing.

log file encapsulator

Also known as "opcle." Process residing on the managed nodes that uses the log file template to scan one or more applications or system log files for messages matching a pattern specified by the administrator. If a match causes a message to be generated, the message is forwarded to the message agent.

log file messages

Messages that are generated from application or service log files. The administrator sets up log file templates. These templates consist of monitoring options (for example, polling interval, processing tool, and character set), as well as message and suppress conditions, to determine the way log files are read by the log file encapsulator. The log file encapsulator then forwards any generated messages to the message agent. See also message sources.

log-only message

Message that is logged on the management server (or locally, if so configured) and sent to the history database. This message displays only in the history message browser. The log-on-management-server-only attribute can be set individually for each message condition. Other actions cannot be set when this option is selected for a condition.

Μ

managed nodes

Computer system or intelligent device (for example, a network printer or router) monitored or controlled by HPOM. The HP Operations agent collects, filters, and processes information from each node, and sends it to the management server. See also default target nodes; message sources; node; node group; remote node.

management server

Central computer system of the domain to which all managed nodes forward their HPOM messages.

manager-of-manager

See flexible management.

marking message

See message ownership.

message

Structured, readable piece of information about the status of a managed object, an event related to a managed object, or a problem with a managed object. Depending on the status of the object, this information is displayed in the Java GUI active message browser, filtered active message browser, filtered history message browser, or filtered pending messages browser. See also message attributes.

message acknowledgment

Moving a message from the message browser to the history database, where it may be viewed by using the Java GUI filtered history message browser. Typically, a message is moved to the history database after the problem or event that triggered it is resolved by an action. See also automatic action; message unacknowledgement.

message agent

Also known as "opcmsga." Agent on a managed node that receives messages from the message sources, then processes and forwards the messages to the management server. See also agent.

message annotation

Text added manually or automatically to a message by an operator or an administrator. This text describes actions taken to solve a problem. The text can consist of multiple lines or pages. Operators and administrators can add more than one annotation to a message.

message attributes

1. Characteristics the administrator uses to classify a message received by the management server. 2. Numerical fields of OPCDATA_MSG. These fields are referenced in string form (for example, in the event-type field of an EC node). See also message; message key.

message browser

Part of the user interface that enables users to view messages received by the management server. From this browser, users can detect problems, review and acknowledge messages, and direct problem-management activities. See also history message browser; pending messages browser; filtered message browser.

message conditions

Filters that configure HPOM to accept messages from various sources. These filters result in the generation of a message, which is usually displayed in the message browser. A message source template is composed of a series of message and suppress conditions. See also filters; message regroup conditions; suppress conditions.

message forwarding

Forwarding messages from one HP Operations management server to another, informing other management servers of problems, and allowing another management server to carry out actions associated with the forwarded message. See also control switch; notification message.

message groups

Groups of messages that belong to the same task or have some logical connection (for example, messages from backup and output tasks, or messages having a common policy). See also operation view.

message interceptor

Also known as "opcmsgi." Process that receives incoming messages. You can use the opcmsg (1) command and the opcmsg(3) API to forward messages to HPOM. You can also set conditions to integrate or suppress chosen message types.

message key

Message attribute (that is, a string) used to identify messages that are triggered from particular events. This string summarizes the important characteristics of the event. The string can be used to allow messages to acknowledge other messages. The string also enables you to identify duplicate messages. See also message attributes.

message manager

Also known as "opcmsgm." Process running on the management server. This process prioritizes and groups messages, adds annotations, and performs actions.

message marking

Indicating that an operator or an administrator has taken note of a message. This concept is used in informational mode only. It is similar to message ownership in enforced mode. See also message ownership.

message ownership

When an operator or an administrator takes charge of a message to carry out actions associated with that message. This concept is similar to message marking in informational mode. See also message marking; message ownership mode.

message ownership mode

One of three modes used by an operator or an administrator when interacting with an action. These modes include optional, enforced (default), and informational. See also message ownership.

message regroup conditions

Conditions in the message management policy defined for an operating environment. You can use the conditions to regroup messages on the management server. For example, you can

combine message groups for HP-UX to form a new group for operating system messages. See also message conditions; suppress conditions.

message severity

See severity.

message sources

Sources for messages managed by HPOM. HPOM manages messages from various sources, including log files, SNMP traps, threshold monitors, HPOM message command interface and API (opcmsg(1|3)), HPOM monitor command interface and API (opcmon(1|3)), and event correlation services. To handle messages from each of these sources, the HPOM administrator sets up templates consisting of message defaults, message conditions, and suppress conditions. See also log file messages; managed nodes.

message stream interface

Interface that enables external applications to tap into the internal message flow of HPOM. External read-write, read-only, and write-only applications can access the interface, and provide additional message processing. The interface is available on the management server and the agents. A set of APIs is provided with the interface, so you can access its functionality.

message target rules

Conditions for the managed node that indicate to which management server specific messages must be sent. These conditions also determine when messages are suppressed or buffered during scheduled outages or service hours, based on message attributes or time. The conditions are defined in the configuration file mgrconf on the managed node.

message type

Message attribute used to sort messages into subgroups. This attribute permits a fine differentiation of messages that can be referenced in correlation rules. The attribute is particularly useful when you have an event correlation engine connected to HPOM.

message unacknowledgment

Moving a message from the history database to the Java GUI active message browser, where it was located before it was acknowledged. The message is no longer displayed in the filtered history message browser, but may be viewed in the filtered active message browser. Only messages in the history message browser can be unacknowledged. See also message acknowledgment.

message-allowed nodes

Nodes that do not run agent software. Messages sent by these nodes are accepted by HPOM.

МоМ

manager-of manager. See also flexible management.

monitor agent

Also known as "opcmona." Process that observes system parameters (for example, CPU load, disk utilization, kernel parameters, and SNMP MIB). The process checks actual values against predefined thresholds. If a threshold has been exceeded, a message is generated and forwarded to the message agent. The polling interval of the monitored object can be configured by the HPOM administrator. See also threshold monitoring.

monitored object

Objects such as system parameters, database status, and spooling information that are periodically read by HPOM.

monitored-only nodes

Nodes on which all agent processes are started, but on which no actions are executed. You can use these nodes to configure systems with high security requirements and restricted remote logons and actions.

Ν

node

Computer system or intelligent device (for example, a bridge or router) in a network. See also default target nodes; managed nodes; operation view.

node group

Logical group of internal and external nodes managed by operators. The administrator applies a consistent set of policies to this logical group. A single node can belong to many groups. See also external nodes; managed nodes.

node hierarchy

Visual representation of the hierarchical organization of nodes and node layout groups. Each hierarchy contains all managed nodes that are configured in the HPOM environment. These hierarchies differ only in how their nodes are organized. The hierarchies are assigned to HPOM

users and represent the managed nodes for which these users are responsible. The default hierarchy in HPOM is the node bank.

notification message

Read-only message forwarded to a target management server by HPOM. Although this message is for informational purposes, there is a limited set of operations associated with it. See also control switch; message forwarding.

notification service

Service that alerts operators when an event occurs. Within HPOM, this service includes colors and severity levels configured for messages displayed in the Java GUI message browser. HPOM can also forward messages to external services (for example, beepers, paging services, and so on).

0

object

Resource and associated functionality managed by HPOM (for example, a node, an application, or an operator).

object pane

Second pane at the top of the Java GUI that helps you navigate to different elements within your managed environment. See also Java GUI.

opc_adm

HPOM administrator. One of three predefined HPOM users. This is the default administrator in HPOM. See also opc_op; HPOM administrator; user name.

OPC_NODES

Reserved variable that enables you to retrieve a list of nodes selected in an operator managed node or in an administrator node bank or node group bank. The hostnames of the nodes are passed to the HPOM application.

opc_op

HPOM operator. One of three predefined HPOM users. The operator controls system management functions only. The operator does not manage network activities. The operator can access some UNIX tools (for example, Processes, Disk Space, and Print Status). See also opc_adm; operators; user name.

opcacta

See action agent.

opcactm

See action manager.

opcbbcdist

See configuration management adapter.

opcctla

See control agent.

opcle

See log file encapsulator.

opcmon (1|3)

Command and API used by applications and scripts to pass monitoring values to the HPOM monitor agent (opcmona).

opcmona

See monitor agent.

opcmsg (1|3)

Command and API used by applications and scripts to pass HPOM message texts and attributes to the HPOM message interceptor (opcmsgi).

opcmsga

See message agent.

opcmsgi

See message interceptor.

opcmsgm

See message manager.

opcuiwww

Process that serves Java-based operator GUIs by forwarding all communication requests between to and from the display manager. For each Java-based GUI, at least one such process is started.

operation view

The operation view displays a hierarchical tree diagram of the nodes and applications within the managed environment, as well as the message groups assigned to the operator. See also application; message groups; node.

operator-initiated action

Action used to take corrective or preventive actions in response to a given message. Unlike automatic actions, these actions are triggered only when operators click a button. Because operator browsers are available to the administrator, the administrator can also trigger these actions as well. See also action; automatic action.

operators

HPOM users responsible for monitoring and responding to messages from the set of nodes and message groups assigned to them by the HPOM administrator. These users perform tasks from the Java GUI message browser and the object pane. The preconfigured operator is opc_op. See also opc_op; user profile.

OV Control

Also known as "ovcd." Process on the management server that starts and stops all other manager processes, and checks that all manager processes are running.

ovcd

See OV Control.

ovoareqsdr

See request sender.

own state

See message ownership; ownership display mode.

ownership

See message ownership.

ownership display mode

Mode that enables you to decide whether to include or ignore owned or marked messages. The mode is used to generate message status. Available modes are Status Propagate and No Status Propagate. See also status propagation.

Ρ

password

Unique identifier for an HPOM administrator or operator. This identifier is not related to the password used to access the operating system. See also user name.

pattern matching

Conditions used to categorize messages. These conditions can include text patterns with which an event can be compared. Success or failure in these comparisons determines how a message is processed by HPOM. See also unmatched message.

pending message

Message that arrives on the HP Operations management server outside defined service hours or during a scheduled outage. This message resides in the Java GUI filtered pending messages browser until a defined unbuffer time is reached. The message may be unbuffered manually or automatically. If the message is unbuffered, it moves to the message browser. If the message is acknowledged, it moves to the filtered history message browser. See also object pane; service hours; unbuffering message.

pending messages browser

Browser that shows messages that have been buffered because they arrived outside a defined period of service hours. See also history message browser; message browser; pending message; service hours; filtered message browser.

policy

Configuration element consisting of at least two files: a policy header and one or more policy bodies. The policy header is an XML file containing attributes such as name, type, version, and so on. Policy bodies contain actual configuration (for example, a set of rules that determine the generation of messages on one or more managed nodes on which policies are deployed). See also policy group.

policy group

Logical group of policies sharing common characteristics. Administrators create groups and hierarchies to simplify the management of polices and the assignment of policies to managed nodes or node groups. See also policy.

primary collection station

Collection station that has primary responsibility for monitoring an object. See also secondary collection station.

primary manager

Management server that is currently responsible for HP Operations agents. Only this server is allowed to start or stop the agents, install new software, or distribute configurations to the agents. Information about the server is stored in the primmgr file. If this file does not exist, the HPOM Installation Manager acts as the server responsible for HP Operations agents, and HPOM extracts the file name by using the ovconfchg configuration tool for HTTPS-based managed nodes. See also backup manager; HPOM Installation Manager.

process

Execution of a program file. In HPOM, these program file executions include integrated applications and scripts, management server processes, agent processes, and trouble ticket services.

property sheet

Pop-up window that organizes task steps into options you access by clicking tabs. These steps may be completed in the order you choose.

R

remote logon

Accessing a managed node from a location other than the managed node itself.

remote node

System that uses a communication link. See also managed nodes.

reports

Summaries about configuration information. The HPOM administrator can print HPOM summaries or integrate summaries that are not included with HPOM.

request sender

Also known as "ovoareqsdr." Process that sends requests from the management server to the managed node (for example, starting, and stopping the agents, setting heartbeat polling, and so on).

S

scheduled outage

Planned periods of time during which services and systems in a computing environment are unavailable. Within these time periods, messages from the unavailable services and systems are suppressed or moved directly into the history database. See also pending message; service hours; unbuffering message.

secondary collection station

Collection station that monitors an object, but is not specified as the primary collection station for that object. See also primary collection station.

secondary manager

Secondary management server. You can transfer management responsibility from the primary management server to a secondary management server. When you transfer responsibilities to the secondary management server, you transform the secondary management server into the primary management server. See also manual page for the command opcragt(1M).

service

See HP service.

service hours

1. Defined period of time during which the help desk is staffed. This period of time is defined by the customer's Service Level Agreement. 2. Defined period of time during which messages from HPOM nodes are passed to HPOM operators. Messages generated outside this period of time are buffered until the next defined period of time, during which they are then forwarded. 3. Defined period of time during which a service provider provides support for a service (for example, email, printing, SAP R/3, or outsourcing). See also pending message; pending messages browser; object pane; unbuffering message.

service reports

Reports that provide an overview of the status of services in the HPOM environment at any moment in time or over a specified period of time. These reports are generated with the HP Service Reporter.

session

Time during which you are logged on to HPOM. You start (or stop) an HPOM session when you log on to (or log out of) HPOM.

severity

Level assigned by the HPOM administrator to a message, based on its importance in a given operator's environment. Symbols representing nodes, node groups, or message groups have the highest severity status level. See also status propagation.

Simple Network Management Protocol

See SNMP.

SNMP

Simple Network Management Protocol. Protocol running above TCP/IP used to exchange network management information. SNMPv2C has extended functionality over the original protocol.

SNMP traps

One source of messages for HPOM. The HPOM event interceptor collects and filters traps retrieved from nodes in the network. The filtered messages are forwarded to the message agent. The administrator can set up templates for the traps. The templates consist of message and pattern-matching defaults, message conditions, and suppress conditions.

start-up attributes

Target nodes, application calls, and the user who executes the application call for a given application. These attributes are preconfigured for an application by the HPOM administrator.

status propagation

Status (determined by severity level) of a given managed node or message group. This severitylevel status reflects the status of the highest severity message originating from that managed node or message group. See also ownership display mode; severity.

suppress conditions

Conditions set up by the HPOM administrator to filter out specific messages from specific sources. By setting these conditions, the administrator prevents the messages from being sent to the message browser. Suppressed messages can be logged locally on the managed node. See also filters; message conditions; message regroup conditions.

system resource files

Files for opc_op user configuration (for example, /etc/passwd and /etc/group), as well as files executed during system startup and shutdown. These configuration files can be modified manually or automatically.

Т

threshold monitoring

Monitoring the thresholds of an object to detect problems in the early stages of development. If an object exceeds a threshold for a specified period of time, a message can be sent to the operator. This message enables the operator to resolve the problem before it affects the functionality of the system and the work of end users. See also monitor agent.

U

unacknowledgment

See message unacknowledgment.

unbuffering message

Moving a message from the filtered pending messages browser to the filtered active messages window, where it may be modified. See also pending message; object pane; service hours.

unmatched message

Message that does not match message or suppress conditions. These messages can be logged locally or forwarded to the management server. See also pattern matching.

user name

Identifier that is unique to the HPOM application and has no relation to the operating system. A valid HPOM user name and password is required to log on to the Java GUI. HPOM assigns the unique identifiers opc_adm and opc_op to the HPOM administrator and operator. These names cannot be changed. Other identifiers can be up to eight characters long. All operating system restrictions apply. See also opc_adm; opc_op; password.

user profile

Profile that defines the configuration of virtual HPOM users. The configuration of real HPOM users can be derived from one or more predefined profiles. See also operators; HPOM administrator.

V

view

Display that you configure for a particular database or system. For example, you may use filters to define a display of messages in the message browser. The messages that meet your conditions are displayed in the filtered active message browser.

W

workspace

Tabs in the workspace pane defined by operators for specific tasks. Normal workspaces can contain message browsers, charts, history lava lamps, application outputs, service graphs and non-ActiveX web browsers. ActiveX workspaces can contain only ActiveX web browsers. See also workspace pane.

workspace pane

Third pane at the top of the Java GUI that includes operator-defined workspaces. Each workspace can contain message browsers, application output windows, graphs and charts, or web browsers. See also Java GUI; workspace.
