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# HP Operations Smart Plug-in for Web Servers Overview

The HP Operations Smart Plug-in for Web Servers (Web Servers SPI) enables you to use HP Operations Manager for Windows (HPOM for Windows) to monitor and manage the operations and performance of your web server on your UNIX nodes.

The Web Servers SPI is installed on your HPOM for Windows management server. An HP Operations agent is installed on each of the UNIX nodes to be managed. Each UNIX node is added to the HPOM for Windows console. Web Servers SPI instrumentation is deployed to each managed UNIX node. You configure each managed node to accept monitoring and managing by the Web Servers SPI.

The Web Servers SPI contains tools and policies, created using HPOM templates, through which you monitor and manage your Web Server on your UNIX nodes. These tools and policies are preset to perform web server specific monitoring and managing.

Once installed and configured the Web Servers SPI policies monitor the events of the web server on your managed nodes. Whenever an event meets the defined message criteria, or threshold criteria, the rule-defined action is performed. These actions can include notification, entering log files, stopping or restarting a web server. To perform these actions, the Web Servers SPI policies can be directed to initiate Web Servers SPI tools.

Using standard HPOM processes, you can modify the policy values as needed to adjust monitoring and managing actions.

# Web Servers SPI features and functions

The Web Servers SPI provides policies and tools specifically designed to integrate with HPOM for Windows.

The Web Servers SPI uses standard HPOM policy types: logfile entry, auto discovery, schedule, and threshold management. Web Servers SPI policies discover web servers, create logs, and perform service monitoring of your managed nodes.

The Web Servers SPI tools configure, unconfigure, start, stop, and show access and error log files on your managed UNIX nodes.

Using the Web Servers SPI, you can:

- Modify policies and tools to suit your needs.
- Configure servers, policies, and tools, including setting the rules by which messages are generated and tools launched.
- Manage your web server by monitoring unix processes.
- Discover monitored web servers and view service instances in the HPOM console service map.

# Web Servers SPI installation

All the actions to install and configure the Web Servers SPI are performed on the Windows management server.

1. Verify that the Web Servers SPI is installed on your HPOM for Windows management server.
2. Add each UNIX node to be managed to the HPOM Console.
3. Install the HPOM Agent on each of the UNIX nodes to be managed.
  1. FTP the agents to the UNIX managed nodes.
  2. Manually install the agent.
4. Deploy Web Servers SPI instrumentation to each of the UNIX nodes to be managed.
5. Configure each managed UNIX node to accept monitoring and managing by the Web Servers SPI.

# Installation prerequisites and compatibility

Prior to installing the Web Servers SPI, review the following and make sure that all installation prerequisites and system compatibility requirements are satisfied on both the Windows management node and managed UNIX nodes. Refer to the Release Notes file (`WebServer_ReleaseNotes.html`) for system compatibility version level information. The Web Servers SPI requires that the following components are preinstalled and configured on the management node:

- HPOM for Windows, version 8.10 or 8.00 is installed and configured on a Windows 2000 or Windows 2003 system.
- HPOM for Windows, version 8.10 or 8.00 console is installed and configured on the HPOM for Windows management server or other appropriate Windows 2000 or Windows 2003 system.
- 15 MB disk space on the HPOM for Windows management server system to install components necessary for the integration.
- Complete installation of Perl version 5.6.1 or later under `/usr/bin` directory on the managed node.

**NOTE:**

The version of OV Perl installed on the managed node might not contain the complete Perl installation, therefore you must make sure that you install the complete version of Perl.

The Web Servers SPI monitors and manages web servers on many platforms. Depending on the web server version, the Web Servers SPI can manage web servers running on the following platforms:

- Apache 2.x web server support
  - HP-UX versions 11.11, 11.23, 11.31 PA, and 11.31 IA
  - Sun Solaris, versions 8, 9
  - RedHat Enterprise Linux, version 4.0 (x86)
  - SuSE Linux and SuSE Enterprise Server, versions 9 and 10 (x86)

**NOTE:**

If Perl is not installed, you must configure the Apache web server by adding the additional parameter named `module` to the configuration tool as follows: `httpd.conf module`. This method might not work with Apache versions later than 2.0.55. In such a scenario, Web Servers SPI performance monitoring policies for Apache require the `mod_hpspi` Apache module to load. Before the Web Servers SPI can load the `mod_hpspi` Apache module, the `mod_so` module must be

enabled. For information about enabling the `mod_so` module, refer to the *Apache Administration Guide* .

- Sun ONE web server
  - Sun Solaris, versions 8, 9, 10

**NOTE:**

Web Servers SPI performance monitoring policies for SunONE requires SNMP data for collecting performance information. Before installing the Web Servers SPI, the SNMP subagent must be configured.

- IBM HTTP web server
  - IBM HTTP 6.0 web server on RedHat Enterprise Linux Advanced Server (AS) 3.0 on Intel x86

# Install the Web Servers SPI on the management server

Use the Windows InstallShield wizard to install the Web Servers SPI on the HPOM for Windows management server system. The InstallShield wizard guides you through the procedure and prompts you for the information that you must enter.

## To install the Web Servers SPI onto your Windows 2000 or 2003 server:

1. Make sure that prerequisites have been met. For more information, see Installation prerequisites and compatibility .
2. Insert the HP Operations Smart Plug-ins DVD into the DVD drive.
3. Run the setup program.

1. Click **Start menu** → **Run**

2. Enter in the field: **<DVDROM\_drive>:\setup.exe**

3. Use the drive letter of your DVD-ROM drive.

The Install Welcome message displays.

The Installation Wizard guides you through the process.

4. Continue with the installation, click **Next** .

The License Agreement window opens.

5. Agree to the licensing requirements.

Read the License Agreement.

Click **Yes** to agree to it.

The Install Destination window opens.

6. Select an installation destination and click **Next** .

The Installation Description window opens.

7. Verify the installation destination, click **Next** .

The Start Copying window opens.

8. Copy the files, click **Next** .

When the installation is complete, the Install Completion window opens.

9. Exit the installation wizard, click **Finish** .

# Verify Web Servers SPI management server installation

To verify the Web Servers SPI is installed on your Windows management server, check the HPOM Console tree for Web Servers SPI policies and tools.

**To use the HPOM console to check for Web Servers SPI policies and tools:**

1. From your Windows Start directory or desktop (if alias exists), start HPOM.

The HP Operations Manager window opens.

2. Verify the addition of the Web Servers SPI Tools.

1. Click through the Tree tab of the HPOM console:

**Console → Operations Manager → Tools**

2. Verify the list of supported web server products listed under **Tools** .

Click through the Tree tab of the HPOM Console:

**SPI for Web Servers → WebSPI Admin | WebSPI Apache | WebSPI SunONE**

Each of these options contains the tools to start, stop, and check the status of services and processes associated with each web server.

3. Verify the list of tools for each supported web server.

3. Verify the addition of the Web Servers SPI Policies.

Each of the two options contains a folder for each supported web server that contains the policies for auto-discovery, error log, and measurement threshold handling associated with each web server.

# Add managed nodes to the HPOM console

Using standard HPOM for Windows processes, make sure that all to-be-managed nodes are included in the HPOM console. For more information, see the applicable HPOM for Windows help topics.

**To verify that all to-be-managed nodes are already included in the HPOM console:**

1. From the HPOM console, Tree tab, click through the tree:

**Console → Nodes**

This displays a list of included nodes.

2. Check for the desired node, by node name.
3. If any of the to-be-managed nodes are not already included in the HPOM console, add them.

Use standard HPOM for Windows processes:

1. From the HPOM console, Tree tab, click through the tree:

**Console → Nodes**

2. Right-click the Nodes object.

From the pop-up menu, select the action: **Configure → Nodes**

The Configure Managed Nodes window opens.

3. Click the New node.

From the pop-up menu, select the action: **Node Properties**

The Node Properties window opens.

4. Enter the new node information:

- Name node - a general node name

- Network - a fully qualified domain name
- System

5. Click **OK** .

This adds the node to the list of nodes in the HPOM console.

# Deploy the Web Servers SPI to managed nodes

Use standard HPOM for Windows processes to deploy the Web Servers SPI to a managed node. Make sure that you configure node on the management server and the HP Operations agent on the managed node. For more information, refer to the applicable HPOM for Windows Help topics.

The following steps are provided here for your reference. For more information, see the applicable HPOM for Windows help topics.

## To deploy Web Servers SPI instrumentation to managed nodes:

1. Display the HPOM managed nodes.

From the HPOM Console, Tree tab, click through the tree as follows:

**Console → Operations Manager → Nodes**

This displays a list of available nodes.

2. Select the desired node.

Right-click the target node.

3. Deploy the instrumentation.

From the pop-up menu, select:

**All Tasks → Deploy Instrumentation**

The Deploy Instrumentation window opens.

4. Select all the instrumentation options.

The Web Servers SPI includes instrumentation within WSSPI instrumentation.

From the Deploy Instrumentation window, select the instrumentation type: WSSPI.

5. Click **OK** .



This deploys the reference files to the appropriate HPOM directories.

 **NOTE:**

This completes the deployment of the Web Servers SPI to the managed nodes. To start monitoring and managing the web servers on your managed UNIX nodes, proceed to [Using the Web Servers SPI](#).

# Verify Web Servers SPI deployment on managed nodes

To verify if the Web Servers SPI instrumentation is deployed correctly:

- Open the Deployment jobs folder and verify that it is empty.
- Check for the Web Servers SPI scripts in the following directories on the managed node:

**`/var/opt/OV/bin/instrumentation`**

# Configure managed nodes

Execute the Web Servers SPI tool, **Configure <server> Node**, to create the Web Servers SPI configuration file on the managed node. Select the **Configure <server> Node** tool that corresponds to the managed node web server. This configuration file stores configuration information about the managed node web server.

The file is stored in the managed node at:

**`/var/opt/OV/wsspi/conf/wsspi.cfg`**

It is important that you keep in mind the following details:

- This configuration file is used by all the management components of the Web Servers SPI (tools or policies). Without this configuration file, management is not possible.
- Each time the **Configure <server> Node** tool is executed, the existing configuration information is overwritten.
- If you need to add a new search path to the configuration file, rerun the **Configure <server> Node** tool.

## To configure the Web Servers SPI managed node:

1. If configuring Apache node services, make sure that it is actively running on the managed node.

From the HPOM console, Tree tab, click through the tree:

**Console → Operations Manager → Tools → SPI for Web Servers → WebSPI Apache | WebSPI SunONE → Configure Apache Node | Configure SunONE Node**

For example:

**Tools → SPI for Web Servers → WebSPI Apache → Configure Apache Node**

2. Right-click the **Configure <server> Node** tool.

From the pop up menu, select **All Tasks → Launch Tool**

The **Select where to launch this tool** window opens.

3. Select the node(s) to be configured.
4. Click the **Launch** button.

The **Parameters** tab of the **Edit Parameters** window opens.

5. For Apache web servers, enter the path **httpd.conf** .  
If Perl is not installed, you must configure the Apache web server by adding the additional parameter named `module` to the configuration tool as follows: `httpd.conf module` . This method might not work with Apache versions later than 2.0.55. You must also specify the tag for the Server Name as follows `<ServerName > <IPAddress > :<Port >`
6. For SunONE web servers, enter the path **magnus.conf** .
7. Click the **Launch** button.

Configuration of the selected nodes is now started.

The Web Servers SPI tool attempts to discover information that is part of the Apache, IBM HTTP, or SunONE web server configuration on the managed nodes.

- Access Log File Path: web server access log file path
- Start Script Path: path to the web server start script
- Stop Script Path: path to the web server stop script
- Restart Script Path: path to the web server restart script

# Verify configuration of managed nodes

There are several methods for verifying if managed nodes are configured correctly.

- Verify that managed nodes are configured by checking for the **wsspi.cfg** file on each managed node.
- Check that the messages reported by the **Configure <server> Node** tool have been executed. The messages are sent to the management server. Check the messages listed for a successful execution of the **Configure <server> Node** tool.
- Deploy the auto-discovery policy. This displays the web server being managed in the HPOM console service map.

If the auto-discovery policy is deployed without the configuration file (**wsspi.cfg** being present, then no message is sent to the active browser and the service maps are not displayed.

To view the web server instance in the HPOM console service map, click through the HPOM console tree as follows:

**Console** → **Operations Manager** → **Services** → **Applications** → **Web Server SunONE | Web Server Apache**

 **NOTE:**

Web server instances are not listed under the WebSPI Apache or WebSPI SunONE tree until the auto-discovery policy, **WebSPI-<server>-Discovery**, is executed.

# Discover web servers on managed nodes

Discovering services is the process of identifying instances of a web server on a managed node and displaying the status in the HPOM console Service map.

Each discovered service is represented by an icon in the HPOM console Service map. The color of the icon reflects the current status of the web service it represents. A typical scenario might include:

1. Messages related to a web service arrive in the Console active browser.
2. A critical message indicates that the web service is down.
3. The matching Service map icon changes to red.
4. The red color indicates that something critical has happened to the web server.

This provides a quick visual status check for the console operator.

Execute the Auto-Discovery policy, **WebSPI-<server>-Discovery** during installation and configuration of the Web Servers SPI to discover the web servers on the managed node monitored by the Web Servers SPI. Execute this policy at any time during normal operations to add new web servers and check for existing servers.

If you are installing and configuring the Web Servers SPI for the first time, your system is ready to begin monitoring and managing your web server on your managed node as soon as this task is completed.

 **NOTE:**

Ensure that the **Configure <server> Node** tool completes successfully before executing the **WebSPI-<server>-Discovery** policy.

Conditions that can be defined in the policy include:

- Defining Web Server types to discover
- Scheduling of server discovery



**To discover the managed node web server:**

1. From the HPOM console:

**Console → HP BTO Software → Operations Manager → Policy management**

- Under policy type name: **Service Auto-Discovery** , or
- Under policy group name: **SPI for Web Servers → WebSPI Apache | WebSPI SunONE → WebSPI-AP-Discovery | WebSPI-SO-Discovery**

The **Auto-Discovery Policy** window opens.

2. Choose the node(s) on which you want to check for services.

3. Click **Launch** .

The Web Servers SPI verifies the selected managed node to supported web servers and displays the status in the HPOM console Service map.

4. Make changes to the auto-discovery conditions, as needed:

1. From the auto-discovery policy, select the **Discover** tab.

2. Change the modules, parameters, and definitions, as needed:

- Management Modules
- Service Type Definitions
- User Editable Parameters

3. Click the **Save** button.

5. Make changes to the scheduling criteria, as needed:

1. From the auto-discovery policy, select the **Schedule** tab.

2. Change the values, as needed:

- Schedule Task frequency
- Time: Specific time, Multiple Times

- Schedule Summary

3. Click the **Save** button.

6. Accept the changes, click the **Save** and **Close** button.

The supplied policies all have the version number, for example 1.0. Modifying a policy automatically increments the version number, for example:

1.1, 1.2, 1.3, ...

The **Service Auto-Discovery** window exits.

7. Deploy the policy to the desired node(s).

# Verify services discovered on managed nodes

After the Discover Services tool has run on the managed nodes, the Web Servers SPI on those managed nodes appears in the Services hierarchy on your HP Operations Manager for Windows console. The Services map appears in the Details pane.

## To verify services:

1. On the Tree tab of the HPOM console, click through the tree as follows:

**Console → Operations Manager → Services → Applications → Web Server Apache | Web Server SunOne**

2. On the Tree side of the HPOM console, the web server configuration files are listed. On the Map side of the HPOM console, web server managed nodes are displayed as color-coded icons that indicate the web server status on the node. On the Tree side of the HPOM console, each instance is listed by its path to access each web server instance configuration file.

 **NOTE:**

The Service map drills down as far as the product level. It does not show the individual services.

# Web Servers SPI policies overview

The Web Servers SPI provides a set of preconfigured policies that enable you to monitor web server operations and performance.

The policies contain a set of rules for monitoring log files, service status, and threshold values. They also provide a mechanism for initiating actions whenever conditions match specified rule criteria.

For a complete description of the policies available, see the [Web Servers SPI policies](#) .

Web Servers SPI policies are created using standard HPOM templates. The Web Servers SPI uses four types of HPOM policies:

## Logfile Entry

These policies monitor event logs and messages stored in Web Servers SPI error logs.

## Measurement Threshold

These policies schedule selected services and processes based on results defined in the threshold monitor.

## Scheduled Task

These policies schedule commands to run on managed nodes either once or according to a specific schedule.

## Service Auto-Discovery

These policies discover supported web servers. They find the installed web server and display its status in the HPOM for Windows console Service Map.

All the Web Servers SPI policies are accessed through the HPOM for Windows Console Tree. Either of two paths can be used:

- **Console → HP BTO Software → Operations Manager → Policy management**
- **Then → Policy groups → SPI for Web Servers → WebSPI Admin | WebSPI Apache | WebSPI SunONE**

Restarts the web server site.

**Show <server> Configuration**

Shows the configuration of an installed web server site.

Starts the web server site.

**Status of <server>**

Displays the status of the web server site.

**Stop <server>**

Stops the web server site.

**Show <server> Error Log**

Displays the web server error log.

**Show <server> Access Log**

Displays the web server access log.

**Show <server> Node Details**

Displays the web server configuration information.

**Remove WebSPI**

Uninstalls the Web Servers SPI instrumentation and configuration files from the managed node.

**Show Web SPI History Log**

Shows the contents of the WebSPI history log.

**Self-Healing Info**

Gathers data to address problems with the operation of the Web Servers SPI.

# Using the Web Servers SPI

The Web Servers SPI monitors and manages web servers on managed UNIX nodes.

Prior to monitoring and managing your UNIX nodes, ensure the completion of all of the installation and configuration tasks, including:

- Management node tasks: installing the Web Servers SPI on the management node, adding the managed UNIX node to the HPOM console
- Managed node tasks: installing the Web Servers SPI agent, deploying the Web Servers SPI instrumentation, configuring the managed node, and discovering services on the managed node

For all other task oriented activities refer to the topics in this chapter for procedural information. Below is a list of the type of tasks you might want to perform.

# Deploy Web Servers SPI policies

The Web Servers SPI can deploy policies manually and according to your own requirements. In addition, by copying and modifying the preconfigured policies, you can quickly create custom policies for your own specialized purposes.

Deploying your policies allows you to choose which policies are deployed on selected nodes. It also provides a means to modify policies to enter site-specific parameters.

## To deploy a policy on a node:

1. Determine the policies that you can deploy:

1. From the HPOM console, Tree tab, click through the tree as follows:

**Console → Operations Manager → Nodes → View → Policy Inventory**

This displays a list of available policies in the Details pane of the console.

2. Verify the Web Servers SPI policies which are listed.

3. From the Details pane of the HPOM console window, right-click the desired policy to select it.
4. Drag-and-drop the selected policy onto the desired node.

The Web Servers SPI policy is applied to the managed node.

# Enabling CODA Logging

Allows you to collect data for each configured Apache web server. This data can then be logged into CODA. The metrics collected for each web server instance includes the IP address, port number, CPU usage, memory usage, number of bytes transferred every second, number of bytes transferred for every request, and percentage of busy processes for the web server instance.

## Prerequisite for CODA Logging

For CODA data logging components to function effectively, make sure that the DSI2DDF component is deployed on the managed node.

### To deploy the DSI2DDF component on a node:

1. From, the HPOM Console, right-click the node on which you want to deploy the DSI2DDF component.
2. From the pop-menu, click **All Tasks → Deploy Instrumentation**.
3. Select **SPI Data Collector** and click **OK** .

## Logging performance metrics into CODA

### To log performance metrics into CODA:

1. Launch the CODA Config Spec Compilation tool. See the topic Launch Web Servers SPI tools.
2. Deploy the WebSPI-AP-CODALOG policy. See the topic Deploy Web Servers SPI policies.

# Modify the Web Servers SPI configuration file

The Web Servers SPI configuration file stores configuration information about the management server. This includes the search path for the web server binary and definitions for the number of lines in the Web Servers SPI log files and trace files. This configuration file is used by all the management components of the Web Servers SPI (tools or policies). Without this configuration file, Web Servers SPI management is not possible.

## To modify a Web Servers SPI configuration file:

1. Locate the Web Servers SPI configuration file.

The file is stored on the management server at:

**`/var/opt/OV/wsspi/conf/wsspi/wsspi.cfg`**

2. Open the Web Servers SPI configuration file, **wsspi.cfg**, for editing using a text editor, as needed. For example, to change the number of lines in a log file.
3. Make changes and save the file.
4. Reconfigure the management server, if needed.

### NOTE:

- Each time the **Configure <server> Node** tool is executed, the existing configuration information is overwritten.
- If you need to add a new search path to the Web Servers SPI configuration file, **wsspi.cfg**, rerun the **Configure <server> Node** tool.
- If the configuration file is altered at any time, rerun the **Configure <server> Node** tool.

# Remove the Web Servers SPI from managed nodes

To remove the Web Servers SPI instrumentation and configuration data, you can use the **Remove Web Servers SPI** option. This action uninstalls the Web Servers SPI from the managed node. At the same time, no other product instrumentation is affected.

## To remove the Web Servers SPI instrumentation from a UNIX node:

1. From the HPOM console Tree tab, click through the tree as follows:

**Console → Operations Manager → Tools → SPI for Web Servers → WebSPI Admin**

2. Right-click the **Remove WebSPI** tool.
3. From the pop-up menu, select **All Tasks → Remove Services**
4. Click the **Launch** button.

The managed node information is removed from the HPOM console and the Web Servers SPI functions are stopped.

# Remove the Web Servers SPI from the management server

## To uninstall the Web Servers SPI:

1. Log on to the HPOM for Windows management server.
2. Remove the Web Servers SPI policies from all nodes.
3. Use Add/Remove Programs and Change/Remove Programs on Windows to uninstall the Web Servers SPI.

# Configuration error on managed Apache node

The **Status Apache Server** tool checks the configuration of the Web Servers SPI instrumentation.

If there are problems with configuration, such as a moved **httpd** file, The **Status Apache Server** tool displays the applicable explanation.

To correct a configuration error, rerun the configuration tool.

## Warning message when you configure the SPI

The following warning message may appear when you configure the SPI with **Configure Node** tool:

*"WARNING: Server Document Root not found in config file "*

To resolve this, add "document root" entry into the Web Server configuration file. The configuration file for Apache and SunONE is **httpd.conf** and **magnus.conf** respectively. For instructions about including the "document root" entry into the Web Server configuration file, refer to the appropriate Web Server documentation.



# Not receiving messages

If you are not receiving messages about your Internet servers on the HPOM for Windows console, check the following:

- **Names**

Do not change the names of the auto-deploy policy groups. If you change the names of the auto-deploy policies, they will not deploy automatically.

- **Deployment Jobs**

Check the **Deployment Jobs** folder in the Console tree on your HPOM for Windows console. Ensure the completion of all deployment jobs. Any job that did not complete is shown with an error. If there is an error, all subsequent deployment jobs are halted and cannot proceed until the error is removed.

- **Changed Policy**

If a policy has been modified, depending on the type of modification, you might need to redeploy the policy.

## To check what policies have been deployed on a node:

1. Right-click the node in the **Nodes** folder.
2. Select **View** → **Policy Inventory** .

The policies deployed on the node are listed in the **Details** pane.

3. Check that the policy version number is correct.

## To deploy a policy on a node:

Drag-and-drop the policy onto the node in the HPOM console Tree tab.

# Turning on Tracing

Tracing enables you to drill down to the source of problems with the SPI by getting more information on what the scripts are processing.

 **NOTE:**

The procedure to enable tracing is UNIX-based.

## To enable tracing:

1. Log in to the desired node.
2. Locate and change the script you want to trace:

**For HTTPS Agent Nodes:**

/var/opt/OV/bin/instrumentation

**For DCE Agent Nodes, the directory is branched into three sub-directories:**

Actions: /var/opt/OV/bin/OpC/actions

Commands: /var/opt/OV/bin/OpC/cmds

Monitors: /var/opt/OV/bin/OpC/monitor

3. Open the script you want to trace with a text editor.
4. Find the line below and uncomment it:  
#WSSPI\_TRC\_LVL=&lt;trace\_level>
5. Set &lt;trace\_level> to a number between 0 and 9, where a trace level of 0 sets tracing off and a trace level of 9 gives you the all available tracing messages

## Trace Message Format

The format of a trace message is as follows:

&lt;date> &lt;time> WSSPI(&lt;trace\_obj>-&lt;pid>): &lt;message>

The fields have the following meanings:

&lt;date&gt; - Current date, when the message has been added

&lt;time&gt; - Current time, when the message has been added

&lt;trace\_obj&gt; - Trace object, in general the name of the script that is the source of the trace message

&lt;pid&gt; - Process ID of the script

&lt;message&gt; - The message text. If the message is sent from a sub function, this message contains the name of the function as prefix

## Sample Trace File

A sample output of a trace file for the configuration of an Apache server with trace level 9 is shown below:

# Using the Self-Healing Info Tool

Use the Self-Healing Info application when you need to gather data to address problems with the operation of the Web Servers SPI. The tool stores data that will help HP support (and you) address the problem. This data is consolidated in a file that you submit to HP support for assistance.

**Prerequisite:** Prior to using the Self-Healing Info application: (1) turn on tracing, (2) reproduce the problem, and (3) complete these steps:

1. At the HPOM console, select **Tools** → **SPI for Web Servers** → **WebSPI Admin** .
2. In the details pane, right-click the **Self-Healing Info** tool and select **All Tasks** → **Launch...** .
3. In the dialog that appears, click next to the node on which you want to collect troubleshooting data. (In the message that appears, note where the compressed file will be stored.)

In your call to HP support, you can then send the file, as your support representative directs you, as part of your support case.

# Web Servers SPI errors on managed nodes

During configuration of new Apache or SunONE nodes, a new configuration file is created. It is located in the directory:

**`/var/opt/OV/wsspi/conf/`**

This file contains the information required to start the Web Servers SPI tools. If you are experiencing problems running the Web Servers SPI tools on an Apache or SunONE node, ensure that the data contained in the following configuration file is correct:

## **wsspi.cfg**

For example, if the web server configuration information changes, such as the installation directory name, then re-run the **Configure Node** tool to recreate the Web Servers SPI configuration file and capture the latest web server configuration information.

# Uninstallation errors

Automatic uninstall does not remove the **Tools** group or the **Services** from the management node. These items continue to appear in your HPOM for Windows console.

Refer to your HPOM for Windows setup instructions for information about removing these items from your HPOM console.

## Reinstallation errors

Before reinstalling, it is necessary to run the automatic uninstall. However, this automatic uninstall only removes the 3.70 versions of policies. All other versions of any policies and the Internet Services policy group from HPOM for Windows must be manually uninstalled prior to reinstalling.
